hundreds of bags of food

On Wednesday morning, Food Banks Alberta, recognizing the increased need in Whitecourt as evacuees from Fox Creek descended on the community, reached out to the Whitecourt Food Bank to see what they could do to help. Director Lori Coffey accepted the help offer and listed what resources were needed. The only issue was the amount of food incoming would be more than they could handle with their van.

"I had nowhere to put that or sort it," explained Coffey. A call to Matthew Joyal, the Freight Operations Manager at Whitecourt Transport, solved her issues in seconds. "He literally saved the day. He is an amazing human being." Coffey said she explained the situation to Joyal and that he offered to go to Edmonton, pick up the food and bring it back to Whitecourt.

The help didn't stop there. "I told him we would pay to pick up the stuff in the city, and he said no way. He went to all the places, picked up all the food, and brought it to Whitecourt for free! He had to go to three different places to pick it up. Now, they are unloading it for us and letting us use their floor space in the bay to sort it. Now, that's how you do community!"

Roughly twenty volunteers, including coaches from Whitecourt Gymnastics and a couple of their athletes, and families from Whitecourt and Fox Creek joined Coffey and Roxanne Grumbach, Fox Creek Food Bank Coordinator, to sort and pack as many bags as possible.

"We've lived here for almost seven years, and we've got three kids, and we are pretty immersed in the community with hockey, football, and soccer. We love being here. It seemed natural to help out, and it's a great cause," said Joyal. "Many people, at some point in

demolition happen, and Community Lunchbox Society Chair Tara Baker said they are grateful. "Today was possible because of the kindness and generosity of a few local companies stepping up and offering to help us. Roszko Construction, JT Enterprises and TriJet Services went above and beyond."

Baker said they'd owned the land beside

their main office for six years. "It takes a lot of work and planning to demolish buildings. We spent last year doing all the proper inspections and making sure there was no asbestos. We made sure it was safe. Removing old buildings is a lot more in-depth than we first realized."

Baker said one phone call was all it took to get the ball rolling. "One of the coolest things is that our board member, Kristina, reached out, and they (TriJet Services, JT Enterprises, and Roszko Construction) all started to work together because their understanding of this process is a lot more than ours. Once Christina made the call, it was done and organized within just a few days. We are really thankful."

She said community partners make all the difference. "Millar Western, right before they became Canfor, donated money to this project, and Chevron recently donated to it too. It's because of these community partners that this is happening. Last year, David Green Tree Services removed a tree for us. That's another great community supporter." Baker said GFL and Local Environmental also played roles in the project, offering their support. She also said the

neighbours in the area were supportive too.

As Baker spoke to the Whitecourt Press, the demolition was actively taking place before her. When asked what it felt like to be watching it happen, finally, Baker was almost without words. "Oh. It's super awesome to watch this house go down," she paused, thinking momentarily. "It's such a blessing for us. We've had big hopes and dreams for the lot next door since we bought it. Doing things will be easier once the structure isn't there."

Having the empty house removed also came down to safety, which Baker said was a big concern. "That's why it sat empty for quite a few years, but in the last vear, safety became a concern which is why we knew we had to take it down this spring." Baker said all the utilities were removed during the process, leaving them with a fresh piece of land, which she called "exciting."

One of the original plans for the property was to build a community kitchen. "We did the research, and we applied for funding and were successful, but when it came down to it, we identified that it wasn't necessarily the direction we wanted to go." Baker said one of the strengths of the CLB

team is their ability to pivot as necessary. "We are allowed to dream, and ultimately, we will make the most responsible decision."

With the kitchen out of the plans, Baker said they are excited to move forward. "Our immediate plan is to sod the property and then take it back to our group of CLB members. Many have mentioned that they would like a green space to do some gardening and connect as a group. So, we will be looking at different green space options."

Whatever they create on the property, Baker said it would be made intentionally accessible. "It will be a useable, accessible green space for the benefit of the society, our members, and the whole community." She added that the CLB team is focused on expanding the meaningful part-time employment they offer. The accessible grounds will mean that someone approaching them to be included in the organization won't be held back because of an accessibility barrier.

Baker said they would start creating the space this summer. "Our members want to spend more time together when the weather is nice and do something collectively, learn, and have something to show for it. We asked our team what they would want, and it's to grow stronger." The demolition began at 9 am on Thursday last week, and by 10 am, the house was already halfway gone. By lunchtime, the Roszko excavator was rolling on top of where the house used to stand, crumpling the debris into smaller pieces, and depositing them into the JT Enterprises dump truck. "This is amazing," said Baker as she watched.

