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## Instant spring at Twin Acres as the local greenhouse opens for the season













Those craving playing in the dirt and planting various plants in their gardens and beds can get their fix at Twin Acres Greenhouse. The locally-owned business opened a week ahead of schedule, kicking off the season on Friday, April 21.

Twin Acres Greenhouse just opened for its third year. Area gardeners were ready to walk through the pink greenhouse door the very moment the sign flipped to open. Owner Vanessa Long said she is excited to be open for the season and is happy to see so many people eager to walk through the aisles, dreaming of flower-filled baskets and beds.

The most significant change for the local greenhouse this year is a massive jump in space. The "pink door" greenhouse gives a few thousand extra square feet. "We now have 65 different types of hanging baskets, with different sizes and a massive variety within the greenhouse. You can do a lot more fun things with this much space. I have fun shopping for it," smiled Long.

When she first opened Twin Acres, named after her adorable twins, Long had a vision of what she wanted it to become. The growth over the last couple of years has gotten her closer to her goals of becoming a full-time greenhouse and having a U-pick operation. "It is still being researched and dreamed about, but there are lots of plans in the works."

She said she is going down to central Alberta this summer once the greenhouse closes for the season. "I will be checking out some greenhouses doing some neat berry productions. Things you would grow in the lower mainland that you can't grow here, we can grow in a greenhouse here even raspberries. There's a new program coming

out of Eastern Canada. They are in the soil, but you are fertilizing with hydroponics, and they are in a greenhouse, not outdoors."

With over 3000 perennials in the blue greenhouse, Long said they could lower their prices because they are growing them on-site rather than buying them from someone else. "We can set our prices a lot easier and do a lot more variety that way too. The only thing we will bring in will be the hardwood products like trees and shrubs and

some of the vines."

For the U-pick dream, Long said they would be doing some testing. "We have to do some soil sampling to see if we are going to have a U-pick in the ground or if we are going to put it into greenhouses. It wouldn't technically be a U-pick then, but it would expand us." Long said she could feel the momentum. "There are lots of really busy things happening at the moment."

For gardeners planning their yards, Long said one of the big trends this year is to try something different. "For us, in the greenhouse, we are trying some different things because we know shortages are coming. There's likely a dracaena or spike shortage coming next year. If people buy them this year, you should overwinter them because you may not get them next year."

Spikes are a common addition to flower baskets as they give height to the finished product. To work around the potential shortage next year, Long said she is trying out different grasses that provide a similar effect as the spikes. Blue Mohawk grass is one grass they've used this year. Long said they've never had a spike shortage before but are having fun finding new items to use instead.

For colours, Long said two are standing out this year as hot commodities. "Oranges and purples are big this year. Many new plants that have come out this year that seem to be trending and are selling out the fastest have purples and oranges."

Long said Martha Washington Geraniums are an excellent option for new gardeners or those who tend to sacrifice plants accidentally. "Geraniums are like your best friend. They are really easy to maintain with very little deadheading. They can handle the heat. They can suntan with you on the deck and will love it. They aren't going to wilt and shrivel. If you forget to water them one day, you're ok! But, if you forget to water your petunias, they won't be happy."

She added that low maintenance is another theme. "A lot of our hanging baskets are geared towards low maintenance because that's my stage of life," she chuckled. "Our signature baskets this year are also low maintenance. There are ivy geraniums in them, a trailing geranium; you don't have to do anything to it. We took the petunias out because they are high maintenance." As the business namesake, Long's twins are the signature baskets' primary focus, which features pink and blue hues.

People growing their food is also a trend sticking around. Long said that people started dabbling in it through the pandemic and that last year, with skyrocketing prices for vegetables like lettuce and tomatoes, people started getting more serious with it. Long said her other greenhouse has 400 tomato plants thriving in it. "They are already six feet tall, and they have ripening tomatoes. We hope to have ripe tomatoes off the vine by mid-May."

Long said she's also been playing around with peppers and has four kinds. "I've never grown peppers to this extent in a greenhouse. It's a special variety that will grow up to twenty feet tall. Also, the vine of the tomato plants will be up 25 feet long, if not 30 feet, especially with the ones that are already six feet."

Though planting in gar dens and flower beds is still a little ways away, Long said it'd be here soon enough. "We don't have snow like we did last year at this time, but it was warmer. Every time my furnaces turn on, it's graphed, and you can compare it year after year. Last year we were not as cold at night as we are right now. The days warm up more, but we are colder at night than last year." She invites everyone to walk through the pink greenhouse door for an instant mood boost while they wait for the frost to disappear.

#### ANNUAL VEGETATION MANAGEMENT PROGRAM



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## A good shock for the Whitecourt Food Bank as a matching grant doubles December's donations

A last-minute grant opportunity at the end of 2022 proved to be a game changer for the Whitecourt Food Bank. Through December, the provincial government matched every financial donation made to the food bank up to \$50,000. When the clock struck midnight on December 31, 2022, the Whitecourt Food Bank had received \$49,759 in donations. As good as it could get.

"All the companies and people that had donated enabled this grant to happen, and they didn't even know about it. It's a pretty cool thing between the community and the government and how it came together. They turned \$50,000 into \$100,000, just like that," said Lori Coffey, Food Bank Manager.

"That's our busiest month for donations, so it couldn't have been a better month for this to happen. When I found out that they would be offering this grant and that December was the chosen month to match donations, I knew it would be good. There's no other month we get the same amount of donations."

Last week, MLA Martin Long attended the food bank to see what was purchased with the money. Coffey showed him the new sorting table they bought and said Long was genuinely excited about it, just as they were to show it off. "He understood the value of having that table and what it meant to us. We appreciated having him here to see it."

