Alberta faced a 94 percent increase in food bank visits last year compared to 2019

As anyone buying groceries or paying the monthly utility bills can attest, costs for most

things have skyrocketed, with each year seemingly rising higher than before. From that, it shouldn't be surprising that growing numbers of Canadians are struggling and relying more on the existing





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Usage numbers at food banks across Canada continue to increase. Alberta has some of the highest numbers, and data from the Whitecourt Food Bank, sadly, proves it.

Each year, Food Banks Canada compares the usage data from March, collected from food banks across the country, to see the trends for that given year. In the early fall, the compiled data, called the Hunger Count, goes live. For the last few years, the increased usage at food banks has been staggering, and unfortunately, that trend didn't slow down in 2023.

"It's very, very bad," said Food Bank Coordinator Tara Bartsch. "As of March 2023, 18.4 percent of Canadians were living with food insecurities, and Canada had over 1.9 million visits to food banks." Nationally, there was a thirty-two percent increase in visits from 2022 to 2023, but compared to 2019, the increase is 78.5 percent. Provincially, it momentarily gets a bit better before getting much worse. "There were 174,311 visits to Alberta food banks in March of last year, which was an 11.9 percent increase from 2022," said Bartsch. The year-toyear increase was less than the National increase, but the difference from 2019 to 2023 is where things take a

turn. "There was a 94.1 percent increase in food bank visits in Alberta from 2019's numbers to 2023's numbers," she said.

What's even worse is that the comparison between March 2019 and March 2023 in Alberta wasn't even the highest percentage change in the country. Quebec saw a 97.8 percent difference between the two years, and Ontario had a 100.6 percent change, the highest of all provinces and territories. "It's just continuing to go up, and it's not going to get better," said Bartsch.

National and provincial numbers are a high-level snapshot of what's happening in the country, but when one pinches the screen and zooms down to the local level, a complete picture can be seen. The Whitecourt Food Bank provides hampers to 200 families on average. Each family registered can access a hamper fill six times a year, and staff aim to provide two weeks' worth of groceries per hamper. With not even two months completed into 2024, Bartsch said some of the families they serve have already used several of their fills. "After Christmas, it's always higher for people need-

ing help, but usually it comes down a bit. March is coming, and it hasn't come down yet. People are struggling. They get six fills a year, and for some people, that's almost gone for this year already."

She said high bills and inflated grocery prices are cited as reasons this year has been so hard. "We are seeing double-income families struggling to put food on the table. They rent, and their bills are insanely high. Do you pay the power bill or feed your kids? So, then they come here, and we feed them. It's not just low-income families. Families of four and five are struggling to feel themselves too."

Nationally, single people continue to be the highest users of food banks, with over 40 percent reported in March 2023. Two-parent families are also on an upward trend, rising just over two percent, from 18.8 percent in 2019 to 21 percent in 2023. "It's hard to keep up with those families. Our freezers are low all the time," said Bartsch.

Higher usage has led to emptier shelves lately,

with some items hard to keep on hand. "Shelf-stable foods that can help stretch a meal, like tuna or Hamburger Helper or things like cereal, are what we lack most," she said. Toiletries are also scarce, with deodorant, shampoo/conditioner, and body wash baskets empty.

The food bank also offers non-food items to help fill gaps. "If you don't have food in your kitchen, you probably don't have laundry soap or toiletries. Why would you spend extra money on laundry detergent if you can't afford food?" Bartsch said they also recently started a laundry program asking for powdered detergent. "How do you get a job, or maintain one, if you can't afford to do laundry and have clean clothes? No one wants to send their kids to school in dirty clothes. We want to try and help with that." Non-food items come solely through donations because food bank funds are used for buying food only.

For those who need to access the food bank but can't make it during

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Two area ag societies could soon see a funding influx if policy change in Woodlands **County receives green light**



Changes are in motion to give two ag society groups in Woodlands County more funding. Woodlands County Council recently discussed a proposed policy change at their Governance and Priorities Committee meeting.

