On Saturday, a group of women worked beneath the hot sun to paint the crosswalk beside the library in a beautiful orange hue. It's the second year that the Whitecourt Indigenous Friends Society has painted this section of 52 Avenue, which links the Whitecourt Library and the Midtown Mall, ahead of Orange Shirt Day on September 30. Judy Ducharme travelled from Peace River to create and paint the mural design, which features an Inukshuk for Inuit Peoples, six dots to represent Treat 6, a feather for First Nations Peoples and the Metis symbol at the feather's tip. Three wavy lines represent the Aurora Borealis, and the saying "Every Child Matters" is painted in white sparkleinfused paint, which glitters and dances with the sunlight. Society board members joined Ducharme to paint the sidewalk, including president Faye Myshyniuk, who said she hopes it encourages awareness. "People should respect and honour the memory of the children who didn't make it home from Residential School and the survivors." She encourages everyone to participate in the Orange Shirt Day events at Festival Park on Saturday, September 30. "Everyone is invited to come. We will have a bannockmaking station, and Dallas Arcand is returning." The day includes a Metis fiddler and jigger, singers and drummers, face painting, Metis finger weaving, Indigenous stories, Teepee Teachings including dot art, survivor stories, Honour songs and giveaways. She said there will be several activities for attendees to take part in. "It's a come one come all event. Everyone is invited to come, and we hope they learn a bit about our Metis and First Nations cultures. It's going to be a great day," said Myshyniuk. Whitecourt Town Council updates

Whitecourt has applied for Disaster Recovery Program (DRP) funding as a result of flooding experienced in June 2023. An estimated \$2.4 million in infrastructure damages and related response costs were experienced; this estimate does not include the damages of private residences or businesses. If the application is approved, those Whitecourt property owners impacted by the incident can apply to the program for funding within DRP. Whitecourt will inform the community when the

decision on its application.

Whitecourt will be applying to the Forest Resources Association of Alberta for funding for a 2-year FireSmart Coordinator contract position. This new position will be responsible for coordinating FireSmart projects (such as the FireSmart Home Assessment program and vegetation management projects), as well as building awareness and public engagement on FireSmart principles to reduce wildfire risk in the region.

How Whitecourt and Woodlands County faired during Canada's worst fire season



A raging inferno.



After a hectic summer for emergency crews, firefighters, municipal administrators, and staff, Whitecourt and Woodlands County recently reviewed how the fire season was handled in the area.

With summer winding down, the Administrations for the Town of Whitecourt and Woodlands County recently wrapped up the last few months, providing finalized information from the fire events that affected the area. Sheldon Schoepp, Manager of Protective Services in Woodlands County,

and Lee Hardman, Director of Community Safety for Whitecourt, recently presented the activity from spring and summer to their respective councils.

On May 5, 2023, there was a rash of wildland fire activity detected in the region, several within proximity of Woodlands County. "We had three fairly large wild-

land fires that were indicated to us from the Government of Alberta and Alberta Wildfire," explained Schoepp, speaking of the lightning-caused fires near Shiningbank, Fox Creek and Swan Hills.

He explained that though all three fires grabbed their attention,

the Shiningbank wildfire took priority. "It just touched our County. Not very much entered into Woodlands. but it did enter. In reference to where it was located, it was 27 kilometres southwest of the Town of Whitecourt footprint." Schoepp said that residents in the area were quickly notified and that emergency measures were implemented. contacted the residents in the area by phone and in person. I was out in the area myself, along with our fire departments, emergency responders, and other agencies. We had faceto-face contact with residents out there."

Preparedness activities took place, including structural protection equipment on ten County residences in the Anselmo area, done in step with the Whitecourt Fire Department. They also prepped water sources near the area in advance, including three 400-barrel water tanks. "As we know, water sources are very sparse out there, so we wanted to make sure that we had enough water just in case these fires decided to come into more of Woodlands County," said Schoepp.

Woodlands County had roaming fire watch crews running 24 hours a day, for roughly seven days, to keep a close eye on the north-northeast portion of the Shiningbank fire. Crews had their fingers ready on the trigger to radio of any movement into the County. They also hired a fire safety contractor company and placed them on standby in case they needed extra help. Woodlands applied to the Disaster Relief Program from the Government of Alberta for \$112,936.00. hoping the program

will cover most of the proactive costs curred. Thankfully, no homes in Woodlands County were affected by the fires and several residents had home assessments done by the Whitecourt Fire Department to further protect themselves.

The numerous regional fires brought heavy smoke, fear, and hundreds of evacuees to the Town of Whitecourt. With Woodlands County and Whitecourt working together to keep watch on the nearby fires, Whitecourt focused on becoming a destination for those fleeing, seeking a soft place to land. On May 6. the AJMC morphed into a reception centre for displaced Fox Creek residents, who were later joined by those from the MD of Greenview and Vallevview.

In the two weeks that the centre remained open, the Town of

Whitecourt supported over three thousand residents from evacuated communities at a cost of just over \$72,000. The Whitecourt Fire Department also joined the action, helping fight raging infernos in Fox Creek and Edson to the tune of \$144,620. Hardman explained that supportive costs would be recouped from the impacted municipalities.

