When Yellowknife residents received evacuation orders on Wednesday, August 16, 22,000 people had one mission: get out before Friday at noon. With fears of losing

highway access and air traffic being unable to get residents out if they waited any longer, authorities made the difficult decision to order everyone out.

Residents from Yellowknife and near-

by Ndilo and Dettah communities could fly out or drive out and had several places to go. Photos of the long traffic lines heading south down the high-

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Council Chat - How best to help in the event of a catastrophic event in Woodlands County, be it wildfire or flood

Early this summer, Woodlands County Council motioned for their Administration to bring back a revised version of Policy 62-04 – Relief Assistance for Catastrophic Events. Created in 2008, the policy's intent at the onset was to provide \$1,000 to a homeowner whose home was destroyed by fire. While discussing flood-affected homeowners, Council decided to look into updating the policy and include other means of devastation, like floods or natural disasters. It also raised concerns about what would happen should a wildfire decimate the County, resulting in a staggering bill.

In mid-August, the County Council re-

ceived a draft policy with updates. Joan Slootweg, Manager of Community & Planning Services, said the policy was intended to support in the immediate aftermath of a house fire, helping a homeowner get a hotel room or personal items. "In 2012, it was amended to then include, because often it seemed to be that mobile homes were the ones that were being destroyed, an additional amount of another \$1,000 for landfill fees so they could take that destroyed mobile home and put it to the landfill," explained Slootweg.

Changes brought forward to Council for the proposed revision included updating the eligibility of what con-

stitutes a catastrophic event. In the newly created form attached to the policy, residents are asked for details on what kind of catastrophic event affected

their primary residence. Within the definitions and eligibility portion of the policy, the amendment reads "due to fire, wildfire, flood, weather event, or other

natural disaster."

A resident seeking support under the policy must be in good standing with the municipality, have current taxes paid, have not

received other financial assistance from the County, like vouchers for accommodations or food due to evacua-

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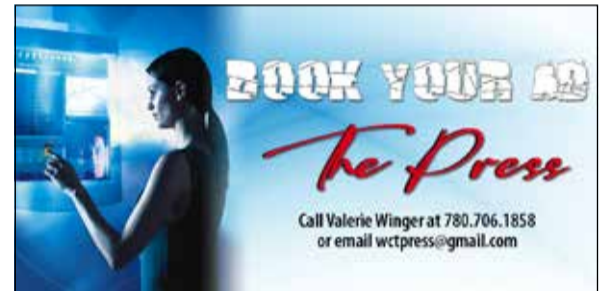

way showed the seriousness of evacuating a large municipality with bumper-to-bumper traffic as far as the eye could see.

For several hundred NWT residents, that home became Whitecourt. Local authorities created a welcome set up for registration, just like they did for residents from Fox Creek and Little Smokey earlier this summer. Whitecourt staff welcomed evacuees in with a caring smile and words of comfort, providing resources and vouchers.

Just as they did with previous evacuees, the Whitecourt Food Bank staff geared up to supply food. Needing more support, Whitecourt Food Bank Director Lori Coffey reached out to Alberta Food Banks, hoping to get a much-needed delivery. "I called and spoke with Francesca, an amazing human being. She changed the system to make it easier when there's an emergency like this, and it shows.

They are using my list of items as a template now because those are easy, good things you need immediately. They are now keeping those things in stock for emergencies, and I think that's cool of them to do that." Coffey said within a day and a half of calling, eight pallets appeared on the food bank's doorstep.

How the eight pallets arrived in Whitecourt is another part of the story. "Matt Joyal at Whitecourt Transport is honestly the greatest human. I can't thank him enough. He got Leduc Trucking involved, donating their services to help get the food here. It was all done for free to help the people. It's super cool," said Coffey.

