A Time for Reflection



The Legacy of Peacekeeping


In addition to remembering the world wars, Remembrance Day also pays tribute to the more recent peacekeeping efforts

Animal calls and speeders rank highest for Enforcement Services in Woodlands County

Early this year, on February 1, Woodlands County and Lac Ste Anne County (LSAC) entered into a five-year contract to see the Lac Ste Anne County's peace officers provide 80 hours of Enforcement Services to Woodlands County each month. Woodlands County is also to receive monthly reports on Enforcement Services supplied by LSAC, giving the County a picture of what services are provided and when.

October On LSAC Community Peace Officer and Supervisor Sargent Dallas Choma and Sheldon Schoepp, Manager of Protective Services for Woodlands County, presented the third quarter (Q3) overview for Woodlands County Council. "At the time this was drafted, our enforcement department from Lac Ste Anne County issued two orders in Q3," began Sargent Choma. "They were clean-up orders, forcing people to clean up their property or tear down some sort of derelict building. We've done extremely well with our orders out in Woodlands County."

Ticket-wise, Sargent Choma said officers wrote 51 tickets, totalling \$11,697. He then explained that 47 percent of the fine value goes to the province. There were also four written warnings given out within the County. The value of the fines, had they been tickets and not warnings, was \$748. Between the tickets and written warnings, there was a total of 55 tickets given out in Q3.

The highest number of tickets given out was to those exceeding the established speed limit, with 34 tickets. The next highest (4) was for those operating a motor vehicle without the proper paperwork. The remaining citations with three or fewer tickets included windshields with cracks in the viewing area, driver not wearing a seatbelt, failure to produce

an operator's license, a dog that had bitten/ attacked/threatened, crossing a double solid lane line, speeding on the highway, unsecured license plate, accumulation of offensive material and exceeding the allowable number of dogs.

Sargent Choma said that through the third quarter, they responded to 18 incidents. The types of incidents responded to included Animal Control Bylaw, Dog Bylaw, Noise Bylaw, Priority 1 and Priority 2, Traffic Safety Act, Unsightly Property, Dangerous Dog and Assist Fire Call. The two types with the

highest incident count were Dog Bylaw complaints and Priority 2, both with four. The rest of the incident types had a count of either one or three.

He explained that the Priority 1 and Priority 2 incident types would not be used again from now on in favour of more specific terms. He said the priority wording had previously been used as a catchall for incidents outside the basic terms. "When Lac Ste Anne County moved into the new software, which is the software you see here for reporting and enforcement, a lot of the drop-down menus (for

types of incidents), we had to modify."

He said when an officer went out to a call and the type of incident they were dealing with wasn't reflected in the available drop-down menu for incident type selection, the officer would put it under either Priority 1 or 2. "We've come back into the program, and we've modified that so you will not see Priority 1 or Priority 2 calls again," he clarified. Officers now have more items to choose from, which will provide more detail in future reports.

Sargent Chora said that of the incidents

dealt with, two had concluded, one with a charge and one with a warning. He said none of the incidents had required forwarding to another agency. "The RCMP never got any forwarding of any calls to assist us or to something we couldn't deal with, which is a good thing." Six incidents remain under investigation, while one is listed as unfounded and another as "no status."

Once he concluded his Q3 report, Sargent Chora said that Lac Ste Anne County had started a pilot project for Q4, which







A tweak to the power and gas franchise fees incoming for 2024

At the end of October, Whitecourt Town Council reviewed the community's franchise fees for gas and power. Franchise fees are charges paid by a utility company to a municipality in exchange for the right to exclusively provide a service, in this case, gas and power. Fortis Alberta and ACTO Gas, the utility providers, can then recover that cost through their users. The fees are calculated as a percentage of the distribution charges, and both have provincial caps: 20 percent for electrical and 35 percent for natural gas.

Town Council reviews the fees charged for the delivery of electricity and gas each year and can change them, if deemed necessary, by altering their franchise agreements. The Alberta Utilities Commission is then tasked to approve or not approve the contracts. Both Fortis Alberta and ACTO Gas required a decision from the Town Council before November



1, 2023, as to whether the franchise fee rates would be changing.