When Woodlands County entered its financial recovery plan at the end of 2019, the move came with a large review of programs, policies, and expenditures to find ways to reduce costs. One of the many options that Woodlands County Council asked its administration to investigate was the funds given to community groups for events and programs run in the municipality.

In early 2020, a change to Policy 7002 - Community Organization Capital & Operating Grants was approved, which reduced the utility reimbursement to said

groups by fifteen percent, from 90 percent to 75 percent. Changes also included a maximum amount for maintenance for halls and outdoor spaces such as playgrounds, ice rinks and ball diamonds. Policy updates took office administration costs, like accounting, office supplies, janitorial and website fees, off the funding table but kept insurance subsidies at 75 percent, with the remaining 25 percent being covered through the operating grant groups received.

Heather Anderson, Community Services Coordinator for Woodlands County, explained how and why the policy changed and

what changes were being proposed now that the policy had received another look-over. "You asked that we look at ways to reduce funding but continue to still support our groups," she began, speaking to the changes that came in 2020.

"What this policy guides is how much we subsidize and how much we provide for capital, but tonight we are talking about the operating side of this grant," she added, speaking at the Governance & Priorities Committee meeting on the evening of February 21. The committee features all the council and gives the elected officials a chance to talk openly about policy changes and other topics before voting on them at a regular meeting.

Anderson explained that the changes in 2020, which lowered utility subsidies and placed caps on amenity funding, gave them consistent numbers to budget. "We budgeted for that maximum amount, and if they (a community group) were under, then we were under too, so we had that surplus. Not only did we reduce what we were funding, we were still giving them a good amount of money, but it was helpful to us (because it) reduced budgeting risk and was more consistent," she said.

If a group was capped at funding of \$5,000 and only used \$2,500 in one year, then the remaining half provided the County with a small surplus. The decision was made that after two years with the changes in place, the County would check in with groups to see how things were going. In 2022, the pandemic was in full swing, which paused the check-in for two more years.

This year, Anderson said the Community Services Committee reviewed the policy and had one recommended change to pass to the Governance & Priorities Committee for review. The recommendation focused on the Agricultural Societies in Woodlands County, which includes Fort Assiniboine, Anselmo and Whitecourt & District.

Under 5.1 of Policy 7002, it states that "Agricultural Societies will be funding at less their Agricultural Societies Grant." The Agricultural Societies Grant is provided by the Alberta Association of Agriculture Societies (AAAS). Woodlands County's policy means that if a group received, sav. \$10,000 from the AAAS, any funding they qualified for from Woodlands County

would be lowered by that amount. Other groups did not see the same deduction, just the ag societies, because of the funding they could access from AAAS.

However, after the changes in 2020 placed caps on funding, two societies (Anselag mo and Whitecourt & District) received nothing. "We came to council when that first happened, and Council agreed to say that they could get a minimum of \$5,000," which was the minimum the other groups received, explained Anderson.

Both ag societies received \$5,000 each in 2022 and 2023 and fully paid insurance premiums. To compare, in 2018, the Whitecourt & District Ag Society received just over \$37,000 from Woodlands County. In 2019, they received thirty-one

thousand; in 2020, they received around \$28,000. Dropping to zero before Woodlands approved up to \$5,000 in 2022 would have been a big hit.

The Community Services Committee proposed removing the line from the policy so that ag societies in Woodlands County would not see their funding lowered based on what they received from the Alberta Association of Agriculture Societies. "All of our community groups do amazing things, but our ag societies are active, and they are doing great things in their communities, and they do a lot of programming. This would still keep it fair with the rest of the community groups but maintain the level of funding that we give to them so they can operate," added Anderson.

From a financial standpoint, Woodlands County is not expecting to see much for implications budget through 2024 because they budgeted each group's funding allotments at the maximum amount, which most groups don't reach. leaving room in this year's budget to soak up most, if not all, of the overage. "Actuals have been under budget every year," said Anderson.

