Whitecourt RCMP Traffic Unit seizes drugs during traffic stops



On April 18, 2024, in 2022. The driver a resident of Calgary, at 7:45 p.m., Alberta RCMP Traffic -Whitecourt Unit was performing roving patrols in Whitecourt. A driver on Hwy 43 was observed not wearing a seatbelt. A roadside stop was conducted and the Alberta RCMP Traffic Unit officer noted that the VIN did not match the registration and insurance documents. It was determined that the vehicle had been stolen out of Didsbury, Alta.,

was arrested and a search of the vehicle incidental to arrest revealed the following items, valued at over \$10000, which were seized:

- 156 grams of suspected methamphetamine;
- 8.5 grams of suspected cocaine;
- 7 grams of suspected hash; and
- Break in tools.

As a result of the investigation, Amanda Lee McVittie (52),

- was charged with:
- Possession for the purpose of trafficking(x2);
- Possession of stolen property over \$5000;
- Possession of break in tools;
- Breach of undertaking; and
- Traffic Safety Act tickets (x4).

McVittie was released on conditions and is to appear at the

perfect spot for it. "We happen to have two bus stops in front of our home, which is why I wanted to place it there. We also happen to have a decorative bench on our property, and it's one of my greatest thrills to look out in the morning and see children waiting for the bus, sitting on the bench, reading a book. It makes my day."

The success at her corner lot at 30 Park Drive inspired another Rotarian to place one in their front yard. From there, Astill reached out to Rotary about officially becoming involved. "I brought it up and indicated that we are very much a supporter of literacy and children in particular. I thought that would be a great project for Rotary, and of course, Rotary jumped on board," she explained.

On Wednesday, May 1, two more mini libraries were placed, blazoned with Rotary stickers, thanks to a donation from Topline Promotions. "The big premise is community but also that literary is so important. What fun to be able to take a book, leave a book or even browse through them and see what's in there," said Astill.

Rotary is an international club, and literacy worldwide is a significant pillar of its focus. "We are very fortunate in Canada that our literacy rates are much higher than those of developing countries. Having said

that, literacy is still on our radar, too, because of so much social media and people being online. It's never a bad idea to have books in the hands of children, adults, and anyone interested

reading. It's of huge importance to make sure people can read," explained Astill.

The newest mini libraries are on the corner by the Whitecourt Fire Hall and at 37 Sunset Boule-

vard in front of Crestview Apartments. The Rotary Club received permission from the Town of Whitecourt and Crestview to place the structures. She said they might look into putting more out in the

future and have already received requests.

Astill said the Whitecourt Public Library had also been a big help. "As soon as we even mentioned it, they were in huge support of it. They've put some mini libraries out in the community and helped others. They are very generous whenever I need some books in the mini library in front of my home. They always have used books at the back that I can purchase for a small amount, or they give me extra books. The extra mile they've gone to support the project is huge."

The mini library project also ties in with a program that Rotary is part of, thanks to a generous and well-known country singer from the USA. "The Dolly Parton Imagination Library is a program that Dolly Parton herself started in the United States. She grew up very poor and started this to bring books to children that would never have a book of their own." The program has since expanded and is now in five countries: the USA, the United Kingdom, Australia, Canada, and the Republic of Ireland. Nearly three million children are registered for it, and over 230 million books have been given out since it started.

"The program that Rotary supports here in Whitecourt is through her foundation. Children aged 0-5 can apply and get a book mailed to them

each month for free. Parents can sign up on our website. The books are age-specific for your child's age, but they also have a lot of Canadian content. They also try, when two books go to the same household, not to duplicate them, and they change the books all the time. What a thrill it is for a child to open the mailbox every month and have a brand-new book addressed to them that they can read," said Astill.

