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
A fireguard around Whitecourt and Woodlands County is on the provincial table

At a meeting earlier this summer, Whitecourt Town Council learned about an expression of interest from Alberta Forestry Parks and Tourism for grant funding to create an emergency fireguard around communities at high risk for wildfires due to their proximity to the Boreal forest.

A fireguard is a strategically placed barrier intended to stop or slow the rate of the spread that a wildfire has in its approach to something, in this case, a municipality. Fireguards come in all shapes and sizes. From bulldozing a wide path, separating the forest from itself to pre-burn-

ing an area, like, for example, around a house, to reducing flammability through water or fire retardant chemicals. Fireguards of different kinds are used worldwide, with many using a combination of methods. The fireguard proposed for the area would entail separating the forest, creating a break in forest fuels, and slowing or potentially stopping an incoming wildfire.

Alberta Forestry Parks and Tourism's expression of interest was a dipping of the proverbial toe in the water to see what kind of interest there would be from municipalities to build the fireguard and receive funding for it. Town of Whitecourt CAO Peter Smyl explained that, if made, the fireguard would be in Woodlands County and placed in a way that would protect critical infrastructure for both municipalities.

He said Lee Hardman, Whitecourt's Director of Community Safety, chatted with Woodlands Countv about the project, ready to work together to create the funding application. The more they learned about the potential funding, the more they realized there was a better way to go about the project. "It (the fireguard) has to be done by March 31, 2024. To arrange a fireguard is not a simple process even though we are not dealing with a lot of private owners, but a lot of leaseholders and crown land."

Smyl explained that Whitecourt and Woodlands County agreed to send a letter to the Province instead. "Yes, a fireguard would be a benefit. However, we would like to assist them (the Province) in doing the fireguard application. Because it's approved by the Province and a lot of different departments, and we are dealing with the Province's land and dealing with the Province's leaseholders, we would like to have the Province spearhead the application forward."

Having the Province spearhead the project, rather than having the communities do it themselves, means the Province could deal with their leaseholders instead of requiring municipalities to navigate those waters. Given the land where most of the fireguards would take place is either connected to the Province by leases or by the crown, seeking the Province's lead on the project sounded logical.

Whitecourt and Woodlands County co-signed the letter, seeking the Province's lead. Both municipalities' Councils made nearly the same motion to support it, with both motioning to enter into an agreement with Alberta Forestry, Parks and Tourism for the planning and assessment work required for an emergency fireguard around the communities.

At the meeting, Mayor Tom Pickard shared that he had spoken with Forestry Minister Todd Loewen about the matter at a conference with the Northern Alberta elected leaders. "The feeling of the Northern Alberta elected leaders' group was that the province should be leading this kind of initiative in areas where the predominance of properties around certain towns, villages, hamlets, were provincially owned." Mayor Pickard said that though Minister Loewen didn't make any commitments one way or another, he did agree with the premise. "He felt it was a good idea and that there were advantages. He felt it was worthy of further discussion with his ministry officials."

Roughly six years ago, the Whitecourt Town Council of the day sent a letter to the Province requesting they look into creating a fireguard for the area. "They indicated that they did not have a program for it and would work with the situations at hand, creating fireguards as needed, but not prior to," explained Smyl. "This process is new. I understand there are a couple of communities in Alberta looking at this program."

In early July, the Province of Alberta announced 175 million in wildfire response and recovery funding for municipalities affected by wildfire. Communities could access up to 90 percent of wildfire response-related costs, and no dollar cap was placed on applications. Alberta Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness Minister Mike Ellis said applications would be reviewed on a case-bycase as received. Over 1.5 million hectares of land have burned this fire season, with over 50 communities being impacted. Creating fireguards around communities at the most risk could reduce costs to the Province and municipalities in future wildfire seasons.



So long, farewell to graffiti, thanks to a new initiative from Communities in Bloom

A new initiative is on the go in Whitecourt. Aimed at getting graffiti off the many buildings, signs, and infrastructure that feature it, the Whitecourt Communities in Bloom Tagging and Graffiti Removal Initiative is available for local businesses and residents to access products nearly guaranteed to remove unsightly and unwanted art.

Graffiti remains an issue for area businesses. From the more recent bright, neon green squiggles defacing the Canadian Tire sign pillars to the many random or affiliated pieces on buildings throughout the community, graffiti is an issue most can agree is a problem, and it's not just Whitecourt either.

The City of Edmon- what other communiton has received more -

than last year. In January, they received 81 graffiti complaints, up from the 34 they received in January 2022. They received 143 complaints in February, up 155 percent from the previous year. In Edmonton, property owners have a specific timeline to remove graffiti or face a fine. One program in place offers up to \$750 of professional graffiti-cleaning port to affected property owners. Some owners have switched from constant cleaning to putting up murals since artists typically respect other artists and refrain from tagging art. The issue of graffiti is far spread, and many municipalities are trying to figure out how best to combat the problem.

ties do and testing out various products, the Communities in Bloom Committee members settled on a product called The World's Best Graffiti Removal System. With some elbow grease, the system removes graffiti from bare brick, stone, masonry and nearly every other type of material.

At a recent Whitecourt Town Council meeting, Council received an update on the program, which included pictures that showed the product in action. One Bloom committee member had graffiti just outside her home on an electrical box, a perfect test subject for the system to see how it would work. Pictures provided in the public package showed the steps of each product in the system, ending in the preferred final result, a graffiti-free electrical box.

