Wednesday, May 15, 2024 Whitecourt joining World Day with a free E

Whitecourt Food Bank Coordinator Tara Bartsch is kickstarting a new annual event. Organizations worldwide have participated in World Hunger Day since its inception in 2011. The United Kingdom was the first to hold the event, which has grown exponentially. Whitecourt wasn't involved until this year.

"I got an email about World Hunger Day, which is on May 28, and I thought that it was really cool. I wondered, what could Whitecourt do?" Bartsch said she called Eris Moncur at Eagle River Casino to float the idea. "He wants to help the community as much as he can and is always doing things and supporting things. I asked if he would like to do a barbecue with us, and he said yes," she explained.

Bartsch then connected with Pembina Pipelines, another hugely supportive community business, and they jumped on board, too. "Pembina Pipeline is bringing in a whole bunch of volunteers and their big barbeque and they are supplying all the juice and water, all free of charge. Eagle River Casino is donating 200 hamburgers, 150 hot dogs, 100 smokies, plus all the buns and condiments. Plus, whatever we don't use, they are making it so we can repackage it and give it to our clients, all free. It's awesome! They are both so generous."

On May 25, from 11 am until 3 pm, at the Carlan Centre, 76 Sunset Boulevard, in the same parking lot as JDA Place, there will be a free barbecue for the community. "We are hoping to feed lots of people," said Bartsch. "We want to give back to the community for being so generous to us."

Bartsch said that if people want to bring a food bank donation, they absolutely can, but it isn't a requirement. "It's totally free to come eat," she said. Once people have had some grub, the doors to the food bank will be open, allowing them to see what things look like inside. "We are going to let people come in and take a tour. We want everyone to see what we do here and what it's all about. We want people to see that it isn't a scary place and that no one should ever be ashamed to come here. We just want to help, and that's why we are here."

She said that for those who have donated, it's also a way to see where their donations go and what the set-up looks like. "We help over 250 families a month. I don't think people fully understand what we do here or the limited space we have to work within. We also have limited food and are constantly working at refilling our shelves or rebuilding stock through donations."

Bartsch said it'll also be nice for the staff to meet community members. "Most of our people here are volunteers. We only have two paid staff. Everyone else is a volunteer who believes in the cause to ensure our community works as best as possible."

She said it would also be an excellent chance for kids to learn about the food bank. Bartsch added that not everyone knows where the food bank is, and this event can help change that. "We hope everyone will become acquainted with the food bank and its location."

Bartsch thanks the community support for making the event possible and hopes to see it grow in the coming years. "Both of these companies, Eagle River Casino and Pembina Pipeline are huge supporters of Whitecourt. We couldn't do this without them. It's pretty amazing to have someone like Eris from Eagle River Casino in the community and businesses like Pembina or Matt from Whitecourt Transport; whatever vou need, they help. They are one of the reasons why Whitecourt is such an amazing community: they are always giving back."


Those wanting to bring some donations along with them are encouraged to bring shelf-stable foods because they last the longest. Ideas include macaroni and cheese. Hamburger Helper, canned meat, beans, or any shelf-stable protein. Another big item that people might not think about donating is toiletries.

"We are always either low on or completely out of toiletries, especially things like razors, shampoo and conditioner, deodorant. Those things are quite expensive, so if you don't have money for food, will you buy toiletries? No, you won't. We also do laundry soap because you need to be able to wash your clothes to get a job or go to work and for your kids to go to school. Those are things we try to have on hand because

they are so important," explained Bartsch.

This year's theme for World Hunger Day is sustainability and reducing waste. "Over 800 million people go hungry daily, and one-third of all food is wasted. That is not sustainable," she said. To help reduce waste at the food bank, Bartsch said she works with local farmers to provide them with unusable perishable foods for their animals rather than throwing them away.

"World Hunger Day is a reminder that hunger is not only a problem of scarcity but of inequality and non-sustainable systems. Low-income families are not the only ones using the food bank. We also see double-income families. Bills are expensive. Rent is crazy expensive, and food is a necessity. People are paying their bills so that they have a roof over their heads, but where does their food come from?"

She said introducing

sustainable choices in the home can help reduce waste and save money. "Food planning is a big thing; it doesn't waste food. If you know what you're eating tomorrow, you're only going to buy those things. That's what we do in our household. We always plan our meals, and Sunday is our cooking and packing day to get ready for the week," explained Bartsch. She said gardening is another great idea, even if it's pots on a windowsill.


Whether users of the food bank or not, Bartsch invites everyone to come have lunch on May 25. "Come meet the people who volunteer their time here. They are hardworking individuals who are absolutely amazing. That's how I started. I worked with Lori, and she was incredible. We can always use more help." The barbecue will be on Saturday, May 25, from 11 am to 3 pm at the food bank, which is located in the Carlan Center beside JDA Place.










