Monday, May 29, proved positive for Martin Long, re-elected to serve the West Yellowhead constituency, garnering just over 70 percent of the votes in the riding. With four more years to look forward to, Long sat down with

the Whitecourt Press to discuss his thoughts on the most recent election and his party's plan for the next 48 months.

Having gone through two elections, Long said he respects those who put their names forward. "It's a lot of work going through an

election campaign and everything that leads up to that. I spoke with Mr. Kreiner (NDP) on election night and thanked him for putting his name forward and running a relatively clean campaign in West Yel-










Test runs on a few changes at Festival Park, include no cooking zone





Increasing safety and enjoyment for those who use Festival Park is the focus behind a few pilot projects on trial this summer. A no-cooking zone and new spots for picnic tables are two of the changes recently voted on by Town Council.

Some changes, which included new picnic tables, have been made to the grounds at Festival Park. Whitecourt Town Council voted to make the changes and update Policy 72-004 Rental of Festival Park at their 4 pm May 23 Regular Meeting held at the Forest Interpretive Centre. The changes and policy updates were first discussed in January at Council's Strategic Planning Session and, most recently, at the Policies and Priorities Committee meeting on May 15. Policy updates included the name change from Rotary Park to Festival Park.

Chelsea Grande, Director of Community Services, explained that the Community Services Advisory Board (CSAB) looked into placing a no-cooking zone at Festival Park to alleviate some of the

concerns that Council had identified at their Strategic Planning Session. At their May 15 Policies and Priorities Committee (P&P) meeting, Council recommended increasing the size of the no-cooking zone even further.

When looking at the aerial view of Festival Park (as shown from the agenda package), the no-cooking zone encompasses the entire lower portion of grass from the pathway beside the splash park to the bottom end of the river slides. Council's recommendation creased the area to include the grass space closest to the main bathroom building, directly behind the splash park and up to the edge of the lower river slide.

Visitors who wish to cook while spending time at Festival Park can use other areas, including the pavilion and playground shelter. The no-cooking zone is a trial implementation and aims to remove cooking from the areas with the heaviest traffic. Temporary signs are already up to let visitors know where not to set up if they plan to cook.

"We are looking at this as temporary. We are going to be looking at the no cooking zone over the summer and seeing where people migrate to cook and then (will) bring it back Council possibly for more placement of picnic tables and pads to support cooking in other areas," explained Grande. "The other items that we reviewed were the parking lot garbage cans, portable structures, and public placement of sun shelters." said Grande. adding that the CSAB members had recently visited Festival Park for a closer look. The CSAB didn't have any recommendations concerning changes to parking or sunshades at this time.

Grande explained that the flaps on the garbage cans in the parking lot had been removed. "You'll see that people are utilizing them. and there isn't as much garbage around them, so hopefully, that continues throughout this summer." Last summer, more garbage cans were added to the park to help with busy days and higher user traffic. The garbage cans in the parking lot area had round hole covers that had to be pushed to access the bin. However, they were harder to push, and the hole was small, resulting in park visitors leaving garbage at the bin's base rather than inside it. Grande said the change in mechanics, removing the lids, was being done as a

trial and that they would continue promoting the idea of visitors taking home their cardboard, from inflatables or food, for proper recycling.

Another addition to Festival Park is more picnic tables. During the review of Festival Park, CSAB members noted that there wasn't anywhere to sit close to the parking lot or along the pathway. As per the meeting package, the CSAB wanted picnic tables closer to access points for those who didn't necessarily want to use the other amenities at the park but would like to have a picnic.

The board listed adding picnic tables as its number one priority for 2024. Before adding permanent structures, Administration recommended trialling the ideas this year by adding temporary picnic tables to see how

it goes. "The portable picnic tables are there in areas by the parking lot, and people were using them," said Grande, speaking to the early success of the trial.

After the season ends, data compiled about the different trials on the go will help guide the CSAB and Town of Whitecourt Administration in recommending any necessary changes such as permanent signage, extra picnic tables with cement pads, or any other changes they feel Council should know about for potential implementation in 2024.

Facts about the no-cooking zone will be shared publicly to help create awareness. The meeting package said that park staff would be responsible for enforcement of the zone in partnership with the fire department, bylaw officers and RCMP.