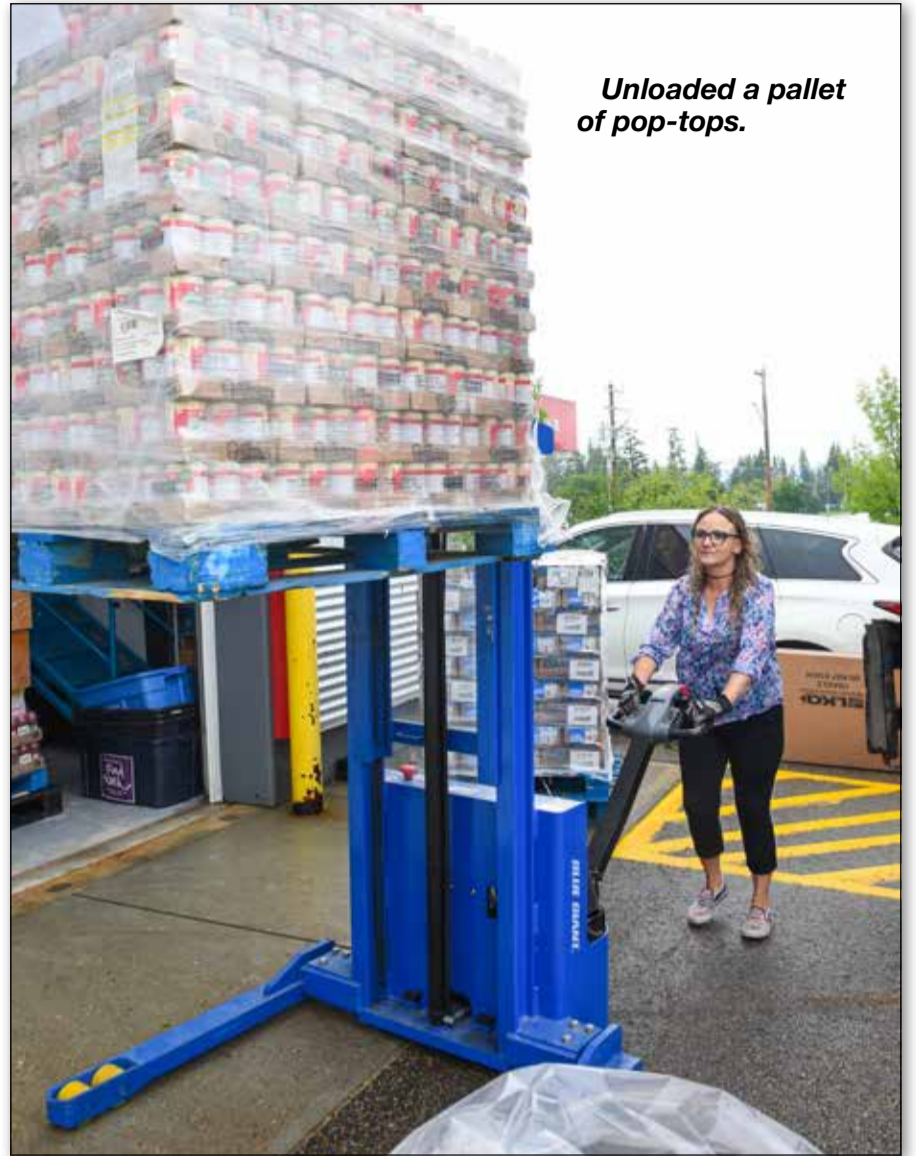
She explained that Joyal reached out on his own accord to Leduc Trucking and asked if they would like to join him and help get the food to Whitecourt to support the evacuees. "It made me cry yesterday when he called me and told me that they were doing what

Leduc Trucking was doing and working together to do it for free to help the evacuees. This community truly, truly is amazing, and that's what the people say. They say that everyone is so kind and nice and that everyone is being taken care of," she said, speaking of the evacuees.

"The evacuees are really lovely. They are so kind and grateful. It's so nice when everyone comes together to help. This is the second time we are doing this. It's sad to know that people are evacuated and in this position to need help, but we are getting a system going now that makes it smoother. We are happy to be able to help," said Coffey.

On Thursday, August 24, at 10 a.m., a Whitecourt Transport delivery truck beeped its way back to the food bank door, ready to be unloaded. With help from driver Garry Singh, they unloaded each pallet. "It was awesome of him to

help. We worked together to get these off the truck."

Once inside the building, food bank staff worked to prep boxes for evacuees to pick up. "We will get through this quickly because we serve at least thirty boxes daily. We want to make sure they have some food to tie them over. They are getting vouchers, too, but you still need additional items. That's why we tried getting easy stuff for them like pop-top cans, snack items, juice, water and baby food."

Three days a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday, evacuees can visit the food bank and grab a box. Perishable boxes provided to Whitecourt residents each week are paused while they offer them to evacuees. "Evacuees come first, and if there's anything left over, then Whitecourt residents can have it. Right now, that's just something we have to shift to make sure that we take care of everyone.