Through 2023, the franchise fee for power was 3.91 percent, and the fee for gas was 27.17 percent. Both are in year three of a fiveyear plan adopted by the council in 2020, which forecasts the fee revenue and expected community growth using specific calculators provided by each utility provider.

Franchise fee revenue is based on the rate used by the Town of Whitecourt, applied to the delivery of both utilities. For gas, rates approved by the Alberta Utilities Commission resulted in lower delivery revenues. Combining that with lower gas consumption than forecasted due to a

warmer winter resulted in a significant shortfall in revenue for the Town of Whitecourt.

From the gas franchise fee, the shortfall was \$110,000, while the power shortfall was approximately \$48,000, combining for a nearly \$160,000 loss. Town administration recommended that the council increase both rates enough to cover the losses, making up for the previous year and covering the expected usage growth for 2024.

The power franchise fee was recommended to rise from 3.91 percent to 4.47 percent, while the gas franchise fee was recommended to increase from 27.17 percent to 33.55 percent, nearing the cap (35 percent). As to what that might look like for residents' bills, the average resident would see an increase of \$3.11/month on their gas bill, and a small non-residential customer would see an increase of \$10.45/ month.

For power, the increase is much smaller. The average resident will see an increase of .61 cents per month, and a non-residential customer will increase approximately \$2.59/month. For a resident, when combined,

it works out to just under \$45 for the year.

Tax-exempt nesses and organizations that do not pay municipal taxes do pay their share of franchise fees, which account for roughly twelve percent of the pot. "If we didn't do this, then 88 percent of our population would pay 100 percent of that amount (municipal taxes), and the exempt companies and businesses would not pay anything more," commented Mayor Tom Pickard. After weighing the proposed increases. Whitecourt Town Council voted to approve them.

Regarding the cost of living for Whitecourt residents, the Town provided a chart of thirteen comparable communities stacked up against Whitecourt Municipal taxes and franchise fees were combined to show the average vearly cost of living in each municipality. The communities used to compare against were Hinton, High River, Edson, Drayton Valley, Cold Lake. Morinville. Drumheller, Lacombe, Rocky Mountain House. Slave Lake. Grande Prairie, Peace River, and Wetaskiwin.

Communities were compared for total an-

FRANCHISE FEE INCREASE NOTICE

Please be advised that the Town of Whitecourt is proposing to increase the local access fee, which is charged to FortisAlberta Inc. (FortisAlberta) for use of municipal lands for its power lines effective **January 1, 2024**.

TOWN OF WHITECOURT NOTICE OF INCREASE TO THE FRANCHISE FEE ON NATURAL GAS BILLINGS

The Town of Whitecourt is proposing to increase the natural gas distribution franchise fee which it charges ATCO Gas and Pipelines Ltd. for the exclusive right to deliver natural gas to the residents of Whitecourt and for use of municipal lands for its natural gas lines, effective January 1st 2024. The franchise fee applies to all customers that receive gas services in Whitecourt and is required to be billed as a separate charge on gas billings.

The current franchise fee is set at 27.17% of ATCO Gas and Pipelines Ltd. delivery revenues and will increase to 33.55% effective January 1, 2024. For an average residential customer using 115 GJs per year, this will result in an annual increase of approximately \$37.35. The franchise fee is anticipated to account for approximately \$196.40 of the average annual residential bill in 2024.

nual charges to residents and non-residents and listed from least expensive to most. The top three municipalities for resident affordability were Hinton, High River, and Whitecourt. The top three most costly communities for residents were Wetaskiwin, Peace River, and

Grande Prairie. For non-resident payers, Whitecourt sits fifth on the list, under High River, Hinton, Morinville, and Lacombe. The same three higher-costing communities listed above in the residential column remained the same for non-residential.

If one only looks at the franchise fees, one

will see that White-court's gas franchise fee is the highest of all comparable communities. However, if they compare municipal taxes or the power fee, the story changes. To get a complete picture, one need only to add all the fees together.

