Remembrance Day in Whitecourt, sombre and beautiful

Remembrance Day in Whitecourt looked a bit different this year. Veterans, servicemen and women, and community members came together at the AJMC for a morning of song, prayer, and honour. A large crowd gathered to remember those who fought, those who continue to fight, and those who gave their all for their country.

This year's Remembrance Day ceremony saw a venue change from Central School's gymnasium to the fieldhouse at the Allan & Jean Millar Centre. With construction continuing at the school, organizers had to change things up, using the ample space up at the AJMC instead.

One big part of the year-long event that also changed was the march. Since the ceremony was no longer downtown, this year's parade had members walking from the pool changeroom area of the AJMC to the fieldhouse. Though short, the entrance, led by the wailing bagpipes of Landis Vandermeer, was still impactful as veterans and members from the RCMP, Whitecourt Fire Department, Canadian Forces, and Cadets marched in together.

Led by Pastor Emma Guenter, the ceremony began at 10:30. The large group of attendees sang

O' Canada and then listened to a scripture reading and prayer. Pastor Guenter read last year's winning poem from the Whitecourt Legion's poster/literacy contest, titled Long Live the Memory. Stephanie Cunningham was the winner, a grade 10 student from Hilltop High School. "We must remember all that they fought, sacrificed life for our freedom, our peace—strain and agony they had to endure as they watched more of the soldiers decrease. But I was not there on the battlefield. I did not witness the suffering or cries. The fire of their bullets that would not yield of the terrible cloudy tear-gassed skies. Remembering their name and their story, their mighty acts of heroism survive. Live with the memory of their glory, be proud of their choice to fight for our lives. Many memories in our hearts and minds. We live every day with con-

stant reminds."

Following the poem reading, Pastor Guenter introduced Lt. Riley Huzar, who then addressed the crowd. "I would like to thank everyone today for attending the Remembrance Day service. Today is one in which we all remember the many who sacrificed for us, fought for us and died for us. Today is also one to remember those who continue to sacrifice and serve Canada. This includes the service men and women of our Canadian Armed Forces (CAF), the important families

of those serving the armed forces and the numerous volunteers who have all

selflessly represented and upheld our country's values."

As of 2019, there was 72,000 personnel in the Canadian Military. This year, the CAF looks to add nearly 6,000 more members and recently announced they would be accepting permanent residents too. Permanent residents are citizens who have lived in Canada for ten years but do not have citizenship. This move came following low recruitment levels.

"As we see from past and present world events, freedom is an invaluable piece of our existence and our everyday living. It is not something to be taken for granted. To all those I have mentioned, we thank you for your part in giving us freedom that we are still fortunate to experience," said Lt. Huzar. "Although freedom is priceless, it can come at a cost. Not only do we remember those who have bravely fallen,

but we must also remember those who have been gravely injured and, as a result, suffer with physical and mental scars. It is a sad but real part of combat that leaves so many to face a new form of life after an injury. To those, please know you are remembered, and we thank you and continue to support you."

Lt. Huzar then shared his personal family history. "I'm a third generation to serve in the Canadian Forces. My great-grandfather, two uncles, and my grandfather all served. Both my great-grandfather and uncle were injured, but luckily they returned home. My grandfather talked about the camaraderie and grief of WW2 and the never-ending pride for his country. When I was in high school, I also attended the Vimy Ridge ceremony in France, and it was a humbling experi-

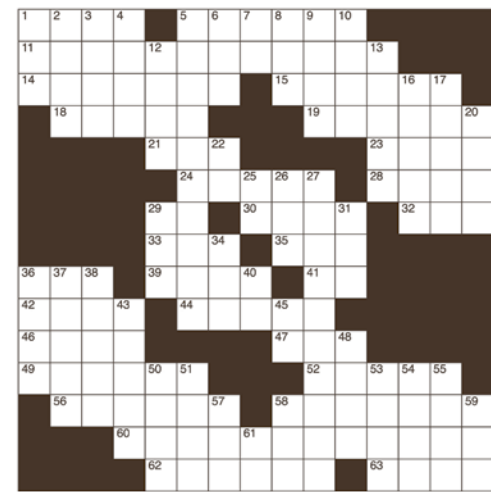
Fun By The Numbers

“Many will never experience or understand (it). Words can never express the thanks we give to our veterans and our active members. What you have all done and continue to do will never be forgotten,” he concluded.

Trumpeter Isaiah Matson performed the Last

Post, followed by a moment of silence. Landis Vandermeer then performed the Lament, followed by Matson again for the Rouse. Both did well sharing their talents with the crowd before them.