Fun for all ages at local gymkhana event

On Saturday, June 10 and Sunday, June 11, equestrian skills were on full display at the Whitecourt Agricultural Grounds for a Fun Show & Gymkhana hosted by the Woodlands Lac Ste. Anne Gymkhana Club. For those unfamiliar with the word "gymkhana" and what it means, it describes an event that features timed athletic skills performed on horseback or behind the wheel of a car. For this event and purpose, it describes the former; skills on horseback done on tight constricting courses meant to put athletes and their horses to the test.

Club treasurer Erin Barber, who also sits on the Whitecourt District Agricultural Society board and is part of the Westward Riders Horse Club, said she is excited to see everyone enter the ring.

"Gymkhana is riding for everybody. We have riders that are two years old and riders who are 80. There are so many divisions. Since there are peewee, junior, intermediate, ladies' men's and senior's divisions, it's kind of adjusted to suit everybody. The kids do barrels, poles, stakes and keyholes, and the adults do barrels, noles stakes, and flags."

Each event is de-

signed to push riders through a tight course, showing off their abilities to work cooperatively with their horse as they maneuver around intricately placed stakes, drums, chalk outlines, or poles. Though timed and still competitive, riders don't have to worry about hitting a particular mark or reaching a specific time, hence the name "fun show."

"It's like our kick-off to the summer. It's a welcome to Gymkhana type of thing and is exactly what the name says because it's just for fun. We spend \$2500 on prizes, and it's a good, fun day for everyone," explained Barber. "We are not registering times here. During the weekly gymkhana events, you can pay five dollars and register your times, which can help qualify you for finals later this season. You don't need to qualify for this event, though I think there's some added money. It's just for fun, where people can ask questions and figure it out. You don't have to be in full Western attire, either. You must be in full Western attire when you show (compete), or you are disqualified, but not in the fun show."

The Woodlands Lac Ste. Anne Gymkhana Club meets every second Friday, but once

school goes on summer break, they will switch to every Wednesday. As mentioned, riders can pay to register their times during the weekly events. The fun show is different because it allows riders to practice their skills in a similar setting as a competition, without all the pressures that a competition may bring a rider, such as qualification, recorded times, attire, etc.

Riders have many opportunities to add to their time count throughout the season. "Since we are affiliated with the Edmonton Gymkhana Association, there are six different clubs, and each of those clubs holds a trophy day, and there are provincials too. To make

it to provincials, it's a top ten in each division through all the clubs. So, you have to be pretty good to get into the finals," explained Barber. She said having a competition-like event, such as the fun show, is nice to help riders find their groove right at the beginning of the season.

The fun show also helps introduce new members to the sport and how it works. "We have so many new riders joining us, as quite a few new families have moved here." She said four new families had recently moved to the area and joined.

Riders will attend countless weekend competitions throughout the summer as they try to rack up enough points to make it into the finals. "We do a trophy day on August-long weekend, though the date is being changed for this year because the Whitecourt Rodeo's date had to be changed. So, we will be figuring that out. Then, we do our Fall Classic, which is September long weekend. That's our biggest event where we will have around 75 riders and about 200 people out for dinner," said Barber. "The August event has about \$3,000 in prizes, and the September Classic has \$20,000 in prizes. It's a big show."

The Fun Show & Gymkhana began in 1997. "That was at the rodeo grounds when they were still in town, in Whitecourt. So, it's a long-running event, mi-

nus a few Covid years. You can ride English or Western, and the smiles on all the kid's faces are great to see. I don't have little kids anymore as my daughter who rides is 19, but I still do this for the little kids," said Barber.

The event ran all weekend, with spectators coming and going to watch the action and cheer on the athletes. Saturday featured barrels, poles, stakes, flags, and keyhole-timed events. In contrast, Sunday featured various games and patterns, including scrambled eggs, toilet paper pairs, musical apples, thread the needle, paired foot race, and double barrels. Many families camped on-site and shared potluck meals.

Supernault was brought before a Justice of the Peace where he did not speak to bail and has been remanded into custody with his next court date set for June 12, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Evansburg.

lowhead."

Moving forward, Long said it's about working together. "I made it clear in my first term, and I stand by this now being re-elected, (that) my role as the MLA is to represent 52,000 people whether they voted for me or not. That's what I think I've displayed for the first four years, and many folks that I've met and chatted with have told me that."

