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Roadtrippin' in Whitecourt and chatting up Canadian country music artist Michelle Wright

Awardwinning Canadian singersongwriter Michelle Wright, along with Jason McCoy and Doc Walker. was in town last week for the Great Canadian Roadtrip tour. Their Thursday night show at the AJMC blew the roof off the place as attendees enjoyed songs from all three acts, with many dancing the night away on the dance floor.

Last Thursday night, the lights in the fieldhouse at the Allan and Jean Millar Centre were turned down low as everything else was turned up: excitement, fun, and, most importantly, sound. The Great Canadian Roadtrip is a cross-country tour featuring three wellknown country acts, and Whitecourt made the list of places it stopped to visit thanks to the Whitecourt & Woodlands Performing Arts Society.

Michelle Wright, Doc Walker, and Jason McCoy took the stage at the AJMC at 8 pm with a cheering crowd before them, ready to party. Singing all their hits and some new ones, the trio of acts meshed perfectly on the stage together and put on one heck of a show.

Wright is one of Canada's most awarded female country singers of the 90s, with many awards, including an induction into the Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame. The daughter of two performer parents, who also worked hard as farmers, Wright grew up in a musical household and holds fond memories of watching her parents perform on the local circuit of Merlin, Ontario, near Chatham.

Getting on the tour bus and travelling the country with Doc Walker and Jason Mc-Cov has been a wonderful experience for Wright. The tour started late last year with the central leg, focused on Ontario, and they are now making their way through the west. They are planning an eastern leg this spring. "There's just something special and wonderful about playing music together, hanging out on the bus, and being with the fans. It's a real adrenaline rush. It's a unique experience that not everyone gets to have in their lifetime."

She said the camaraderie of life on the bus is like nothing else. "You're working together towards something, and you get up on that stage, and you get to feel that reward of the feedback from the crowd and just the fun of being together. It's a beautiful thing," said Wright, speaking to the Whitecourt Press before the show.

Seeing different generations out in the audience is another treat of tour life. "That's what you hope for. You put your music out there and hope that it stands the test of time and that the next generation will come and see you. I'm certainly very thankful to be experiencing that," said Wright. The crowd in Whitecourt featured youths up to seniors, with everyone having a great time.

When it comes to performing, Wright said her biggest hits remain favourites for her to sing live. "There's

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no doubt that Take It Like A Man is still one of those magic moments every night for me, and Safe In The Arms of Love and He Would Be Sixteen and Nobody's Girl. People just love those. I look down at my set list and look forward to performing those songs every chance I get."

Hearing people sing her songs back to her from the audience is a feeling Wright said she will never forget. "It's a thrill. What more can I say? It's an exciting, wonderful, rewarding, humbling experience to have these songs that have been out there all these years and to have people singing them back to you. It's fabulous."

One of her biggest hits, He Would Be Sixteen, almost didn't happen. Wright explained that she wasn't sure if she should record it. "I wasn't going to record it initially. I thought, who wants to hear this song? But I guess it's iust so honest and an experience that a lot of women have had to deal with. I could not have imagined that it would've been that special," she said, calling the song magical and special. The crowd in Whitecourt could be heard singing along, which Wright thanked

them for.

When asked how she felt performing in a small town versus a big city, Wright said once the show begins, it doesn't matter one bit. She said people come to shows to turn the world off for a bit. "Once we are all together under that rooftop, it's a universal thing, and we all come together to share a night of music. I count on the fact that once the lights come down and the music starts, the magic starts."

Along with her biggest hits, Wright also performed some of her latest songs from her 2022 album Milestone, celebrating the 30th anniversary of her biggest hit, Take It Like A Man. Wright said they kept everything the same from the original but freshened it up sonically. She even had four of the six original musicians join her in the studio to record it.

The record includes new songs and some she's kept undercover, waiting for the right time to bring them out. "Faithless Kind was a song I've had for twenty years. Lovin' This Day, I've also had it for twenty years. This album combines a celebration of Take It Like A Man and taking a moment to record songs that I loved with all my heart but couldn't get the record labels to agree to record them. I thought, you know what, this is my record, and I'm going to record these songs. And I finally did.'

I'm With You, originally recorded by Delbert McClinton in 1990, caught Wright's attention one day on the radio. "I went, man, that song is so cool. Someday, I'll want to record that song. So, I recorded it on this record." Wright said she couldn't pick a favourite if she tried. The first single. Small Town. takes her back to her roots, growing up in a small farming community. "It's perfect for anybody from a small town," she said. The song even samples the Canadian anthem and mentions the Stanley Cup, which the Whitecourt crowd cheered

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
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Contradictions and confusion surround a shake-up in the AJHL





A massive shake-up is happening in the AJHL, with back-and-forth statements coming in fast enough to give fans whiplash. Two sides, with two different views and what looks to be an ill-timed announcement, are at the center of the controversy.