Local businesses that want to partner with or sponsor the accessible green space project are encouraged to reach out. Baker said the CLB is always open and grateful to receive support. She said they are also saving for a newer truck to replace their van. "The van doesn't allow more than two people inside at a

time. It's been awesome for us and served its purpose, but we need something that allows more volunteers to ride along." Baker said she hopes

Baker said she hopes residents appreciate the effort to beautify the area and increase safety now that the empty house is no longer an issue. "We spoke to our neighbours in the area. It already looks so much better. I can see into the downtown now!"

From September to the end of April, the CLB provided 2,189 breakfasts and 6,792 lunches to area students. They've provided 369 bags of apples, 82 boxes of apples, 555 small muffins and 927 big ones. They've also provided 216 yogurt tubes, 479 banana bunches and 559 granola bars. Full bellies



their lives, rely on the food bank, whether they admit it or not. It's one of the most fundamental, important things that the community has to offer. We fully support it. I do personally, and the company does. Lori is full of energy and great to work with, and we will help her out anytime she needs it."

Joyal said the roles could easily be reversed. "We were so close to us needing it here in White-court. We didn't get evacuated yet, but it's always possible. It's different to see this in here and not freight, but I'm floored with how everybody is working so hard and is targeted and goal-oriented and knows what they are doing. I'm pretty proud."

Joyal has worked at Whitecourt Transport for five years and has been in the Freight Operations Manager position for a year and a half. "It goes to the core values of the company. This company has been around for about 70 years, and I'm very lucky to be part of it for the last five years. They've always been involved in different things. So, I'm not inventing anything new; it's just continuing the pattern. We have extremely supportive owners; when we brought this idea up with them, they didn't hesitate. They said go for it." Joyal said they would continue playing a role. "We will do it again and again if we need to."

Coffey said she was beyond grateful. "This right now would not be happening if not for Whitecourt Transport. There's no way. They enabled the pickup and are giving us space to go through it and pack it up. People are going to get food thanks to them stepping up like they did. Our goal right now is to make sure 600 people get to eat for five days. After five days, we will re-evaluate what we need to do."

For Grumbach, working to help her Fox Creek community while she deals with the stress of leaving her home, just as everyone else has, watching the support come together was touching. She had worked long hours at the Millar Centre since her arrival, helping answer questions and linking people to resources. "I think people are going to be grateful. Many people coming to the Millar Centre to eat have been concerned about buying groceries and aren't able to cook in their hotel rooms, so having this food that they can eat without a lot of preparation, will help."

Bags included water bottles, granola bars, cereal, crackers and fruits and vegetables. "It is a big undertaking, and it's a lot of food that's going out to people. Even people who were not regular food bank users back in Fox Creek may not have had the financial means or weren't prepared with their banking situations to have extra groceries over and above what they already had in their houses, so it affects everybody. Everybody is going to benefit from this because everybody gets hungry."

Evacuees could pick up a bag at the AJMC each day. "This way, they will have a bag of food to take with them and will be able to eat throughout the day and feel more secure about how much food they have," explained Grumbach.

She added that the support from Whitecourt and Fox Creek businesses in keeping suppers happening each day has been tremendous. "Those dinners have taken the pressure off families for where they will eat that day. A huge thank you to all the Whitecourt and Fox Creek companies that have stepped up to do that." She said she was also grateful for Coffey's support. "It's so generous. I'm so happy."

While sorting food at Whitecourt Transport, Coffey was nearly brought to tears when a donation was handed to her. "As we are here working, Stitch and Time showed up to give us \$1000 because they figured that we could use it while we are going through this. The fact that it wasn't asked for, and Tyler Perrin just showed up and handed me money, is incredible. That's this community! Whitecourt is awesome!"

Perrin, whose daughter was one of the youths helping pack bags, said those who can help should help. He also said that it's important to get the youth involved too. "It's nice to help, especially when other communities are in need like this. Whitecourt always seems to come through, and it's nice to be part of that."

Town Council receives final provincial update from MLA Long before election



MLA Martin Long recently provided Whitecourt Town Council with an update from the provincial government on provincial growth and projects. His update comes just a handful of weeks ahead of the provincial election. Long touched on various subjects from industry to local healthcare spending and how Alberta compares to other provinces.