Twenty wreaths were then laid at the foot of

the white wooden cross at the front of the ceremony. MP Arnold Viersen, MLA Martin Long, Whitecourt Mayor Tom Pickard and Woodlands County Reeve John Burrows each laid one, followed by Legion president Brian Scott, and members from

the Canadian Armed Forces, RCMP, Whitecourt Fire Department, Air and Army Cadets, Whitecourt & District Chamber of Commerce, Whitecourt District Ministerial and the Guides/Brownies/Sparks. The first wreath laid was the Memorial Silver Cross

in honour of Corporal Cole Bartsch. After the wreaths were laid, the parade members stood, filtered out of their rows and made their way out of the fieldhouse. The ceremony then wrapped as guests went downtown to the Whitecourt Legion for lunch.

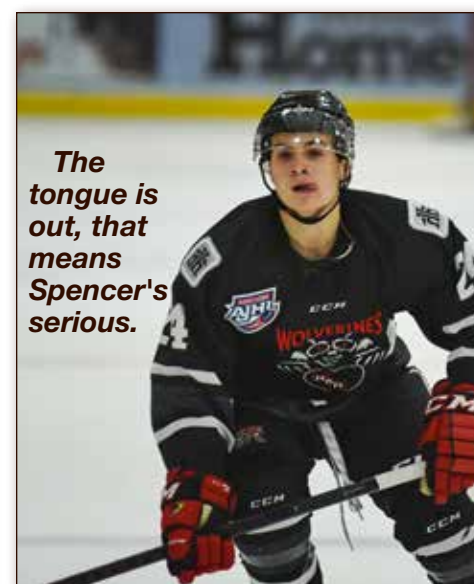

The Whitecourt Wolverines honoured veterans ahead of puck drop during their game against the Sherwood Park Crusaders on Friday, November 11. The match-up was rowdy, with lots of big hits and back-and-forth scoring between the two.

The Whitecourt Wolverines played a home game on Remembrance Day last week, welcoming the Sherwood Park Crusaders to the Scott Safety Centre. Ahead of the puck drop, the Whitecourt Wolverines invited Captain Ken Westling of the 721 Hawks Whitecourt Air Cadets squadron to read In Flanders Fields to the crowd. The 435 fans in attendance stood for the reading.

In the first period, the Crusaders potted one in first, scoring on the powerplay eight and a half minutes into the frame.

Just over five minutes later, on the powerplay following a cross-checking penalty to the Crusaders, the Whitecourt Wolverines tied things up, 1-1.

In the second period, just twelve seconds in, Cooper Smyl sliced in his second of the night, with assists from Caleb McDonald and Chase Broda, giving the Wolverines their first lead. Again, just over five minutes later, the Crusaders tied things up, 2-2. Three minutes and two seconds later, Chase Broda scored, collecting his third point of the game, assisted by Cooper Smyl and Aiden

Long. The Wolverines were back in the lead. But, keeping with the back-and-forth type of play that had happened so far, the Crusaders battled back and managed to tie things up again with fifty-one seconds left in the period.

It all came down to the third. The period saw four penalties, including a game misconduct for Wolverine Jonah Bevington after he served a blow to the head to a Crusader, leaving the player down on the ice for some time, drawing fans to the glass. Seemingly as a nod to Remembrance Day, the game's final goal was

scored at the 1:11 mark of the third. The hero of the night was Cooper Smyl. He scored his hat-trick in style with a penalty shot, giving his team the lead, which they held onto for the win. Wolverines won 4-3.

The Wolverines had 29 shots on the net during the game. Carson Ironside was in the net for the Wolverines for all sixty minutes and saw 20 shots. There were ten penalties in total. The two stars of the game were Carmela Crandell for the Crusaders, who had three points, two assists and a goal, and Cooper Smyl for the

Wolverines, who finished with an outstanding line-up, three goals and one assist.

There are four more home games this month at the Scott Safety Centre. The Wolverines take on the Camrose Kodiaks on Saturday, November 19. The last time Brooks and the Wolverines played, Brooks took the win 6-3. The Wolverines definitely will be hungry for a win. On Friday, November 25, the Wolverines welcome the Spruce Grove Saints to town. The evening match-up will be the first visit to the Scott Safety Centre for the Saints this

season.

Towards the end of the month, the Wolverines have an afternoon match-up on Sunday, November 27, against the Lloydminster Bobcats, starting at 2:30 pm. The month's final game will see the Grande Prairie Storm rumble into the community. This game will be the first match-up between the two rivals since September 2, the Wolverines' first exhibition game at the start of the season. Fans will undoubtedly be eager to see how things have changed between the two teams since the pre-season.