At noon on Saturday, January 20, the British Columbia Hockey League (BCHL) threw an announcement up on its social media and main website, igniting a firestorm of questions and confusion for Junior A hockey fans in British Columbia and Alberta. The announcement was short just 71 words long, and stated that five Alberta-based teams had "committed to terms" with the BCHL for the 2024-25 season.

The teams were the Blackfalds Bulldogs, Brooks Bandits, Okotoks Oilers, Sherwood Park Crusaders and Spruce Grove Saints. Four of the five teams make up the top four teams in the AJHL, and several, including the Brooks Bandits, have dominated the league for years.

Aside from mentioning that further information on the league structure would be forthcoming in the weeks ahead, the announcement said that no further comment would be coming until more information was available. One could say the BCHL had knocked down the proverbial Jenga tower and then left the room.

The difference between the BCHL and the AJHL is the connection to Hockey Canada. On June 1. 2023, the BCHL severed its ties with Hockev Canada and became independent with 18 teams, including one in Washinton State. Their reasoning behind the change stemmed from a feud with Hockey Canada on various topics, including recruitment. "The BCHL will now be able to recruit U18 players from other provinces, as well as from the USA and outside of North America," read the BCHL's release.

BCHL CEO Chris Hebb explained that players on major junior teams, one league above Junior A, are disqualified from playing in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) because the league is professional. Junior A leagues remain eligible. However, they can only play in their home province, which is limiting to those who have their hopes set to play somewhere else.

By separating from Hockey Canada, the BCHL could recruit 16-and 17-year-olds from other provinces and abroad and not be limited by the regulations under Hockey Canada. The BCHL said it

had over 400 alums on NCAA Division 1 rosters last season, more than every junior league in Canada, combined. Their move to leave Hockey Canada made waves across the country.

Following BCHL's January 20 release about five Alberta-based teams joining their now unsanctioned league, the AJHL took to its social media to react. They said the BCHL announcement informed them like it did for everyone else, appearing to insinuate that it was a blindside.

"No official notice has been provided to the AJHL from the respective teams," read the AJHL's announcement. "As a league, we are assessing next steps and schedule implications," it continued, then listed four cancelled games that same weekend, which included the five teams in question. The White-court Wolverines, who were set to play the Brooks Bandits on Sunday, January 21, ended up heading home instead and those games are no longer listed on the schedule.

In the days that followed the back-to-back announcements, chatter online heated up, with the topic even being discussed on national hockey broadcasts commentators chiming in on the situation. Online, some fans were upset to see the announcement coming mid-season, questioning the BCHL's motives. "Why would you release this mid-season? Now, a lot of players, families and businesses are severely affected in Alberta. It should have been announced in May or

June. All of this could have been avoided," wrote one fan. "It's a big mistake to leave an established 60-year-old league," wrote another, this time on a White-court Wolverine's Facebook post.

On January 25, the AJHL announced that all games between the five BCHL-bound hockey teams and the remaining AJHL teams were cancelled, but that the leaving teams could play their remaining scheduled games against each other. That means the Brooks Bandits cannot play against the Whitecourt Wolverines, but they can play against the Sherwood Park Crusaders, but only if a game was already scheduled to happen.

Shortly after, the confusion grew tenfold

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as the five teams released a joint press release stating they "remain members in good standing of the Alberta Junior Hockey League, Canadian Junior Hockey League, Hockey Alberta, and Hockey Canada." They said they hadn't entered into any agreement to leave any of the above-listed organizations. They also said they hadn't announced anything themselves, which was true. The only entity that had made any official announcement was the BCHL, when they said the five Alberta teams had "committed to terms" with them.

The AJHL quickly followed with a public response the next morning, demanding clarity. "The AJHL is aware of the contradictory statements coming from the BCHL

and five defecting clubs and the negative impact they are having on our players and their families," read their release. The AJHL also pointed to media statements by Brooks Bandit's President Paul Seaton days prior: "Nothing has been signed yet, but an agreement has been reached, and our board has agreed to it unanimously. The information wasn't supposed to be out until May 1." By Seaton's own words, it sounded like the BCHL's announcement was released a few months too early. Talk about a mistake!

The AJHL has called on the BCHL and the five clubs to provide "immediate clarification," given that both sides presented contradictory statements. "Until such time as the AJHL is satisfied that there are no plans for the five clubs to de-

part the league to play unsanctioned hockey, the current scheduling decisions remain in place."