The Communities in Bloom Committee provides the system in a kit format, which features everything needed in a bucket (solution, goggles, gloves, paintbrush and scrubber) at a subsidized rate. The

group purchased 100 Citizen's Kits for \$30 a piece and will sell them for \$20. Councillor Derek Schlosser asked why they decided to do a lowered cost. Chelsea Grande, Director of Community Services, explained that it was meant to boost the program. "With the amount of tagging and graffiti in town, they just really wanted to promote it."

Grande explained that the product, The World's Best Graffiti Removal System, works as the name suggests. "It works really well. They have two kits, one for sensitive surfaces and one for bare brick, stone, and masonry. They also tried the brick one, and it worked well." The sensitive surfaces kit is for painted surfaces or those with a coating that must remain. The product's ability to remove graffiti was also a pleasant surprise for Town staff. "It's better than the one we have for the Town's usage right now," added Grande. She said they would likely be purchasing the product in the future.

Depending on the

program's success, the Communities in Bloom Committee could bring in more kits for the next budget or change the subsidy offered. Businesses or residents that take part and pick up a kit will be asked to submit before and after pictures. The successes and challenges of the initiative will be tracked for any necessary changes or updates. One thing's for sure, depending on the amount of graffiti, it's likely cheaper to purchase a kit and remove it than to paint over top.

Residents and business owners interested in getting their hands on a kit can do so by visiting the Allan & Jean Millar Centre during business hours and inquiring at the front desk. The Communities in Bloom Committee is also in the beginner stages of creating a mural project in the community and already has a completed mural up at the FIC. Anyone wishing to contact the Communities in Bloom Committee about the mural project, or any other reason can do so through their Facebook page, "Whitecourt Communities in Bloom."

Building back the baseball ranks in Whitecourt, one tournament at a time





The Whitecourt Slo-Pitch Association has a tournament this weekend with over 30 teams on the schedule. Six local groups will be in the mix, and players hope to see loads of fans cheering them on.

The Whitecourt Slo-Pitch Association is looking to grow its membership in a big way. The group has dwindled over the years, leaving players unable to fulfill the season as they would like. For player Brian Hatch, it's hard to watch. "When I moved here fifteen years ago, there were 34 teams. This year there were eleven."

A small number of teams meant a shortened season. "The season usually runs three months, May through July, with playoffs at the end of July. This season ended at the beginning of July with no playoffs," said Hatch. When asked why he thought the player numbers had gone down, Hatch said COVID didn't help as many people picked up different hobbies, like golf, and haven't returned to the diamond.

As a whole, slo-pitch is a popular sport provincially. "It's a huge thing in Alberta. In the cities, there are 96 teams in each league.

In Grande Prairie, there are 250 teams," he said. Hatch said he enjoys slo-pitch because it's easier to hit the ball and it's easier on the body to play when compared to fastball. "You don't want to get hit by a ball from a pitcher doing 60 or 80 miles per hour." He said the lower risk of injury is a bonus.

The main issue now is building the league back up to where it once was and not worrying about having a shortened season

Temporary foreign workers in Alberta

Temporary foreign workers are an important part of Alberta's labour force with about 45,000 permit holders coming to the province in 2022. This was a 62% increase over the number of arrivals in 2021.

Over the first half of 2023, the number of foreign workers coming to Alberta was 147% higher than at the same point in 2022. If this pace continues, Alberta is on track to welcome over 65,000 new foreign workers in 2023.

There are two programs under which foreign job seekers can apply to work in Canada: 1) the Temporary Foreign Worker Program (TFWP); and 2) the International Mobility Program (IMP).

The TFWP is aimed at addressing local labour shortage by allowing Canadian employers to hire foreign workers to fill temporary jobs when qualified Canadians are not available.

As such, the TFWP requires employers to complete a Labour Market Impact Assessment. "A positive LMIA will show that there is a need for a foreign worker to fill the job. It will also show that no Canadian worker or permanent resident is available to do the job."

TWFP permit holders tend to work in agriculture, food services and accommodation, or as caregivers.

The IMP does not require a Labour Market Impact Assessment and is aimed at providing "reciprocal

benefits for Canadian citizens" (i.e. so Canadians can apply

for temporary work permits in other countries), and providing broad economic, cultural, or other competitive advantages to Canadians. The IMP also facilitates the movement of workers covered under free trade agreements such as the Canada-US-Mexico Agreement and intra-company transfers.



Putting a face on suicide



"We are going to try and do eight games Friday night (August 11), and then we will likely be using all six diamonds all day Saturday (August 12). Then we will start playoffs Saturday night, and on Sunday, we hope to be done by 4 pm."

Another way to grow the sport is through younger ages playing it and growing up loving the game. Hatch said Whitecourt Minor Baseball recently advertised about starting a slow-pitch league for vouth with a tentative start date next season. Teens interested in slopitch can join the association as young as 14. provided they have parental consent. "It would be nice to have 30 teams again. Hopefully, we can get more people in next season."

On Thursday last week, over twenty league members got together for a Glove Toss evening at Graham Acres. With a shortened season, many people weren't ready to call it done and wanted more opportunities to play. Thursday was the second time since the season ended that a make-shift night of baseball was put on. "We will keep it going as long as people are having fun and want to continue," said Hatch.

For Ashley Johnston, baseball has been in her life since she was a young child. Over the last eight years, she has become more competitive with her play, travelling to tournaments with her Smokin' Bases teammates. I love smashing a ball. It's a lot of fun. It's a vibe to hang out with the crowd and play with friends. It's a good bunch of people around here in the league." She encouraged anyone interested to give it a go. "We have a good mix. It ranges from competitive players to first-timers just starting and learning the sport and everyone in between them. Our main goal is trying to get people back out. Even if you've never played before, come out and try it and see if you like it. We don't care if you've played before or not. We want to get more people out to play because it's better when you have more people."