Putting a face on suicide






Whitecourt and area residents joined millions of Canadians, and millions more around the globe, in experiencing a rare explosion of the Aurora Borealis on Thursday night and early Friday morning. These images were taken from the Graham Acres parking lot between 12:25 and 12:35 am on Friday. The colours bounced from vibrant greens to red, pink and purple hues, making for an incredible show. Due to a powerful geomagnetic storm, the activity was ranked at five out of a one to five scale (G5-extreme) and the sky indeed showed it. The last time levels of this kind were recorded was in October 2003. The G5 rating can bring with it power outages because it affects voltage and can cause the northern lights to be seen as far south as Florida and Texas, which is rare indeed.

ENHANCED DRIVEWAY CROSSING REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

The Town of Whitecourt is continuing the Enhanced Driveway Crossing Replacement Program for those property owners wishing to upgrade their private driveway crossings. The Town will cost share with the owner up to 60% for the costs associated with the removal, disposal and replacement of the residential driveway crossing installed according to the "Minimum Standard for Local Improvements".

The program is intended for driveways in areas with high profile of older, rolled curb and gutter which create a harsh entrance into private driveways.

The program application for 2024 must be completed, signed and submitted with a minimum \$800.00 deposit prior to May 30, 2024 to be considered for replacement in the current calendar year.

WHITECOURT LAND USE BYLAW **ANSWERS TO YOUR PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT QUESTIONS:**

The Land Use Bylaw impacts everyone in Whitecourt – whether you are building or renovating a home, opening or relocating a business, or building a fence or deck. The Land Use Bylaw guides the permitting processes and regulates the use of land within our community.

Not sure if you need a Permit?

As a property owner, you are responsible for making sure your property meets the requirements of the Land Use Bylaw, including having all of the correct permits. Contact one of our Development Officers for a FREE consultation on your proposed project.

In Residential Districts, most fences can be constructed to a maximum height of 1.8m in rear and side yards, and up to 1.0m within front yards up to the property line. If your property is located on a corner lot or within a Commercial, Industrial, or Urban Services District, the maximum height of a fence is determined by the Development Authority. Contact one of our friendly Development Officers for more information.

Accessory Buildings & Structures

Sheds and garages require a minimum setback of 2m from your house (including deck) and 1m from your side and rear yard property line. Permits are required for accessory buildings or structures over 10m2 and for raised decks that are taller 0.6m.

Businesses & Home Occupations

If you are opening a new business or home occupation, or relocating or changing the use of an existing business (i.e. from service to retail), you need to apply for a Development Permit to ensure your business is in compliance with the Land Use Bylaw. In some cases, a Building Permit and Safety Code inspection may also be required. Our Development Officers are on hand to assist you with your business permits.

Driveways & Parking Pads

Most residential driveways can be up to 6 metres wide. In certain circumstances, some driveways can be 7.25m wide - your Development Officer can confirm the maximum width allowed. All driveways that connect to a town street must be hard surfaced.

Gravel, river rock, or paving stones placed adjacent to the driveway within the Town boulevard is prohibited. An RV parking pad located completely within a property may be allowed, but check with a Development Officer first to ensure it complies with the Land Use Bylaw.

Dark smoke rising above Highway 43 heading west.



On Thursday afternoon, shortly after 3:00 pm, smoke was spotted rising northwest of Whitecourt, just beyond the ridge down Highway 32 North to Swan Hills in the Whitecourt Forest Area. The menacing dark plume of smoke, named WWF021 by Alberta Wildfire, seemed to grow quickly, thanks to hot temperatures and strong winds. Within moments of the new wildfire registering on the Alberta Wildfire Status Dashboard, activity in the skies could already be seen, with water bombers attacking it from the air as ground crews rushed to the site. Located on the Alexis Reserve, 9.1km from Whitecourt, 1.6km west of Hwy 32 and 4.4km north of Hwy 43, the fire was listed as 'under control' just over five hours later. Fire Departments from Blue Ridge and Whitecourt joined Alberta Wildfire and the Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation to get things under control fast. As of Friday, May 10, the fire was still listed as 'under control' at 2.5 hectares in size. The cause of the fire is under investigation.



Lobsterfest was as delicious as it was impactful, thanks to a very generous community, raising tens of thousands



Lobsterfest is a popular event for good reason! Not only are the lobsters flown in fresh from the East Coast and cooked up by maritime volunteers who know how to get everything just right, but the event also raises tens of thousands of dollars for worthy community-based causes.

Lobsterfest has been a premier fundraising event in the community for over twenty vears Run exclusively Prufer by volunteers and immensely supported by the community, businesses and residents alike, the annual event raises tens of thousands of dollars that are then spent locally for the betterment of all.

In 1997, Whitecourt residents Brian and Terri Dixon attended a Lobsterfest event in Spruce Grove organized by that city's Rotary Club chapter. "The fundraiser did very well. They came back to town and said they

were going to charter a Rotary Club in Whitecourt," explained Whitecourt Lobsterfest chair Rotarian Nevis

"To start a Rotary Club, you have to be chartered or recommended by another club, so the Spruce Grove Club ended up chartering Whitecourt, which means they helped and supported us through the first year of being a club. Then, a few years later, the Whitecourt Rotary Club did its first Lobsterfest." Prufer said evervone was nervous but that the event was successful, bringing in \$20,000 in year one.