In 2025, Woodlands County may need to adjust funding towards the groups to sidestep the off chance that all groups use their total maximum funding in any given year, which could result in going over budget. If Woodlands County Council votes to approve the policy changes at an upcoming meeting, the Anselmo Ag Society could see an additional \$15,000 in funding, and the Whitecourt & District Ag Society could see \$28,000.

Hinton RCMP requests public assistance after a fraud complaint leads to arrest

On Jan. 19, 2024, Hinton RCMP received a fraud complaint regarding a victim who met a man claiming to be an ex-RCMP member and could get him a good deal on a repossessed vehicle. Money was given to the male suspect by the victim but the male stopped all further communication. After a detailed investigation. it was found that two people were involved looking for his wherein the fraud, neither of which were ever employed by the RCMP. As a result of the investigation, Alvina

Strauss (78), a resident of Ardrossan, Alta., was arrested and charged with Fraud under \$5000 (x2), Obstruct police and Assault on police. Strauss was released on conditions, including a Feb. 21, 2024 court date at the Alberta Court of Justice in Hinton, which she failed to attend. The court has issued a warrant for her arrest.

Furthermore, Dwain Donald Wog (76), a resident of Hinton, was charged with Fraud under \$5000 (x2). Hinton RCMP are currently abouts and a warrant for his arrest has been issued by the courts. Hinton RCMP believe that Wog and

Strauss have other victims throughout Alberta. Anyone who may have been victim of a similar fraud, or who has information on Wog's and Strauss' whereabouts, is asked to call the Hinton RCMP at 780-865-5544, or their local police. Retail sales* in Alberta increased by 0.9% in December. The growth followed a 0.5% increase in November.

Annual sales came in at \$102 billion and were 4.4% higher than in 2022.

Motor vehicle and parts dealers saw their sales increase by \$2 billion (7.7%) last

year offsetting a \$2 billion drop (-14.1%) in sales at gas stations.

The only other major category tracked by Statistics Canada that saw sales decrease last year was the furniture, electronics and appliances sector at -0.4%. Annual sales in Calgary grew by 5.7% (\$1.8 billion) and by 3.0% (\$1.0 billion) in

Edmonton. Nationally, retail sales increased by 0.9% in December with sales higher in eight provinces.

Statistics Canada's advance estimate points to a 0.4% decrease in January 2024. Annual sales in Canada grew by 2.2% in 2023 with every province posting higher numbers.

Alberta offers all children routine immunizations free of charge. By following the routine immunization schedule, your child will be protected against vaccine-preventable diseases at the most effective ages and stages.

Routine immunizations are more important than ever. Cases of pertussis have increased in Alberta in the last few months and have been identified in all AHS zones. Pertussis is a vaccine-preventable bacterial infection. It can impact people of all ages; however, infants one year and younger are at greatest risk of serious complications.



There are several ways to book an appointment for a routine immunization for your child:

- Use the Find Healthcare search tool to find an AHS public health centre close to you. Choose the facility type and select "public health centre."
- Use the Find Community Health Centres search tool.
- Call Health Link at 811 to find a centre nearest you.
- Talk to your family doctor or nurse practitioner. Visit Find a Doctor | Alberta Health Services. AHS also offers rou-

tine immunizations in

schools for children in Grades 6 and 9, in addition to offering immunization to Grade 1 students who are delayed for their routine immunizations. A consent form is sent home with an information sheet for each vaccine recommended for the student. No immunizations will be given in

school without consent from a parent or legal guardian.



The Canadian Dental Care Plan is here: What you need to know

(NC) The federal government has begun to roll-out the Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP), which will cover some of the cost of most basic oral health care services for uninsured Canadians.

Once fully implemented, the plan will offer dental coverage for up to nine million people in Canada. It's specificaltargeted ly towards Canadians with an annual family income under \$90,000 who do not have access to dental insurance.