The sorting table is like a massive counter that

enables volunteers and staff to pack up to ten perishable boxes without setting up single tables to form a space, which they did previously. The table also has a storage space underneath. Before, any items stored under the tables were on the floor. Now, storage is up, off the floor.

Coffey said the funding also enabled her to hire another staff member. With extra help in place, Coffey focused on grant writing and has already brought in \$66,000. Coffey said she uses grants to pay for staffing, rent, and necessary upgrades like the sorting table and bins. "We bought bins and totes with this grant funding, and it's much better for us. It's safer to use heavy-duty totes than

it is to use random boxes that break down over time. It's safer for all of us to work."

Coffey also purchased rolling carts. Rather than move heavy boxes around, the rolling carts make moving things easier and safer, saving the backs of volunteers. "I can't afford to buy these things, so this grant enabled me to bring it in. This grant was enormous for us to receive. It has boosted the food bank to where it needed to be."

Along with a meat purchase, since meat is exorbitantly expensive, and a food order, Coffey spent every cent of the grant on the most impactful things she could think of. As she made the purchases, Coffey said she continually thought of the local busi-

nesses and people who made it all possible by donating funds in December. "We are such a strong community. I wondered how close I would get to the \$50,000, and we got there. That's this community, though. They are so supportive in a way that is just amazing. Not all food banks get the support we do here. The community of Whitecourt backs us, supports us, and makes this happen. They ensure we can meet the needs of people who need our help."

Every cent goes to food when residents and businesses donate cash to the food bank. The matching grant was the first time the provincial government had offered such a program. Coffey said she hopes to see it continue. "It's getting worse for people. The number of people we help is increasing. I needed more people to handle that and more resources." Coffey said they give out 250 perishable boxes each month. Perishable boxes keep food waste down by getting it into the hands of those who can use it and need it. No identification is required to grab one, and they are given out multiple times a week. Coffey said on top of that, they do around 200 intakes a month too.

The grants Coffey succeeded in getting so far this year have enabled her to provide extra fruits and vegetables in hampers. She said grants that fund this type of addition are not typical, and she is happy to have enough

funding for the fresh foods through the end of the year. "I want fresh, healthy, and good wholesome hampers."

Those wanting to donate, who are still deciding what to buy, are encouraged to grab toiletries. Coffey said families with empty food cupboards have bare cupboards everywhere else in the home. She likes to provide items that would typically run out, such as toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorant, shampoo/ conditioner etc., but they must be donated. "This isn't possible without support from the community. We are humbled and grateful for the support. It's about community members helping their community, and this community rocks at it."





A late 2022 opportunity flipped the switch for the Whitecourt Food Bank. Every cash donation made in December was inflated thanks to a matching grant that took an already huge donation pile and grew it.

An adult witness to the signature of each petitioner must sign opposite the petitioner's signature stating that to the best of the person's knowledge the signatures witnessed are those of a petitioner who is entitled to sign the petition. All affidavits must be attached to the petition. ## You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown







The Pumpjack Players youth production is coming up soon. Based on the popular Peanuts comic strip created by Charles M. Schulz, which first hit newspapers in October 1950. The play features 28 area children eager to showcase their hard work to the public and a beautiful, hand-drawn backdrop sure to wow.

If you are a fan of the Peanuts comic strip, the Pumpjack Players have a treat in store for you. This year's youth production, You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown, is a play centred around the beloved comic and features all the favourite characters. Tara Bartsch and Billie-Jo House have co-directed the youth productions since 2017. After years of waiting, both are eager to get the play onto the stage. "It was originally supposed to run three years ago. We were a month and a half from show dates when COVID

hit. So, it got cancelled," explained Bartsch.

After three years of waiting, most of the original cast did not return, but thankfully, a new group of kids stepped up to the task. "We are back with a 90 percent brand new cast and ten percent remaining cast. A couple of our leads were replaced this time, but we still had a core group from the original cast."

Bartsch said the group had to repurchase the script rights to the play as the timeline from the first purchase had expired. "Luckily, we had already bought most of the cos-

tumes like Snoopy, and we had the dog house already built, so many props were already built and ready to go. That saved us."

She said the children are doing very well. "The kids are off script, and we are all good to go. We are just trying to fine-tune everything, get tech ready, and decorate the set. Everything else is pretty much finished." The kids learned twenty-two songs for the play, which Bartsch said is much more complicated than a non-musical production. "It's extremely difficult because it's different characters learning different songs. It's hard to sing songs, act and do choreography, but they've done amazing. We also have choir this year."

The choir was a new thing added to the play by Pumpjack Players after so many children tried out. "We didn't want to turn any kids away. The play only calls for six kids, but we wanted to include as many as possible. These kids needed somewhere to go and something to be part of," said Bartsch.

She said watching the kids grow and learn and realize how amazing they are is always a beautiful part of the process. "Kids think they can't do anything. When you start the show, they say, I can't do this. When they realize that they can do it, it's pretty amazing. They've worked so hard. These kids were off-book for at least three weeks before we asked them to be offbook. They know their lines, and they know lines that aren't even theirs. Charlie Brown couldn't make it yesterday, and they knew all his lines and songs. They are ready."

You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown features all the familiar faces comic fans love. "You'll see everyone you know: Charlie Brown, Lucy, Sally, and the Woodstock birds. We've added extra birds to the play to make it even more adorable. We also have the background characters, Shermy and Pig-Pen, that you'll hopefully recognize, and more," said Bartsch.

Ten-year-old Blaise Crossland is in his first-ever Pumpjack Players production and said he is excited for the curtains to open on May 6 and May 7. "I think I'm more excited than nervous. A part of me is nervous, but



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