Local Rotary Clubs keep track of everyone who signs up in their area, and if someone moves without reregistering their new address, the books are sent to the club. Now, those extra books will have somewhere to go. "Sometimes we give them out if we are at a trade fair, but we also use those books to put into our mini-libraries," explained Astill. "It all ties together." Thanks to the Whitecourt Rotary Club, many local families are getting to enjoy Dolly Parton's generosity in more ways than

Whitecourt has several mini-libraries, including ones on Wedow Drive, Whitecourt Avenue and at Astill's home on Park Drive. The newest two, the red one at the Fire Hall and the blue one in front of the Crestview Apartments (uptown, near the hospital and AJMC), are up and ready to be enjoyed. Residents are encouraged to take a book, leave a book, or take a peek.

Alberta Court of Justice in Whitecourt on June 11, 2024.

On April 19, 2024 at 5 p.m., Alberta RCMP Traffic — Whitecourt Unit was performing speed enforcement on Hwy 43 near Whitecourt. A vehicle was observed traveling at 146 km/h in a 110km/h zone. An Alberta RCMP Traffic Unit conducted a roadside stop and observed the

windows being rolled down, letting a cloud of cannabis-tinted smoke waft out, while hand rolled cigarettes were being thrown. The officer noted drugs within the vehicle, resulting in the arrest of six people. The vehicle was searched and the following items, valued at over \$90000, were seized:

- 1.2 kilograms of suspected methamphetamine;
- 178.8 grams of sus-

pected cocaine;

- 2938 millilitres of codeine syrup;
- 78 bars of alprazolam; and
- A loaded prohibited handgun.

As a result of the investigation, the following people were arrested:

• Tommy Kayfay (19) and Chino Guiawan (21), both resident of Edmonton, as well as Bradley Mercredi (32) and April Sayine (33), both resident

of Yellowknife, NT, were charged with:

- Possession for the purpose of trafficking (x4);
- Firearm-related offences (x5); and
- Transporting Cannabis/Alcohol within easy access of occupant (x2).
- Gulied Ahmed Umar (19), a resident of Edmonton, was charged with:
- Possession for the purpose of trafficking (x4);

- Firearm-related offences (x6);
- Transporting Cannabis/Alcohol within easy access of occupant (x2);
- Breach of release order (x2); and
- Provincial sanctions (Impaired driving and speeding).
- Suleiman Mohamed Abdow (28), a resident of Edmonton, was charged with:
- Possession for the purpose of traffick-

- ing(x4);
- Firearm-related offences (x6);
- Transporting Cannabis/Alcohol within easy access of occupant (x2);
- Possession of an identity document not belonging to them;
- Obstruct police officer;
- Identity fraud; and
- Breach of release order.

Abdow, Umar, Guiawan, Kayfay, Mercredi, and Sayine were brought before a justice of the peace. Abdow and Umar were remanded into custody, to appear at the Alberta Court of Justice in Whitecourt on May 14, 2024. Guiawan, Kayfay, Mercredi, and Sayine were released on conditions, to appear at the Alberta Court of Justice in Whitecourt on May 14, 2024.





New store construction to start beside No Frills soon following permit approval from Town Council

Activity beside Mike & Rebecca's No Frills has piqued interest in those passing by the area. The grassy treelined field separating motorists on Dahl Drive from the backyards of residences on 45 Street has been a mainstay of the area, beloved by the resident deer population, among other critters. The area was always meant to be a future development spot in the community, with the Town waiting in anticipation for a developer to come knocking.

During Whitecourt Town Council's March 25 regular meeting, the elected officials approved a tree removal application from David Green Tree Services for part of the grassy lot. The area is in a Direct Control land use district, which means that the Council is the authority on any development activity there. developments planned for property in a D-C district need the Council's approval first.

The stretch of land between 52 Avenue and 55 Avenue, which includes Anytime Fitness, No Frills, and the Mobil Gas Bar, falls under D-C and is 6.17 acres, with about half of the land developed. The vacant portion of the property, Council reviewed the

where the field is, has been planned to have two developments on it. The tree removal development permit was for one of the two spots, with the trees on the remaining piece staying put until another development is approved.