Should the five teams go through with leaving the AJHL, the

league will drop from 16 to 11 teams and the Whitecourt Wolverines will jump into first place based on current standings. As this situation develops, the Whitecourt

Press will continue to update fans. The Wolverines' schedule remains in the air, as they were scheduled to play several of the now cancelled teams in early February. The next possible match-up is on Friday, February 9, against the Bonnyville Pontiacs. Other schedule changes will be shared as updates roll out from the AJHL. Hang tight, fans!







Whitecourt Revz Club Volleyball held a bottle drive on Saturday and ended up with a mountain of bottle-filled bags. Pictures on the club's Facebook page showed players all smiles, standing in the Whitecourt Bottle Depot with a massive pile of bottles bagged up behind them. People donating could either drop off in person in the Walmart parking lot or have their bottles picked up at home. A trailer on site from Eagle River Chrysler was full by the end of the event, and volunteers from Hendrickson Black kept everyone fed by working the grill. The bottle drive greatly supports the club, and its success is a testament to everyone's hard work. Way to go!


Putting a face on suicide


Sticking to the plan

As expected, the Bank of Canada is holding the line on rates and providing few clues as to what's next. We are also 'holding' our call for the first rate cut in June, with our forecast putting the policy rate at 4% by year end.

This week's Bank of Canada rate announcement was as expected. The biggest news in our view? The Bank dropped their "prepared to raise" rates warning in the official

statement, a dovish move. But then Governor Tiff Macklem in the press conference said they'd raise rates if necessary. Still, the notable absence of the hawkish wording is a sign that rate hikes are in the rearview mirror.

In the fable, the tortoise wins the race. The Bank of Canada seems to agree. As it pivots to lower rates, it will remain patient and slow. The Bank is faced with a stagnant economy (contracting in per capita terms), which by itself should be enough to rein in inflation. But there are inflation pressures lingering: core inflation is hanging tough around 3.5%, inflation expectations are high,



and wage growth is sticky. Once we see these things soften, expect rate cuts to be around the corner.

forecast On the

front, there was little movement. Real GDP growth was revised down again (by only 0.1 percentage points) to 0.8% in 2024 and

2.4% in 2025. Inflation was also revised down slightly, with the Bank saying we should expect 2% 'in 2025'.

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

Whitecourt Town Council updates

The 2023 Municipal Enforcement Annual Report has been accepted as information by Whitecourt Town Council. The report is prepared annually for the Alberta Solicitor General, and outlines activities conducted by Municipal Enforcement Services throughout the year. Over the course of the year, 1,772 activities were logged by the Whitecourt Peace Officer and Bylaw Officer.

Per the Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework Arbitration Award, Woodlands County must provide Whitecourt input on the use of the Whitecourt Fire Department's Aerial Pumper (Tower 1) within the fire services area. Woodlands County has requested that the Aerial Pumper not be utilized on any fires within Woodlands County or for any 911 fire calls within the fire/ rescue response area for the 2024 calendar year.

Whitecourt will submitting grant application for \$2,754,258 in funding to the Canada Cultural Spaces Fund for construction of the Arts, Culture and Convention Centre component of the Culture & Events Centre. Information on the Culture & Events Centre can be found at www.cultureandeventscentre.

The Government of Alberta has requested municipalities prepare a Housing Needs Assessment so that it can March 1, 2024. A redevelop solutions to view of Whitecourt's address unique local needs. Over the last several months, Town of Whitecourt representatives have met with key community stakeholders to develop Whitecourt's assessment and the following priorities were

identified:

- 1. Non-Market Bachelor/1 Bedroom/2 Bedroom Housing with Tenant Supports;
- 2. Seniors Self-Contained Affordable Housing with Supports;
- 3. Transitional Housing with Support.

The Whitecourt Housing Needs Assessment will be submitted to the Province and utilized by local organizations and forprofit companies to support future grant applications.

Alberta Health Services is now providing the Assertive Outreach Services (AOS) program in Whitecourt. The program provides support services to adults living with severe and persistent mental illnesses. Individuals who qualify for the program will be able to access clinical and outreach services at no cost.

Whitecourt Town Council has approved a \$50,000 payment to the Whitecourt District Agricultural Society to be used for operating.

Whitecourt Council has approved the removal of reserve designations on two parcels of land in Festival Park. Once approved by the Alberta Land Titles Registrar, Whitecourt will be able to proceed with consolidating 13 parcels of land in Festival Park into one large parcel.

New Planning and Development fees will come into effect fee structure was completed to ensure development in Whitecourt remains competitive.

The Mayor and Deputy Mayor will be attending the Alberta Municipalities Spring Leaders Caucus in March 2024.