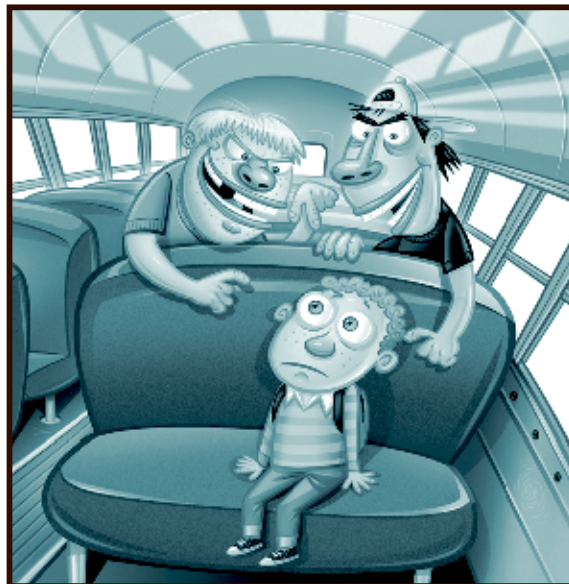

Recruitment Drive at the Whitecourt Fire Department happening this month

The Whitecourt Fire Department is recruiting new members and hopes to add eight to ten more to their crew. So far, they have received six applications. One of the most significant parts of being in the department is the time commitment for training and calls. "Our members put in about ten thousand hours a year combined. Divided by 42 members,

that's about 250 hours a year on average for our members," explained Fire Chief Brian Wynn.

Training happens on Tuesdays each week, plus some additional week-ends. "We supply all in-house training for them. We teach the NFPA 1001 professional firefighters standard, level one, and level two. We also do instructor and officer training, first aid training

and much more. There are lots of opportunities for training," said Chief Wynn. The department covers costs for training and equipment needed by members.

As members progress through their training, more opportunities open up. "We turn people into pump operators, so we have pump operator training and driver training and traffic control training.

There are so many aspects that we have to train people for, so it's ongoing forever. Once you have a bit under your belt, you can get into steep bank rescue, ice rescue, rope rescue, and swift water rescue. There's just so many to get into."

Members are very involved in the community as they teach about being fire-safe in schools and at public events. "The kids are fantastic when we do the Firehall tours or go out in public. Even if we are out doing fire training, we will take the time to stop and talk with the public and the kids," said Chief Wynn. Firefighters also teach about being Firesmart, another big piece of prevention. "We are trying to encourage

homeowners to do what they can. As a town, we are trying to protect our community in the event of a wildfire. That's a huge component of the department's fire prevention direction."

Chief Wynn said volunteering with the Whitecourt Fire Department benefits members outside the hall too. "I think we develop some pretty good leaders that take skills, not only in the fire service but also back to their work. So, it's a benefit to employers as well."

When a member joins the department, their family joins too. "It's very much a team environment. Everything we do is with crews and teams. It's also a family environment. We connect with the

families through our Fire-fighters Association. We do something for the families monthly to show support and to thank them," explained Chief Wynn.

Recruits must be at least 18 years of age. Outside of that, Chief Wynn said age doesn't matter as long as recruits can do the job. "We've had forty-year old's join us. It's like the RCMP. They are recruiting that way now, where you see many new people coming out, and they are 40 or 45 years old. These people also come with life skills, or maybe their job involves driving or being a pump operator in the oil field. These are skills that are assets to us when these people come. Life experi-

ence is a good thing."

On November 22, Whitecourt firefighters will be at the Firehall for a Recruitment Drive. Those interested are encouraged to pop by between 6 pm and 8 pm. Workstations will be set up so potential recruits can try a few different things. "We are targeting those who have questions or want to know more about becoming a firefighter. People can come to talk to members and ask them questions."

Those who join are asked to make more than just a time commitment. "We would like recruits to commit for five years. If you don't know anything or have any training coming in, it's about a year before you're comfortable being a firefighter. We invest a lot of time and money into training recruits and putting them in bunker gear, coveralls, and station wear. It costs us a fair amount. So, we like to

see that commitment."

The deadline for getting applications in is December 2. Beyond that, Chief Wynn and his deputies will interview applicants and communicate the commitment required. "We need them to know what they are getting into. If they can't make the commitments, there's not much point in starting the process. We make sure they understand what this entails."

Aside from the very well-trained members, camaraderie is one thing that is plentiful at the Whitecourt Fire Department. Joining is like joining a family. The friendships built through that trust and support from each other are second to none. It's also a fantastic way to support and protect the community. "We are there on possibility someone's worst day of their life so far. You can really make a difference in somebody's life. That's pretty gratifying," said Chief Wynn. "We work very well with our other

emergency responders, RCMP, and ambulance staff. We are cohesive on the scene, looking after the community."

In the last thirty years of being on the job, Chief Wynn said he's still learning. He said that's one of his favourite parts of being a firefighter. "It's a career that is never boring because you are always learning new things." Several members who began their careers in Whitecourt have gone on to get full-time jobs in other departments. "That's something we are proud of. We started by giving them the desire to do this and met their expectations with training and everything else. Whitecourt has a pretty good reputation of people."

Applications are on the Town of Whitecourt's website or at the fire hall. The Recruitment Drive event takes place on November 22 from 6-8 pm at the Whitecourt Fire Department.