For example, though Grande Prairie has a much lower gas franchise fee (25 percent) than Whitecourt (33.55 percent), Grande Prairie's residential rates are significantly higher than Whitecourt's, with the average Grande Prairie resident paying \$3,269 for yearly municipal taxes last year. The average Whitecourt resident spent \$2,136. Similarly, residents in Slave

Lake paid an average of \$3,104 in residential taxes. Hence, Grande Prairie and Slake Lake land towards the pricier end of the chart, unlike Whitecourt, even though one fee is much higher than theirs.

When all fees are combined (taxes and franchise fees), the average resident of Whitecourt pays

\$2,373.10 yearly, and the average non-resident pays \$17,959.90. The increased rates will provide the Town of Whitecourt with just over \$900,000 from the power franchise fee and nearly \$1,159,000 from the gas franchise fee. Funds can support various needs and projects that benefit the community.


involved increasing stops. "I would like to see more warnings and tickets issued, so more stops made if possible. It's pretty tough here in the County because you're so far extended, and there's only so much pavement where a lot of traffic goes, East Mountain Road, stuff like that," he explained. He added that one of the areas receiving higher enforcement was the transport trucks and speeders coming in and out of the sawmill plant.

Councillor Wilhelm asked how it worked when dealing with unsightly properties. He said he had been asked about the issue before by residents and said he also wanted clarification for himself. Sargent Chora noted that if a complaint for unsightly property comes in, officers will investigate it. From there, a file is generated, and if a clean-up or work on a property is needed. they will issue an order to show the seriousness of the situation. "If we don't issue orders right away, then they (think) nothing's going to be done," he explained. He said if the homeowner is doing work on the issue but needs more time, they try and work with them, granting extensions if necessary. "We try and work with them as much as we can instead of penalizing. The economy

is tough out there," he said.

Sargent Chora said they try to strive for voluntary compliance but that depending on the homeowner, the process can take several weeks. Once an order is issued, a ratepayer has a chance to appeal, which can extend the process further. If the homeowner doesn't rectify the property, it can result in the issue being fixed on their behalf. Sargent Chora said calls aren't typically for agriculture properties but more for subdivision areas where a homeowner might have many vehicles, including derelict, uncut grass, and garbage strewn about.

He recommended residents contact them directly through 1-866-880-5722 rather than using the County's Service Tracker program. He said the process seemed to move a bit faster that way. He called the tracker a "grey area where we do not want to go" because of concerns about information collected in it. "The Service Trackers are helpful when it comes to complaints coming from you guvs (Council and Administration) because then it's tracked through Sheldon (Schoepp, Manager of Protective Services) and myself, but the general public, the ratepayers, I would like them to go through (1-866-880-5722) our office."





Nearing technical recession territory: Canada's GDP flat again in August

The latest industry-based GDP estimates from Statistics Canada provide further evidence that the Bank of Canada's interest rate increases are slowing the economy.

National economic output in August was flat compared to July (which was also flat) and the preliminary estimate for September is for another month of no growth.

Looking ahead, there is a chance that GDP could be slightly negative in both the second and the third quarter. won't know for sure until Statistics Canada releases quarterly expenditure-based

GDP estimates at the end of this month.

Two quarters of negative growth add up to a technical recession. However, the CD Howe Institute Business Cycle Council argues we should consider other factors like job losses and unemployment before labeling a slowdown as a recession. The Council, for example, determined that the two quarters of negative growth in early 2015 following the oil price decline did not qualify as a Canadian recession.

Whether it turns out to be a case of mild technical recession or just tepid growth, the weak performance could be enough to

convince the Bank of Canada that additional interest rate hikes are not needed to bring inflation back to target. The latest GDP data support our current expectation that the Bank will not need to raise rates again.

Monthly GDP statistics at the provincial level are not available, but output of the national oil and gas extraction subsector rose in August by 1%, its fourth straight increase following spring wildfire and maintenance disruptions. points to Alberta getting a summer boost from the energy industry even as other factors weighed on economic activity.