The application process is opening in phases, starting with seniors.

How to apply

Individuals who may be eligible have begun receiving letters from the federal government, inviting them to apply for the plan.

Keep an eye out for one of these letters if you:

- will be 70 years old as of March 2024;
- have a family income of less than 90,000; and
- have filed your 2022 tax return.

The letter includes instructions on how to confirm your eligibility and apply by telephone.

Only seniors who receive a letter will be able to apply before May 2024. Here's when seniors can expect to receive their letter:

- December 2023: ages 87 and above
- January 2024: ages 77 to 86
- February 2024: ages 72 to 76
- March 2024: ages 70 to 71

As of May 2024, applications shift from telephone only to an online portal and will open for eligible seniors 65 and older. More information on this portal will be available closer to its launch date.

Canadians with a valid Disability Tax Credit certificate and children

under 18 will be able to apply online starting in June 2024.

All other eligible residents will be able to apply in 2025. After you have

applied

If your application is successful, starting in March, you will be sent a welcome package by Sun Life, the administrator managing the plan on behalf of the government. The package will include a member card and a start date for your coverage.

Seniors will be able to start seeing an oral health provider as early as May 2024 but start dates for coverage will vary based on when you can apply, when the application is received and when your enrolment is completed.

What's covered

The plan will help cover most basic dental services, such as checkups, x-rays, teeth cleaning, fillings, dentures, root canals and some oral surgeries.

The CDCP will reimburse a percentage of the cost at the plan's established fees. These depend on the members' income level, and some people may have to pay the rest of the expense amount out of pocket. For example:

• if you have a family income under \$70,000, you can have 100 per cent of eligible costs covered;

- if your family income is between \$70,000 and \$79,999, 60 per cent of eligible costs can be covered; and
- with a family income between \$80,000 and \$89,999, 40 per cent of eligible costs can be covered.

You may have to pay fees in addition to the potential co-payment if:

- your oral health provider charges more than the CDCP fees
- you agree to receive care that the plan doesn't cover

Before receiving oral health care, you should always ask your oral health provider about any costs that won't be covered by the plan.

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
the daytime, the Whitecourt Food Bank now has night access once a month. "Every second Thursday of the month, we will be open for hamper fills from 5-8 pm. Perishable boxes won't be available then, but hamper fills will be," explained Bartsch. The next night will be on March 14.

To keep the shelves well stocked, the Whitecourt Food Bank relies heavily on community support. "We are grant and donation only. Evervthing here is purchased through grants or donations. If we don't have that support in the community, then we don't have a food bank." She said the groups, businesses and residents who support the food bank make everything possible. "We couldn't do any of this without their amazing generosity."

The Whitecourt Food Bank has several events on the books to help boost donations. On March 15 and 16, the food bank van will be at Walmart for National Food Bank Day. Staff will be there on Friday and Saturday, gratefully collecting donations. They are also doing bi-weekly Meat Draws at the Crown and Anchor. Wellspring and the Food Bank will take turns being the recipient each week. "The money will go towards adding to fills. I'm hoping that we can increase the hamper fills from six a year to seven, or maybe even eight, just to give more food."

at 1 pm, the food bank is holding a free World Hunger Day barbecue and will be accepting donations. "Eagle River Casino is donating hamburgers, hot dogs and smokies and Pembina is donating the use of their barbecue and supplying us with juice and water." Bartsch said she hopes to have gardeners on hand to teach about growing food at home. Food bank tours will also be available.

Food bank staff will also be handing out Teen Bags at this year's Party in the Park event. "Millar Western was a diamond sponsor and gave us their table. The bags will have some shelf-stable foods, hopefully some fresh vegetables and fruit, and info on mental health resources in town," said Bartsch. Perishable boxes are available Monday, Wednesday and Friday. No ID is needed, but they go fast. Bartsch recommends getting in line at the food bank by 11:30 am. Hamper fills are available on the same days and require proof of