Whitecourt residents can still access our services at the Food Bank at the other intake window using their ID. So, we aren't taking food away from Whitecourt residents that need the food bank. We are just making it so that everyone is being helped."

Without knowing how long evacuees will be in the community, Coffey said they've prepared for three weeks. "It goes to show that no matter who comes here and no matter what happens, we all rally together and make sure they are taken care of." Coffey said she hopes evacuees feel the love. "We hope they feel at home here. I can't imagine what it would be like to be in your vehicle in a random town and be wondering if your house is burning down. I can't imagine that feeling." She said evacuees needing extra support should mention it when they pick up their perishable boxes at the food bank. "Just talk to us. We will do whatever we can."

Coffey said a recent heartwarming interaction with a youth

during a food bank tour showed just how meaningful the bond is between the community and those who support it. "There was a little boy, and for his recent birthday he asked all his friends to bring food instead of presents, and he donated it to the food bank. While on the tour, he said, now I get to see where my food goes."

She said explaining what it's all about and how amazing the community is was a wonderful experience. "It's a whole new generation understanding that the food bank isn't just for poor people. Things happen in life, and we've got you, and when you're back on your feet, you can help us. It's full circle, and everyone is part of it."

Who knows, that youngster may have donated something now in the hands of a grateful evacuee. "The community continues to surprise me in ways that make me cry, and they don't even know it. It's absolutely beautiful."

