





Cleaning up for cash is an excellent way for community groups to fill their piggy bank

The chance to earn cash while working as a team and helping clean up Whitecourt is available to those interested. The Town of Whitecourt's Community Cleanup Program is a yearly opportunity allowing non-profit organizations, sports teams, and other community groups to apply for access to funds in exchange for some elbow grease.

Chelsea Grande, Director of Community Services, was the acting CAO during a recent Town Council meeting and explained that groups would be cleaning up roadside ditches, playgrounds, and sports fields. "The program provides each group with a maximum of \$1,200 based on the number of hours worked," she said.

"To date, six groups have applied for the program. Administration is recommending that the tion for the 2023 program is \$9,600. If all six teams complete 100 hours of work, funding would still be left over. Grande said Council could allow the Administration to select other community groups that apply, up to the remainder of the budget.

Deputy Mayor Braden Lanctot asked if there was a map of where groups would be cleaning and when. He also asked if it was a spring-specific program or if groups could work on the areas throughout the summer. Kamruz Zaman, Director of Infrastructure Services, said groups had until the end of August, at which point the program would wrap up for the year.

He also explained that they would provide each group with a map of the areas. The Town of Whitecourt supplies picking sticks, gloves, and vests to keep volunteers safe. Groups are also provided with garbage bags and water bottles. Another part of the process is that groups must undergo mandatory safety training before heading out to clean. Volunteers could likely come across something hazardous or heavy, and the Town of Whitecourt wants them prepared to deal with it. Participants should avoid picking up broken glass, needles, syringes, or chemical/pesticide containers. Instead, they will flag those items with provided flag markers and mark the site on their maps. Town staff will then

return to dispose of the flagged items safely.

Groups must designate certain leadership positions, such as a first aid person, who is responsible for bringing along a first aid kit, and a managing supervisor who will keep everyone on track, make sure they are following safety rules and will manage the collection of provided supplies at the end of the day. For sports teams that want to participate, there must be one adult supervisor for every two children between 9-14 and one adult for ev-

ery five children between 15-17.

When asked if groups that complete their cleanup, and collect their funds, could apply again for another round if there was still funding in the budget left over, Zaman said yes. He explained that once

the first round of groups had completed their work and submitted their claim form for payment, if funding remained, they would select more groups to participate.

Zaman said that last year, only one group applied for the program. He said it was nice to see more groups using the program this year. When asked how large of an area the groups would be cleaning, Zaman explained that it was based on something other than distance or location size. "It depends on hours worked, not the area." He said the areas to be cleaned included along Highway 43 and Dahl Drive, Govenlock Road, Tower Road, and in parks and sports fields such as Rotary Park.

"When they finish in one, groups can go to the next area on the map if they need the hours," said Zaman. When groups apply, they specify the hours they will be cleaning for, either 50 or 100 hours, and will work in whatever areas on the map necessary to fill that quota. They will receive \$12 for each hour of service they complete. As cleaning occurs, groups will put up signage to inform motorists of their activity. Town of Whitecourt staff will pick up filled garbage bags after a group is finished. Town Council voted unanimously to approve the six applications presented and gave discretion to Administration to accept more applications up to the program's budget of \$9,600.

An adult witness to the signature of each petitioner must sign opposite the petitioner's signature stating that to the best of the person's knowledge the signatures witnessed are those of a petitioner who is entitled to sign the petition. All affidavits must be attached to the petition. Attention all artisans, farmers, bakers, jam aficionados, meat smokers, cake makers, jewellery designers, veggie growers, egg suppliers, knitters, herbalists, brewers, cooks, artists and everyone else who bakes, makes, or creates. This summer, the Whitecourt & District Chamber of Commerce is bringing a Saturday farmers market event to the community. The Fresh Community Market with kick off on June 24 and run for fourteen Saturdays through er's market isn't meant the summer before ending on September 23 and will take place in the Staples parking lot.

Chamber President Louise Meier said she is excited to get things rolling and hopes to see a packed parking lot come June 24. "It was on our radar and has been for probably four years. The feeling was there was this missing link with farmer's markets. Typically, they are on Saturdays, and we didn't have that here."

to take away from the Tuesday market held at the Whitecourt Legion. Instead, Meier said it compliments it because it gives producers another day to sell their products. "It gives them another day, another opportunity to market their product and get in front of residents," said Meier.

The idea was born from a couple of local producers who had set up booths in the Staples parking

lot on Saturdays last summer. "They had great success doing that." The two businesses, Shinning Moonlight Gardens and Twin Acres Greenhouse, had an arrangement with the property owner, Northern Developments, to use the space in the Staples parking lot last year. The pair approached the Whitecourt Chamber about putting on something more significant.

"Residents have been asking for it. The response has been tremendous. People say they can't wait for the market to start. It's surprising how many producers there are in the County. We hope they will get in here with their stuff and sell it," said Meier.

She said they would use the Staples parking lot area this summer but that next summer, they might change things up. "If we could've had it in Rotary Park, then we would've been there in a New York second. This was our second choice." Road construction at Rotary Park this summer was a deterrent, but Meier hopes they can use Festival Way as the market grows.

Meier explained that the market would be given an 80/20 split to keep things as local as possible. "Eighty percent has to be locally grown, produced, or made. Just because you have a homebased business doesn't mean it's a local product. That eighty-twenty split has to be solid."

A recently hired Market Manager will see that everything comes together smoothly and will handle all the behind-the-scenes intricacies. Sasha Stang, said Meier, will ensure everyone does what they need to so that the market runs efficiently. "The big part of what we want to do is promote our local producers. It's not a criteria to be a Chamber member to be in the farmer's market, but we certainly encourage it as there are a lot of benefits to being one," explained Meier.

The Whitecourt Chamber created a Facebook page for the event. Google forms are available there to apply. The forms are also on the www.whitecourtchamber.com website. Meier said that to keep the market orderly, vendors need to apply and be approved beforehand. She said there are also AHS requirements that must be followed. "If you are selling food, for instance, you must meet AHS's criteria. There are some rules and regulations that we need to follow so that we don't lose our license." All pertinent information will be provided to applicants.

Meier has experience running a farmer's market in Esterhazy, Saskatchewan, and is a big fan of the St. Albert farmer's market. She said her goal is to bring some of that experience to Whitecourt and help showcase the area's rich agricultural lands and the producers that call it home. She said musicians could even join and play for attendees. "There's lots of potential growth for something like this." The Fresh Community Market will run from 9 am to 1 pm every Saturday through the summer starting June 24. Vendor fees are \$15 for a full spot and \$10 for a half, with the option of purchasing a seasonal spot and saving a bit of cash. Storefront businesses can also get booths as long as they sell local products. "For example, Sagitawah Brewing Company could bring their products to sell, for consumption later, because they are made in Alberta. The

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
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