At a recent Whitecourt Town Council meeting, MLA Martin Long presented a yearly update of provincial and local matters. Through the last few years, Long and other MLAs haven't been able to provide in-person updates to councils. Long said he was happy to return to the routine, with one difference being a looming election.

"I appreciate the work and efforts you as Council have put into continuing to move our community and our region forward. You all didn't sign up for an easy term. You signed up to lead our community, and inevitably through thick and thin, you guys have done that and set an example in that leadership," he said, addressing Council.

Long said his update would focus on the positives he has seen over the last year. "Our province has seen a drastic turn from an economic standpoint. We are leading the country in job creation. We have been setting the bar on that for over a year now, and what's exciting for me is how quietly

we've done it. In essence, we've taken what many perceive Alberta to be, a resource-based economy, and we've expanded that exponentially."

Long said that there were over a hundred thousand job openings in Alberta and that many people had moved to the province. "We have seen 46 thousand people move to Alberta from other provinces in just over a year. We've seen 120 thousand people move to Alberta since last August from all jurisdictions, including the other provinces. And simply, the reason is that this is a land of opportunity."

He felt there were a few factors for the influx of new residents. "Alberta has the highest base rate before you pay any income tax, of any province, by three thousand dollars. We also obviously have no PST, and we have lower housing prices compared to other big centres, with Edmonton and Calgary in particular when you compare them with Toronto, Mississauga, and Vancouver, and other big centres." Long added that Alberta having the "highest average weekly earnings of any province" was likely also a draw. "People want to come out and earn more money while they are young and able to work."

Continuing with his update, Long said the growth seen provincewide wasn't just in one sector. "It's not just in oil and gas. It's not just in forestry. It's not just in agriculture. It's not just mining and aggregate. We've got opportunities in technology too. We've seen over 700 million invested in tech over the last year. Five years ago, that number was 30 million dollars. It's booming."

Long said one of the recent announcements that caught his attention involved the movement of 300 jobs moving to Alberta from Ontario by RBC. "The reason that caught my attention is that we would typically expect RBC to put those jobs on Main Street, in Ontario. Pulling them directly out of the financial district in Ontario and moving them to Alberta is, to me, a good



A sub-committee was established to further strengthen the relationship with Indigenous partners and promotion of Indigenous inclusion. The sub-committee consists of the Reeve and Councillor Deane who will begin the outreach and consultation with Indigenous partners to establish a meaningful recognition.

Woodlands North was awarded the Watercourse Crossing Remediation Survey for a grant amount of \$80,000. The provincially funded watercourse crossing remediation program is designed for municipalities to inspect road crossing culverts that may impact potential Athabasca trout habitats.

Council approved the 2023 Budget adjustments for the 2023 Operating Budget and Capital Budget. The budget is adjusted prior to setting the tax rate ensuring all projects and services are funded for the year.

indicator that we are moving in the right direction, and more will come."

Long spoke about the province's Film and Tax Credit and the attention Alberta is getting because of it. "We've seen a lot of activity in southern Alberta over the years, and we look to expand that across the province as we move forward with that tax credit. Having the largest production in Canadian history (The Last of Us) happening here in Alberta is getting us a lot of attention on the global stage."

He touched on the renewable energy sector, saying the growth there was significant, especially with hydrogen advancements, and also touched on oil and gas, saying he expects the industry to grow for decades to come, "and I say decades at a minimum." Long said he was "very optimistic about the future of Alberta and Canadian energy," adding that Alberta is making a name for itself globally "as a responsible provider of energy."

provincial Another

sector, agriculture, will continue to expand, said Long, as food security continues to be "on most people's minds." Wrapping up the conversation, Long said, "I have a lot of excitement when I sit and talk about opportunities now and in the future for our province." One concern he had, though, was if the message had gotten out enough.

Healthcare, including Whitecourt receiving a few million dollars in the most recent provincial budget, was the final topic touched on in his update. Long also pointed out that mental health spending increased to over a billion, with a \$150 million jump. "In our most recent budget, we did announce a three million dollar allocation for the community of Whitecourt for planning. It was a very important day for me to read that in our budget documents that the Whitecourt Healthcare Centre is being acknowledged." Long said that he will be waiting, like those before him at the Council table and community members, "to see what comes out of that planning process."