Whitecourt continues to be an evacuee holdout with residents from the Northwest Territories. Over 460 have received assistance through the end of August. Whitecourt also sent a crew of four firefighters and one apparatus to assist efforts in Yellowknife.

At a news conference on September 7. Canada's Minister of Emergency Preparedness, Harjit Sajjan, said nearly every province had accessed federal funding due to fires

this year. When asked about Canada creating a national force to fight wildfires, he said all options were on the table. Sajjan added that the government was looking at preparedness for all kinds of disasters. "We're looking at all different types of disasters, doing the lessons learned, and we'll come out with the appropriate response," he said.

Specific to wildfires. Energy and Natural Minister Resources Jonathan Wilkinson said Canada's unprecedented wildfire season isn't over yet. Speaking at the same news conference as Sajjan, Wilkinson said wildland fire activity could extend into late fall or even winter, especially from eastern Alberta to central Ontario. He added that the fires up north would continue to smoulder.

Over one thousand fires have burned in

Alberta this year, and as of Friday, September 15, there were still 81 active fires. The Lac La Biche Forest Area saw the most fire activity, with 180 fires. The Whitecourt Forest Area has had 54 fires so far. including several large footprint fires, including the Fox Creek fire that grew to over 66,000 ha.

Alberta's wildfire season runs until October 31 and recent dry windy weather creates risk. In a recent social media post, Alberta Wildfire reminded residents to "use caution when recreating in the forest" and to be extra careful when extinguishing campfires. "Soak it, stir it, and soak it again until the ashes are cool to the touch. When we send firefighters to extinguish abandoned campfires, we are taking them away from other duties," read the

The Evergreen, Colorado native received assists from Matthew Sutter and Braden Keeble, with all three nabbing their first points of the season. Aside from three Kodiak penalties, the second period ended without much fanfare.

In the third, newcomer #92 Jaxon Priddle, who hails from Sarnia, Ontario, scored his first goal as a Wolverine thanks to assists from Caleb MacDonald and Jalen Bianchet. The goal scored early in the period, tied things up at three a piece. Fans were ecstatic and ready

for their first overtime of the season.

The Wolverines had two close calls thanks to two penalties to the Kodiaks, hooking and high-sticking, but couldn't get past the visitor's goalie, Charlie Zolin. After an excruciating extra frame, the Kodiaks and Wolverines had only one thing left to do: a shootout.

The Kodiaks chose #18 Alexander Bryson and #88 Rhett Miller as their shooters, while the Wolverines chose #91 Colby Browne and #71 Kaiden Wiltsie. The Kodiaks scored on both attempts, and their goalie kept the cage shut when the Wolverines attempted. Camrose took the game 4-3.

The next night, on Saturday, September 16, the Brooks Bandits rolled into town, hoping to steal a game away from the Wolverines. After a hard-fought loss the night before, the home team was eager to give their local fans a big win. With 677 in attendance, the Wolverines had work to do, given the Bandits were the reigning champs from last season's AJHL playoffs and bound to be one tough cookie.

The game's first whistle came just one minute and thirty-three seconds in when Wolverine Elijah Brown was called for tripping. As he sat for two in the sin bin, the Bandits scored and took an early lead. Nearly halfway through the period, Spencer Rheaume, who took countless hits throughout the game, was called for holding. The Wolverines



Woodlands County Council discussed the following items at their recent meeting of Council:

Margaret Osborne, Anna Swan, and Jocelyn McKinnon of the Barrhead Community Victim Services Unit Association were in attendance to provide an update on their association. The association saw a high demand for their services in 2022 with their case files nearly doubling from the previous year. Council approved a \$3,000 contribution in support of their services.

A public hearing for Bylaw 606/23 -2023LUA03 - Land Use Amendment for PT NE 28-59-12-W5M Plan 972-4048 Lot 1 was scheduled for 9:35 am, October 11, 2023, and Bylaw 602/23 -2023LUA02 - Land Use Amendment for PT S 31-59-12-W5M Plan 082-5617 Block 5 Lot 1 was scheduled for 10 am, October 11, 2023. Both public hearings will be held at the Whitecourt Municipal Office.

Council will bring a proposed Floodway Development Regulation Bill 27 resolution to the next regional Pembina Zone 3 meet-The resolution calls for the provincial government to expedite implementation the of an Alberta Flood Regulation to support improved floodway development, land-use planning, emergency response, and address other flood-related issues and risks.

Woodlands County is

forwarding an interim \$1.5 million payment to the Town of White-court towards 2023 cost-share services. Since 2020, the County has contributed \$3.5 million to Whitecourt for cost-share services, while the Intermunicipal Collaboration Agreement is finalized.

Council adopted amended Policy 6204 - Emergency Relief Assistance for Catastrophic Events. Woodlands County will provide \$1,000 to a resident that experiences an event that causes a total loss or uninhabitable conditions to their residence and/or total loss of a person's personal belongings, i.e., house fire, landslide.

adopted Council amended Policy 5103 – Youth Enrichment Subsidy (YES). It provides Woodlands County children and youth with up to a maximum of \$600 per year in funding to be able to participate in recreation. sports, arts, and culture programs. Funding will be issued throughout the year on a first come first serve basis.