Fast forward to 2024, and Lobsterfest has grown in popularity and support. The average amount fundraised during the event is around \$70,000. The highest year on record was \$102,000. "Every year we do it, we make more and more improvements and are more seasoned. We want it to be the premier event in Whitecourt. Top-notch," she said.

Holly Astill, Service **Projects** Coordinator for the Whitecourt club, said they are always overwhelmed by the community's generosity. "We show up with our Rotary outfits on, and people know that the money they are going to donate is going to go back into the community because they can see it. They can see Festival Park. They can see the chalet at Eastlink Park. They can see all of the actual physical things that we support."

The Whitecourt Rotary Club creates a wish list of events it would like to hold or support each year and creates a budget of around \$70,000. Then, they fundraise for it. "Lobsterfest is our main fundraiser that supports everything we want to do," said Astill.

The Whitecourt Rotary Club holds AJMC, free skating at JDA Place, and free programs, and camps like the Summer Unplugged Program and the Rotary Music Festival. They've also greatly supported Festival Park. "We've put over 1.2 million dollars back into the community." said Prufer.

All those things are thanks to the community's generosity for attending, volunteering, and donating. Lobsterfest requires over one thousand hours of volunteer time, including setting up, hosting the

free swimming at the event night, and taking everything down. These hours don't acrange days at the golf count for speaking with course. It also offers businesses and collectscholarships, adventure ing donations, among other things.

"We are a service club. We are all volunteers and attached to Rotary International, so numerous international programs are in place. However, our club's major focus is always in our community, specifically families, children, seniors, and literacy. Those are our main topics of focus, and that's where the money goes." As volunteers, there are no

administrative fees to eat away at fundraised dollars, meaning the club utilizes every cent raised.

If the club happens to raise more than what they need in their yearly budget, they do more things! "It's so rewarding, and it makes all the work worthwhile because then we know that we have made enough money to fund our budget and do all the projects. We have a huge wish list, and we can't do it without the support of businesses. I'm so proud to be a Rotary member and to say that we did this as volunteers, as a club, and through teamwork," said Prufer.

On Saturday, May 4, the delectable scent of lobster, cooked impeccably by a few hardworking East Coast chefs, wafted around St. Joseph's Catholic Church Hall as 320 guests awaited the highly anticipated feast. As maritime

lobsters began making their way out of the kitchen, the Rotarians watched as smiling attendees graciously received their plates.

"We have twenty-eight members," said Prufer of the Whitecourt club. "But we couldn't do this without our spouses, significant others, and those who show up and offer to help. I'm just amazed by the support we get from this community. They are amazing." Astill agreed. "Even though it's a huge amount of work, like Nevis mentioned, it's also fun. It's fellowship, and it's joining the community. It's amazing to see such a community event come together."

Both women had lots of "thank you's" to give out, from their fellow Rotarians to those who assembled things or helped decorate the hall, to those who worked on the technology to ensure the PowerPoint presentation worked, and to the lobster cookers

who ensured the crustaceans were delicious. "We also have an amazing caterer, Ray and Sherry. They have catered for us for eighteen years, and their food is amazing," said Astill. She also thanked St. Joseph's church for being accommodating and generous.

Astill said those who attend are generous beyond words. "Often, the same people who have donated to the event will then come as attendees. The people who come open their wallets and hearts and have a blast. Attendees even help us clean up at the end, so they are amazing."

This year's event, with over 300 guests and a bigger 50/50 than last year, brought in \$90,000, well over the average, and will enable the Whitecourt Rotary Club to add to their wish list instead of removing anything from it. "Thank you! Thank you! Thank you! Thank you, all this is not possible," said Prufer.

2024 Woodlands County property tax rate

At its regular meeting on May 8, 2024, Council passed Bylaw 614-24, setting the 2024 Property Tax Rate. This bylaw includes a 3.1% increase in tax revenue for the municipality.

Since October 2019, Woodlands County has been following a fiveyear financial recovery plan. This plan included a 3% annual increase to municipal tax revenue. As 2024 marks the final year of this plan, it has successfully achieved its objectives.

Municipalities in Alberta are required to collect education tax on behalf of the provincial government through the property taxation system. Woodlands County has seen an additional 7.9% increase from 2023 in the provincial education requisition portion of their property tax notice. This rise in provincial education revenue is attributed to an overall increase in property value across Alberta.

Reeve Dave Kusch expressed, "it's a disappointing situation and highlights the challenge of municipalities being tasked with collecting provincial government taxes. While Council is deeply committed to

fiscal responsibility, it may not appear as such to residents and business owners when they receive their tax notice. A significant portion of this invoice does not directly benefit Woodlands County programs and services, yet the municipality is obligated to address questions and concerns from residents and businesses."

Reeve Kusch further emphasizes, "Council hopes all residents and business owners take time to understand their tax notice and where their funds are going. Woodlands County recognizes the challenges