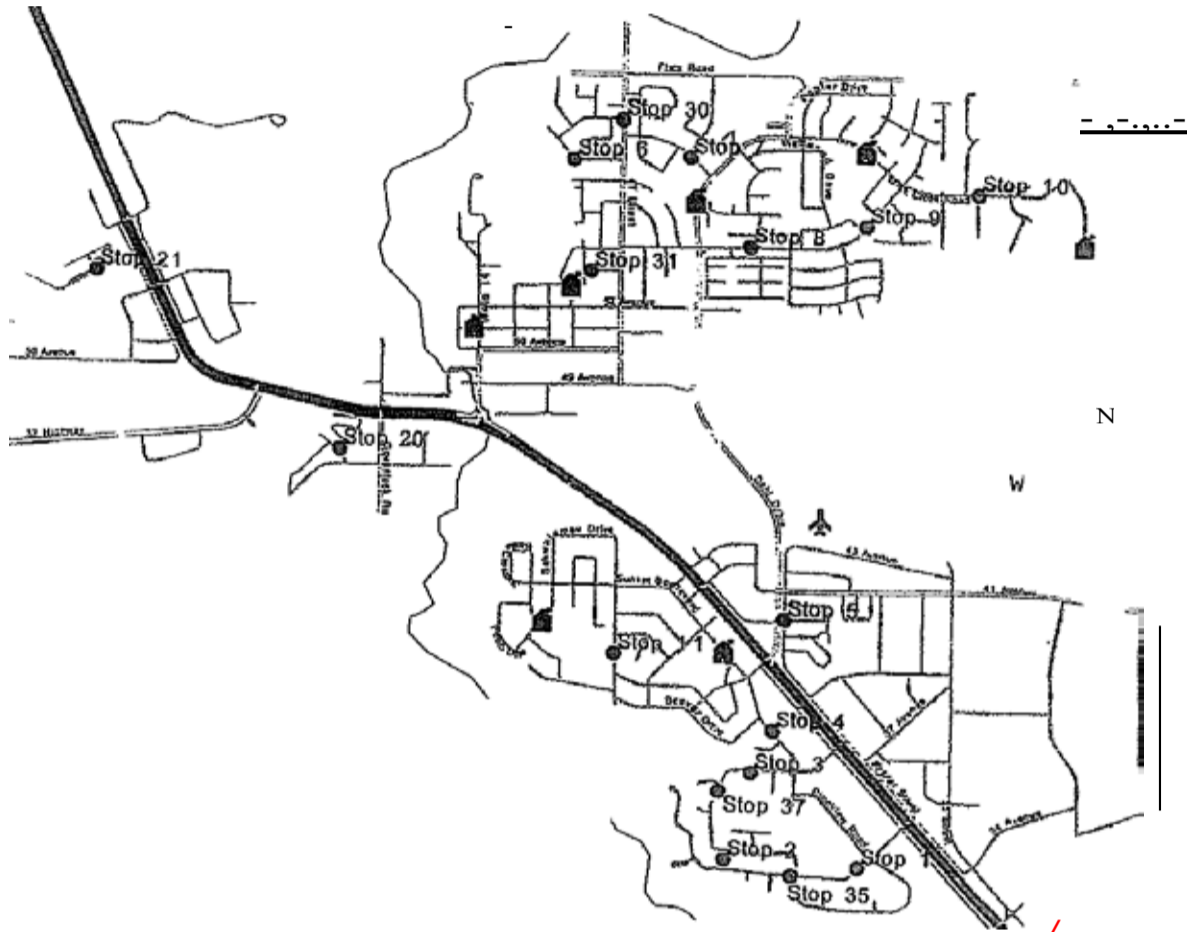

tion, and only one application can be made per primary resident, owner or lessee, per lifetime.

Slootweg also provided potential impacts on the budget. "If you looked at the number of residences in the municipality, and I know this is probably grandiose, but if every residence was destroyed, it would cost the County about \$2,042,000 if you gave each residence \$1,000," she explained.

Councillor Bruce Prestidge asked what the policy would do for someone who lost their home via flooding. "If somebody's house was flooded but wasn't destroyed, they wouldn't be eligible, right?" Slootweg said yes. She said it would have to be damage that made the home unliveable. "There are instances where it fills it up totally with water, and they are out of the house because they can't live in it; eligibility would be there." She said a damaged basement with a liveable top level wouldn't count.

Councillor John Burrows initially raised the topic of financial support for residents affected by a disaster at an earlier meeting. His idea was to allow residents who had already paid their yearly municipal taxes to access the funds to help offset immediate costs, with the onus on the resident to repay the amount before the following

year's taxes were due. "Last meeting, if you didn't pay your taxes, you got no penalties. If you did pay your taxes, well, you paid your taxes, and you had no access to any of that money. It was an unequal thing," he explained.

Burrows said he felt the idea behind the policy before him set a "dangerous precedent." He felt the County's risk of being wiped off the map was low for floods. "I can't see Woodlands getting wiped off the map by a flood, but a wildfire, I can. Typically, in these types of things, wildfires they actually exclude. I would like to see this kicked back to the Governance and Priorities Meeting and see if we can hash through this a little bit." He said the financial risk to Woodlands County in having to pay out a large sum by giving each affected homeowner \$1,000 wasn't a good thing.

Council voted unanimously to send the conversation around relief assistance during a catastrophic event in Woodlands County to an upcoming Governance & Priorities Committee meeting, allowing Council to delve deeper into the topic and choose the best option for the municipality and residents.

Councillor Burrows then asked what his colleagues thought about bringing the conversation to the Prov-

ince. "The Province of Alberta has almost the worst flood mitigation building practices in Canada. They will let you build just about anywhere." He said he had recent conversations with members from the Rural Municipalities of Alberta (RMA) around insurance and uninsurable properties and events, which led them to discuss the possibility of a provincial insurance fund around floods and wildfires.

Slootweg said the Province changed the Municipal Government Act (MGA) in 2014, specifically for properties. "They were supposed to provide municipalities with a regulation around development in the floodway and flood fringes, and that never transpired. I know we have a couple of property owners that have lobbied the MLA and the higher-ups trying to get the province to re-open that. For whatever reason, the MGA says there's a regulation, but there isn't."

Councillor Peter Kuelken said it sounded like the ball was being bounced back and forth between who should be taking responsibility for it. "I think it serves

a purpose for us to open that can of worms and try and figure out whether we can push some of those further up the chain," he said. He then asked Slootweg what she thought about putting together a resolution and having it go up the ranks with the intent of having RMA support it and bring it to the Province.

"I think it would be good to bring it forward again because it is putting us in a situation. We have individuals, as Burrows indicated, that essentially can't develop their properties because they are in the floodway. The province back in the day had promised they would provide a regulation as to some passive uses these properties could have on them and some conversation around flood fringe areas where things can be buildup in different matters."

Reeve Dave Kusch said the best way to get provincial backing was to start a paper trail, adding his support to the idea. Burrows' motion to have Administration draft a resolution to RMA around the 2014 regulations and bring it to an upcoming Governance and Priorities meeting for discussion passed unanimously.