Long said he sees his colleagues who make up the opposition as those who may have

differing views but ultimately want the same result as him, which is a better Alberta. Long said his goal continues to be focused on maintaining relationships for the betterment of the residents in his riding.

"It's easier to get accomplished things through relationships. Sometimes there's politics in politics, and I've chosen not to get into some of that and instead treat all colleagues, both government and opposition, with respect, and from that standpoint, try to get the things that my constituents need in West Yellowhead

accomplished by that relationship. Each community has their own specific agenda items. My approach is to have my colleagues pick up the phone when I call and tell them what we need in West Yellowhead."

In speaking with constituents on the campaign trail, Long said he heard concerns about health care and affordability. "We've been making a lot of progress in a short period of time on health care with coming out of the pandemic and starting to make headway on the waitlist for certain surgeries and

lowering EMS response times. On affordability, we have the lowest level of inflation in the country based on some of the affordability measures we've taken." Long added that they still need more time to get things "righted."

One big concern Long said he heard involved the storyline that residents would supposedly have to pay out of pocket to see their physicians should the UCP be re-elected. Long didn't mince words. "You won't have to pay to see your doctor. There are no plans to privatize healthcare. I am very open with folks that the Canadian Health Act doesn't allow for us to privatize healthcare, not that there would be any plans to anyway."

Looking to the future, Long said he is excited about what he sees. "There are some really exciting things on the horizon. One that will impact every Albertan, and I think it's been a long time coming, is lowering taxes on the first \$60,000 of income. That will help every Alberta household, and I'm excited to see initiatives like that where a government is purposely trying to create less tax burden on its citizens."

He said continuing to grow the economy was another positive point on the list. "We've got so much momentum right now. We have the leading economy in the country, and we have the most diversified economy in Alberta history," said Long, also mentioning the UCP's two back-to-back balanced budgets.

"We need opportunities for our kids and grandkids for the future, and we will do that by not passing on our debt burdens to them and by having a strong economy for them to enter the workforce and create opportunities for them and their own families." Long said the UCP would continue to "attract investors, businesses, and companies into Alberta."

Long said he looks forward to continuing to advocate for West Yellowhead residents and is honoured by voters' trust. "The democracy that we get to have in our country and our province is such a key component of our makeup. 
There were 24 voting locations throughout West Yellowhead and 36,648 eligible voters listed. From those, 20,135 votes were cast. MLA Long garnered 14.456 votes, equating to 71.8 percent. The Allan & Jean Millar Centre voting location saw the most votes cast in West Yellowhead, with 9,229. Edson was second with 8,244, and the Hinton Centre was third with 7,797. The combined voter turnout for West Yellowhead was 55.4 percent, just shy of the provincial turnout of 59.5 percent.

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Woodlands County Council recap

Woodlands County Council discussed the following items at their recent meeting of Council:

Gary Redmond, Yvonne Barker, and Dan Moore with the West Central Airshed Society were in attendance to provide an overview of their organization and their work monitoring air quality. Council approved payment of \$1,500 for membership into the organization and requested more information about the air quality monitoring stations be brought back to Council.

Council passed Bylaw 597/23 – Advertising which allows Woodlands County to advertise municipal notices such as bylaws, meetings, and public hearings, online through the County's website and social media in addition to printing notices in newspapers and other local publications. The County will be utilizing a hybrid approach with notifications in print published in a condensed manner and more details posted on the website.

Woodlands County will enter into an agreement with the Province of Alberta for the development of the Centre of Alberta. The Centre of Alberta is a provincial natural area located off Highway 33 northwest of Fort Assiniboine. Under the Recreation, Ecosystems and Lands Program (REaL), the province will conduct

all surveys, investigations, assessments, capital works and large maintenance items such as large vandalism repairs. Woodlands County would be responsible for the regular maintenance of the area once development is complete. Development of the site is expected to take two to three years.

The next scheduled Council meeting is Wednesday, June 21, 2023, 9:30 am. The meeting is held in-person at the Municipal Office in Whitecourt and streamed on the Woodlands County YouTube channel. Agenda packages are available on the Woodlands County CivicWeb Portal.

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