Within about a month, the trees were down, and the ground had been raked. The swift removal was due to the Migratory Birds Convention Act, which requires that tree removal not happen between May 1 and August 10 unless approved by a biologist or bird naturalist. The dates protect nesting birds who might be using the trees.

The remaining trees on the undeveloped part of the property, nearest 55 Avenue. across the street from St. Joseph's Parish, will receive FireSmart treatment and cleaned up. The meeting's agenda stated that campfires had been repeatedly taking place within the trees and that cleaning them up might deter the activity, reduce the risk of fire, and make it safer. The agenda also revealed which business wanted to take up shop in the community: Shoppers Drug Mart.

During the April 22 regular meeting, the

development permit application for the store itself. The Shoppers Drug Mart building will be 17,000 square feet and is estimated to employ between 30 and 40 employees once they are open for business.

Kerina Sorochan, Senior Development Officer, and Jenine Loberg, Director of Planning and Development for the Town of Whitecourt, presented the permit application to the Council. Sorochan explained that two areas of the application required consideration as they didn't quite meet the land use bylaw.

The applicant proposed building a new access point to the property from Dahl Drive, 48.7m from the curb of 55 Avenue. The current land use bylaw requires at least 50m. The applicant requested that the Council approve the slightly closer entrance, giving a variance of 1.3m.

The second consideration was that the access point needed to be wider than the land use bylaw allowed. "The applicant proposes construction of a new right-in/right-out only access to Dahl Drive. The proposed access measures 12.48m at the property line and 28.96m at the curb. This exceeds the maximum set out in the land use bylaw of 9.0m at the property line and 13.0m at the curb line," said Sorochan.

She added that the applicant had modelled the size of typical delivery trucks and confirmed that the width they were asking for was required to accommodate the turning movements of delivery vehicles to and from the site. The entrance would allow traffic to flow in off Dahl Drive or back onto it.

Along with the two variance requests, the proposed permit approval before the Council included 34 conditions for the applicant to follow, such as snow removal, purchasing a water meter, ensuring that all service connections are completed to the Town's standards, construction of a drainage system, outdoor garbage storage screened from view, signed fire lanes, and connections for sprinklers.

Victoria Kendrew-Ascah, Senior Manager of Real Estate Development with Loblaws, made the trip from Calgary to attend the meeting. "Thank you to the Mayor and Council for hearing our application today. We appreciate it. I would also really like to thank the town staff who have been really wonderful to work with. We've really worked together to come up with an application that we feel is really strong for you to review today. We

are really proud of our Shoppers Drug Mart offering. We feel that it brings added convenience, added new products, added new healthcare services to the community and we do feel that it will have a significant positive impact."

Councillor Paul Chauvet raised his hand to make the motion to accept the recommendation and to approve both variances and the development permit, giving Shoppers Drug Mart the green light to join the communitv. Mayor Tom Pickard called the vote, which was unanimous, and then said, "Welcome Whitecourt." No start date was given for when construction is expected to begin.

With Launch 8, there are now more than 118,400 staff, physicians and other healthcare providers using Connect Care to improve care for patients. across all five AHS zones. At completion. AHS will have undertaken nine Connect Care launches. launches started in November 2019 and will continue to the final implementation in fall 2024. When fully in place, approximately 125,000 staff and physicians will be using Connect Care at 682 sites across Alberta.

"Each Connect Care launch brings more front-line healthcare workers, physicians and patients together to give healthcare teams a more complete health history for patients, access to consistent information on best practices and resources at their fingertips, while improving our ability to keep information private and secure." says AHS President and CEO Athana Mentzelopoulos. "Healthcare teams can also communicate with patients and each other more easily."

The switch over to Connect Care went as planned as teams at these locations transitioned to the new information system at 5 a.m. today.
