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
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BGC Whitecourt is expanding its focus on socializing and mental health support for teens



Teen programming opportunities at BGC of Whitecourt & District are growing thanks to a focused approach by their newly appointed Youth Programming Coordinator. Alvarez and Baranowski are excited to grow the teen programming options at BGC.

She said the programs the BGC is creating will be fun and free. They will also delve into more critical topics, like mental health. "I will be working with a psychologist who is just finishing her master's and is from Counselling. Indigo Starting in January, we will be doing roughly a twelve-week program with different topics about mental health. It'll likely be a BGC program as BGC Canada has many programs,

Unlike traditional mental health programs, where attendees are taught something or presented with information in a more educational-focused manner, Alvarez explained that it would be different. "This program will discussion-based and have them doing a different hands-on activity each week. It'll be a casual environities. We are excited to get started."

When asked why she felt there was a need to provide teen programming, Alvarez said the isolation that everyone went through during COVID caused an increase in mental health issues while mental health programs simultaneously decreased. "There is an increased need for support. Mental health is always needed for adults, kids,

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and teens. Those needs may change over time, but they are always needed. My job is to tailor what we offer to the needs we see in the community."

Alavarez said she also works with community groups and agencies like the Doors Open program at the Allan & Jean Millar Centre and the Whitecourt & District Public Library. "I'm working with all of the community organizations to get my face out there and to get my program familiar to the teens. It's also about engaging and supporting each other with our interagency network, so rather than planning a bunch of the same things, we work together."

One way Alvarez said the BGC plans to help support the network is the creation of a Community Calendar. Kyra Baranowski, Executive Director of BGC Whitecourt and District, envisioned it as a way to link teens to all the programming available to them, like

a one-stop shop. "It features programming from the library, the Allan & Jean Millar Centre and anything the BGC is doing, all for ages 12-17," explained Baranowski.

Alvarez said she was happy to see the support. interagency "It gives us as agencies and organizations a chance to come and help out and not duplicate the same events because many of us are non-profit or are working off of grants, so we don't have a huge budget to play around with. It's better to work as a team."

She said she hopes teens understand they are welcome at the BGC and that "who you are is enough." She also said that sharing ideas for future events is always encouraged. "My job is to find the need within the community for our youth and meet that, whether that's fun events where they are just socializing or mental health groups that provide support. Anything that is needed for our teens. I will tailor it for them.'

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

Evacuees from Fox Creek, Little Smokey, Valleyview, Edson and Yellowhead County took refuge in Whitecourt at varying stages

when the fires in the Northwest Territories threatened communities and forced residents to flee, Whitecourt was one of the communities selected to provide support. A four-member team and an apparatus from the Whitecourt Fire Department also made the trek up north to render aid. You did good, Whitecourt, really good.





The total cost of the aforesaid project amounts to \$48,406,365. After deducting from this cost the amount of \$42,810,525 to be received by way of grants, reserves, sponsorship and sale of assets the net amount to be borrowed on the credit and security of the municipality at large by the issue of debentures is \$5,595,840. The debentures are to be repayable to the Province of Alberta up to fifty (50) equal consecutive semi-annual instalments of combined principal and interest, the semi annual interest not to exceed eight per centum (8.0%), or the interest rate as fixed from time to time by the Province of Alberta:







Woodlands County Council recap

Woodlands County Council discussed the following items at their recent meeting of Council:

Following budget discussions over the past three months, Council adopted the 2024 Operating and Capital budgets. In accordance with the five-year financial plan, the budget reflects a 3% taxation increase and a 1% increase in operating funding. The Capital budget contains \$3 million in funding for capital projects through taxation, \$875,000 in additional funding, \$4.25 million in debentures, and \$1,993,404 transferred to reserves. The budget document can be viewed on the Woodlands County website: https://woodlands.ab.ca/p/budgets

Council approved a one-time grant of \$11,582 to the Fort Assiniboine Parent Society breakfast program from the 2024 budget. The Parent Society is required to provide a final report detailing the usage of funds, including a budget, to Council by the end of the 2024 school year.

Council adopted Policy 1520 – Asset Retirement Obligation. The policy outlines the accounting treatment for Woodlands County's tangible capital assets and their end-of-life obligations, such as sewage lagoons, landfills, gravel pits, and any other potential liability for environmental requirements.

Due to an increase in vandalism, after-hours usage, and improper disposal of waste at Woodlands County transfer sites, the Takeit-or-Leave-it areas will be removed. Woodlands County is reviewing methods and tools to increase safety and deter vandalism at the transfer sites.

