Unforgettable game seven slugfest between Wolverines and Eagles leads to tough start against Calgary Canucks in the AJHL Finals

As any die-hard sports fan knows, sudden death thresholds are both exciting and nerve-wracking. Whitecourt Wolverines and Canmore Eagles fans felt that roller coaster rush last week as their second-round playoff battle extended to game seven, making for an exciting yet highly stressful final game.

With 700 fans in the

second-highest crowd size of the playoffs and third-highest for the season, the intensity and the volume were up. In the first period, Canmore

Two community organizations left grateful after a 'Big Assist' from Kruger and Whitecourt Minor Hockey

The Whitecourt Minor Hockey Association (WMH) is competing to take home a \$75,000 grand prize from Kruger Big Assist. Kruger, the parent company for Cashmere, Purex, Scotties, Sponge Towels, and Bonterra, opened submissions for the program last fall. WMH was selected as one of five regional winners earlier this year, winning \$25,000, which they will use to help offset registration costs and other financial barriers that hinder youth participation in their association.

On top of the cash prize, they also received paper products from Kruger. The considerable delivery of paper towels and toilet paper arrived after the hockey season ended. Rather than find a spot for a bunch of boxes to

sit until next season, the association decided to pay it forward. "The program core value is that every assist counts, and in the true spirit of that, WMH decided to make a donation to Wellspring Family Resources & Crisis Centre and the Whitecourt Foodbank by splitting the big shipment in half," explained WMH President Rand Richards.

"We believe our hockey program focuses on building good people and athletes on and off the ice. Our athletes always participate in initiatives that give back to the community. Both organizations, the Foodbank and Wellspring, support vulnerable members in the community, so the decision was very easy," she said. "Giving back helps unite the community and bridge some of the social and economic gaps," added Richards.

Wellspring's Executive Director, Becky Wells, said the donation was unexpected and very generous. "We are always needing things like paper products. We give those to clients and help set up others and also for use at our shelter. Everything has gone up in price, so this is really exciting, and we are really thankful."

Wells said Joanne Belke, Wellspring's board Treasurer, was the initial point of contact. "Joanne had mentioned that Whitecourt Minor Hockey had received this wonderful donation, and unfortunately, it was kind of past the time that they could utilize it, so she asked if we could utilize it. I said absolutely," explained Wells.

Wells said playing sports is good for kids as it helps them connect with others and be active. For those who find sports restrictive because of financial constraints, funding, like the \$25,000 WMH received in the first stage of the competition, will go a long way to helping community youth get on the ice. She said Well-

spring's store, Twice Is Nice, also plays a role by helping provide sports-related items, along with many other things, to families in need. "People don't realize that our store is tied to Wellspring. That's part of us. And part of us is giving back to the community. If you can't afford things, and your kid would like to play, come and talk to us. We can try to see what we can round up for you and see what we have at the store that can help you if that's the barrier."

The synergy of WMH sharing their and prize helping Wellspring and the Food Bank is another example of the power of community. As Richards alluded to, it plays right into the spirit of the competition they are still part of. On April 16, WMH will find out if they are crowned the overall champ, which comes with another check, this time for \$75,000.

Since 2021, The Kruger Big Assist program has given over \$600,000 to more than 40 hockey communities across the country. This year will add

another \$200,000 to that tally. The four other finalists alongside WMH, who received \$25,000 each and are awaiting the announcement for the extra \$75,000, are the Fernie Minor Hockey Association, St. Catharine's CYO Minor Hockey League, Beaujeu Minor Hockey Association, and TASA Minor Hockey Association.

Kruger asked that associations REACH those in their community in need of financial assistance, INSPIRE youth to fall in love with the sport, SUPPORT vouth in developing life skills they can use outside the arena, and EN-COURAGE diversity and inclusion in the community through hockey initiatives.

In its grand prize submission, WMH detailed how it would use the \$75,000 to create the Root Beer League Inclusion Initiative, a new, accessible format of hockey that would include all ages and skill levels with no formal teams or travel necessary. They would also create an Equipment Loan Program to loan out skates, sticks

and protective gear to remove financial barriers from parents whose children want to play but can't afford the equipment needed.

The submission also detailed that they would promote the league throughout the community, including schools, community centers and local businesses. recruit and train volunteers to keep things fun and safe for everyone, and continuously evaluate the program for future expansion or enhancepossibilities. ment If Whitecourt Minor Hockey wins the top prize, the program will launch in late summer, just in time for the new hockey season.

"I voted for them. I'm rooting for them to win the big prize," said Wells. WMH was named the finalist in the Prairies category, beating out associations across Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba. Community members from each finalist association voted their hearts out last week. The grand prize winner will be announced on Tuesday, April 16, between 4:40 pm and 5:00 pm MDT on TSN.

