



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

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magnitude of the play itself, it's an extensive production. It's larger than what we've done in the past. It was performed in the fall at the Citadel in Edmonton, so the calibre of the play is tremendous," explained director Stephanie Black just a few hours ahead of showtime. "The actors have been helping build set and props and doing many other things on top of their acting roles."

Initially planned for November but bumped due to construction at the school, CLUE On Stage has been years in the making for the group, through restrictions. "Everyone has been putting in so many hours to get this ready. Our crew is fairly new, so they jumped right into it, and they've been doing awesome. Everyone on the board has also been involved in the play in a large capacity. The set was a huge thing for us and was pretty daunting, so much of our time went into that," explained Black.

Sleepless nights, anxious days and a full-time schedule for months have all been worth it. "Honestly, I told everyone not

to stress because, in the end, we all put in our best, and I think it will go very well. I'm excited to see the curtain open and to see all the work that has been put into it come together and show the community what we've been working on." The crew held rehearsals every day last week leading up to Friday's opening show, and Black said she is grateful for everyone putting their all into the project.

At 8 pm on Friday, following a delicious supper catered by Sherry and Ray Lachance (Abbie's Catering), Black, assistant director Billie-Jo House, and the cast and crew took a big collective breath as the curtain opened for the first time. Within minutes, the audience was already laughing.

One especially neat aspect of the show is that once the curtain opens, it remains that way until intermission, with set changes happening in the darkness, still visible to the audience. As the backstage crew swiftly moved set pieces in and out, the characters would march in place, bringing out giggles from the audience and adding to the experience. There was never a moment where there wasn't something to see, stage lights or not.

With each murder, the suspense grows, as does the hilarity. The set created for the show is perfection, with period-correct props, décor and wallpaper straight out of a decades-old mansion with "old money" vibes. The countless hours put into creating the backdrops are clearly visible, far exceeding the professional bar Pumpjack Players was already known for.

"The cast did such a great job, and I'm really proud of them for persevering. We had a lot of forks in the road along the way, and I appreciate their patience with me and the process of community theatre. It's not always what we picture coming in as an actor. For the tech and crew, they really pulled everything together. It was monumental doing the set, and the tech was really heavy for this play too. I have teenagers on my soundboard and working the lighting. They've really pulled through, even with some last-minute roadblocks," said Black.

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

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

perform. She said the students were sad when the concerts were cancelled in December. Getting to finally perform had everyone excited. "They were proud that their parents could finally come to see them."

The two-day concert was the first since before restrictions closed things down. "For some grade two students, this is their first time on stage. I am really, really, really happy to be back in the role (as a music teacher). Music is important for life because it's not only developing musical skills but it's developing confidence on stage. It's also developing a lot of phonemic awareness when your singing songs. For a lot of kids who are dysregulated, when they enter into music, it actually reregulates them with beat and rhythm. So, it's important for all," explained Mrs. Nimco.

"It's also a way of assisting mental health with skills they can turn to when they are older. Those are some of the essential skills they develop, and it's all-encompassing. We do a lot of math with rhythm and beat, and notation. There's also a lot of literacy with learning a new vocabulary and expanding on rhythm, syllables, and rhyming words. It expands on culture because of the different songs and is also a bit scientific. So, it encompasses everything in the core subjects." Mrs. Nimco said the students should be very proud of themselves for a job well done.

Over 600 fans filled the seats at the Scott Safety Centre, ready to see their Wolverines win. In the first period, Jack Franklin whipped the Wolverine's fans into a frenzy with a wicked goal assisted by Tanner Klimpke and Colby Browne. The goal came at 4:28 of the period. Nearly ten minutes later, the Calgary Canucks responded, tying things up 1-1. Primary Care Networks (PCNs) are not-for-profit organizations and collaborations between local physician groups and Alberta Health Services to enhance comprehensive primary care services in a geographic area. The McLeod River PCN was established in 2010 and employs 20 staff to assist 38 Family Physicians working in 5 clinics to deliver primary care services in Edson, Fox Creek, Mayerthorpe, and Whitecourt. Bighorn PCN was established in 2016 and employs 7 staff assisting 19 Family Physicians working in 2 clinics to deliver services in Hinton and Grande Cache. We envision that our patients will exceed Alberta's average life expectancy and enjoy a high quality of life. Our patients will live healthier lives and require less hospitalization because of their involvement with our teams and enhanced access to comprehensive primary health care services. Our PCN will be an outstanding example to other PCNs across Alberta and Canada.

#### THE POSITION

The Executive Director is the senior executive officer of the PCN. The Executive Director is responsible and accountable for leading the operational team in planning, delivering, and evaluating PCN programs and services in support of the PCN's vision, mission, and Business Plan. The Executive Director will develop and maintain strong working relationships with key stakeholders and leaders to provide operational leadership and oversee all related programs and services. The Executive Director establishes and maintains positive relationships with essential local, provincial, and national representatives and healthcare stakeholders, including government departments and officials.

McLeod River and Bighorn PCNs are geographically neighbours and serve similar patient populations with similar healthcare needs. We share common programming and have some patient care flow between our communities. We have had some success with shared executive and administrative leadership and are looking to share an Executive Director. The position has some flexibility, while being located in one of our communities is preferential, we are open to virtual options for a strong candidate. Intermittent travel to our communities will be required at times (e.g.: board meetings, AGMs, staff meetings, town halls, etc.)