Council endorsed a letter of support for the Growth Regional Economic Development Alliance's Northern and Regional Economic Develop (NRED) program application. The grant will fund a local task force focused on creating discussion, understanding, and education surrounding national and international emissions legislation and their effects on businesses in the region.

Council

endorsed Woodlands County's Small Community Opportunity Program grant application for enhancing economic diversification and agri-foods growth. The grant will fund a Agri-Foods Local Market and Logistics Study and a Rural Alberta Economic Development Best Practices Benchmark Study. The studies will provide a better understanding of the current agri-foods industry in the County and provide economic benchmarks comparing it with other municipal-

Strvdhorst Enterprises was awarded the Erosion Repairs on Groat Creek Road project at a value of

\$129,535 plus taxes. Due to the 2023 floods, the bank at Groat Creek Road eroded impacting the edge of the road allowance and a portion of the guardrail. Repairs are required prior to spring to ensure further erosion does not occur.

As part of the Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework agreement, Council approved a cost share of

\$61,000 to the Town of Whitecourt from the 2023 FCSS grant. Woodlands County residents can access FCSS programs in Whitecourt, Mayerthorpe and Barrhead.

The 2024 Whitecourt Regional Landfill Authority Operating and Capital budget in the

amount of \$366,573 was approved.

The regular Council meeting on January 3, 2024, is cancelled as staff return from holidays.

Whitecourt approves 2024 interim budget

Whitecourt Town Council has approved the 2024 Interim Budget. The budget, totaling \$98,245,884, consists of a \$43,589,013 operating budget and a capital budget of \$54,656,871. The budget maintains service levels, and funds important capital investments with a 3.77% tax rate increase.

"Despite being faced with rising inflation costs, cost of living increases, reductions in provincial funding and federal carbon tax increases, Whitecourt continues to have one of the most competitive tax rates in our region," stated Whitecourt Mayor Tom Pickard. "I'm proud of the budget approved. It maintains service levels, and allocates funding according to priorities outlined in our strategic plan and from public engagement."

"The Culture & Events Centre is the biggest capital investment budgeted for next year; however, construction is still subject to the tender process," added Mayor Pickard. "For 15 years, our community has been researching, discussing and plan- ning for this facility. Whitecourt Town Council heard what residents had to say about the centre, and recently unveiled an updated design that incorporated this feedback. Similar to what the Allan & Jean Millar Centre has done for our community, the Culture & Events Centre will enhance our community's qualify of life, and drive economic development and investment attraction."

2024 Capital **Budget Highlights:**

- ing it easier for community members to apply for a building permit. Starting January 1, 2024, White-court will work directly with Safety Codes Agencies to create a "one-stop shop" for development and building permits. The change will create a single point of contact for applications, and more coordinated approach to the permitting pro- cess. This move has been made as part of Whitecourt's commitment to reduce red tape.
- Whitecourt will continue to act as an Alberta Advantage Immigration Program "Designated Community" under the Rural Renewal Program and Entrepreneur Streams. These programs will support workforce development by helping to ad- dress long-term labour shortages by attracting newcomers; and encourage new investment in Whitecourt by attracting entrepreneurs and new businesses.

The 2024 Budget will be finalized in the spring of 2024 once the Provincial budget is adopted, and final assessment figures are established. Specific tax rate impacts will vary by property type depending on the assessed value of a home or busi- ness, and will be determined once the final budget is adopted.



Is it time for your mammogram?

Screen Test is a free service provided by Alberta Health Services that offers screening mammograms. Our mobile screening units travel to 121 communities throughout Alberta to provide convenient access to breast cancer screening.

Having regular screening mammograms is the best way to find breast cancer early, before symptoms appear and when treatment may work better.

Who should have a screening mammogram?

If you're 45 to 74, you don't need a referral to have a mammogram. Make screening part of your regular health routine. Plan to have a mammogram every 2 years or as decided by you and your healthcare provider.

If you're 40 to 44 or over 75, discuss the risks and benefits of screening with your healthcare provider. You will need a referral if you're 40 to 44 and it's your first mammogram, or if you're over 75.

Breast density scores are now included in your Screen Test result letter


Breast density is the amount of dense tissue compared to the amount of fat in a person's breasts. It can be harder to find cancer in dense breasts because this tissue appears white on a mammogram, the same colour as many kinds of breast cancer. It's common to have dense breast tissue.

Dense breasts are only one of many risk factors for breast cancer. Other factors, such as age and genetics, have a bigger impact on your overall risk. You can't tell how dense your breasts are by size, look or feel. The only way to find out is by having a mammogram.