Whitecourt Town **Council updates**

Whitecourt Town Council has approved the 2024 Budget. The budget supports priorities identified by Council and its intention to sustain service levels, while at the same time making the right investments for the future to ensure the continued sustainability and growth of the community. A 3.77% tax rate increase is required to support the budget. Based on the approved budget, Administration is preparing the Tax Rate Bylaw which will be presented to Council at the April 22, 2024 Regular Meeting. The 2024 Budget Report will subsequently be published at the end of April, and will be posted online at www. whitecourt.ca paper copies will be made available at the Town Office.

Whitecourt is applying to the Forest Re-

source Improvement Association of Alberta (FRIAA) for funding a community fire- guard program. FRIAA recently announced that it will be allocating funds to communities across the province to construct fireguards in high-risk areas to reduce the risk of wildfires.

The 2023 Whitecourt FireSmart Annual Report is available to download on the Whitecourt website. The report details projects undertaken in 2023, and goals for the upcoming year.

The Whitecourt & District Chamber of Commerce will be hosting the Carnival in downtown Whitecourt May 3-5. To allow for set up and take down, area roads will be closed to traffic from April 30 through May 6. Details on the road closures will be posted closer to the event date.





playoff dreams alive. A couple of close calls left fans standing up in their seats to see the action on the far side of the ice. The Wolverines had two big breakaways, during which they attempted to land a puck in the empty net, with one sliding just wide and another bouncing off the goalpost. It was wild!

The Wolverines took the win 3-1, ending the series against the Canmore Eagles and moving on to the finals against the Calgary Canucks. The Wolverines and Canucks had not met in playoff action before. On Friday, April 12, they had their first opportunity to line up against each other for the first game in their best-of-seven series.

The Calgary Canucks finished the regular season in third place, one point behind the second-place Lloydminster Bobcats and eight points behind the first-place Wolverines. The two teams split their four regular-season games against each other, with

two apiece, so this series would likely be evenly matched and tough.

Just over four minutes into the game, Calgary got on the board first. The Wolverines retaliated six minutes later, making it a tied affair, 1-1, thanks to a powerplay marker from Braden Keeble, assisted by Travis Verbeek and Spencer Rheaume (his ninth). The second period featured no scoring and only one penalty, a tripping call against Calgary. In the third period, things opened up, but not in the way the Wolverines fans

wanted. Calgary scored four unanswered goals, all at even strength, winning the game 5-1.

Putting the previous night's loss firmly in the rearview mirror and focusing on game two, the Whitecourt Wolverines laced up their skates on Saturday night, hoping for a better result. In the first period, the Wolverines came out swinging with a few big hits and hard pushes into the Canuck's zone. Neither team scored goals despite the effort, leaving them knotted at 0-0 after twenty minutes.

Talk about a close up.

In the second period, the Canucks lit up the scoreboard, similar to the night before. Three unanswered goals bewildered fans and players alike. Unable to answer back, the period ended with a goose egg for the Wolverines and three eggs in the Canuck's basket.

In the game's final twenty minutes, the Wolverines managed to land two big goals, giving them much-needed momentum. Unfortunately, the push stopped at two goals, and the Canucks

succeeded in extending their lead to five goals. Though hard-fought, the Wolverines dropped game two in a similar fashion to game one, with Calgary getting five goals past the Wolverine's goalie.

Whitecourt's team will face the Canucks on Calgary's turf for game three on Tuesday, April 16 and game four on Wednesday, April 17. If the Wolverines can snag a win in one of those two games (get both, boys!), then game five will be back at JDA Place on Saturday, April 20. Let's go, Wolverines!

productivity imperative

Talk of Canada's sluggish productivity performance has been trending. Senior Deputy Governor Carolyn Rogers recently said the need to bolster productivity is "an emergency - it's time to break the glass".

Productivity is the ability to convert resources (raw materials, people and capital) into output. It ultimately determines a jurisdiction's living standards. Nobel Prize-winning economist Paul Krugman once remarked: "Productivity isn't everything, but, in the long-run, it is almost everything".

While that sounds

important, it also sounds a bit theoretical. It's easy to dismiss productivity as an abstract academic concept.

Incomes are more relatable. In a Hub article released last week, University of Calgary professor Trevor Tombe shows a clear connection between declining real earnings growth and weak productivity, warning the "Great Canadian Slump" is back.

Another way to make the productivity-wage connection is by looking at industries. Statistics Canada maintains detailed productivity accounts for individual industries. As shown in the below figure, there is a strong relationship between the productivity of workers in an industry and the wages it pays.

Energy-related dustries have among the highest levels of productivity and wages in Canada. We recently showed that the majority of Alberta's higher overall labour productivity (vs. the national average) is due to the province having a higher concentration of workers in these industries.

Bottom line: Productivity shouldn't be dismissed as a theoretical or academic concern. When labour productivity suffers on a sustained basis, it ultimately translates into lower overall wages for workers.




