
have to get it from life experiences, and this is one of those life experiences, performing in front of others," said Master Rennie.



WHITECOURT LAND USE BYLAW

Answers to your Planning and Development Questions:

The Land Use Bylaw impacts everyone in Whitecourt – whether you are building or renovating a home, opening or relocating a business, or building a fence or deck. The Land Use Bylaw guides the permitting processes and regulates the use of land within our community.

Not sure if you need a Permit?

As a property owner, you are responsible for making sure your property meets the requirements of the Land Use Bylaw, including having all of the correct permits.

Contact one of our Development Officers for a FREE consultation on your proposed project.

Fence Height

In Residential Districts, most fences can be constructed to a maximum height of 1.8m in rear and side yards, and up to 1.0m within front yards up to the property line. If your property is located on a corner lot or within a Commercial, Industrial, or Urban Services District, the maximum height of a fence is determined by the Development Authority. Contact one of our friendly Development Officers for more information.

Accessory Buildings & Structures

Sheds and garages require a minimum setback of 2m from your house (including deck) and 1m from your side and rear yard property line. Permits are required for accessory buildings or structures over 10m2 and for raised decks that are taller 0.6m.

Businesses & Home Occupations

If you are opening a new business or home occupation, or relocating or changing the use of an existing business (i.e. from service to retail), you need to apply for a Development Permit to ensure your business is in compliance with the Land Use Bylaw. In some cases, a Building Permit and Safety Code inspection may also be required.

Our Development Officers are on hand to assist you with your business permits.

Driveways & Parking Pads

Most residential driveways can be up to 6 metres wide. In certain circumstances, some driveways can be 7.25m wide - your Development Officer can confirm the maximum width allowed. All driveways that connect to a town street must be hard surfaced.

Gravel, river rock, or paving stones placed adjacent to the driveway within the Town boulevard is prohibited. An RV parking pad located completely within a property may be allowed, but check with a Development Officer first to ensure it complies with the Land Use Bylaw.

Whitecourt Town Council updates

Phase 1 of a fouryear concrete rehabilitation project for 55 Avenue has been approved. Based on assessments, the pavement along 55 Avenue remains in good condition and doesn't require replacement at this time; however, the concrete is in need of replacement. The curb and gutters along 55 Avenue, between 41 Street and Mink Creek Road, will be fully removed and reconstructed over a fouryear period. This will allow drainage and sidewalk condition to be improved and will rectify any deterioration of the sidewalk joints.

Rennie said they like to do demonstrations to help attract new families to the sport. "I'm pretty sure we're not recruiting anybody from the senior's lodge, but you never know," he chuckled. "We had the right group of kids, the right ask, the right space and the perfect timing. I'm glad it all worked out and that they enjoyed it." He added that a future visit will be planned.

"I think our community is an incredibly great community, and it's because of the founding people who have put in so many volunteer hours and created so many great opportunities for the vouth in our community. I was one of those youths who grew up here and had so many opportunities that I know my friends who live in Edmonton never had. The people who provided those are many of the same people who are in the senior's lodge today. I respect our seniors. They made a difference in our community. As I look around the room, I've got connections to many of them or their children or grandchildren, and I think that's pretty cool."

Rennie said the experience reminded him of the travelling demonstration that Whitecourt Taekwondo used to have in the 90's. "The last trip we did was to Disneyland, but we competed across Canada with that team, and it was a lot of fun. So, maybe this will lead us to that. I know we are taking a team to Las Vegas to compete in 2025, and maybe this experience will lead us to have a demonstration team there as part of that team."

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

New County program to see double the grading frequency on a handful of roads, increasing service levels





A new pilot project is underway in Woodlands County. Just under nineteen kilometres of roadway will receive double the grader attention they currently receive.

A pilot program in Woodlands County aims to increase the service level on specific segments of six different county roads that currently see a grader once every two weeks. The program would instead, increasing the level of service for road users. Jeff Zhang. Director of Infrastructure Services, brought the program forward during the June 5 Woodlands County Council meeting.

Roads recommended for the program include Thompson Road (from the Township Rd 590 intersection to 583), Mountain View Road (from the Township Rd 590 intersection to 583), Tower Road (from Township

Rd 591A to 592B), and Horne Road (from Township Rd 594 to northerly end). Four stretches off Range Road 121 (Township Roads 585B, 590, 114A and 114B) to the ends of the roads in Estates of East Mountain see the roads receive would also increase to is intended to run for treatment once a week once-a-week grading, a duration of between as would Township Road 590 from Highway 32 to the westerly end.

sections on The Thompson Road and Mountain View Road are each five kilometres, the largest of the group. The Estates of East Mountain grouping totals 1.6 kilometres, the smallest segment. The other three. Tower Road, Township Road 590, and Horne Road, are roughly two and a half kilometres each. The total for the pilot program would be just shy of nineteen kilometres. The roads selected by the administration were chosen based on road usage and the service requests received from residents.

"This pilot program one and four months. Based on the current resourcing level, it is best if a contract grader and operator be hired for this undertaking," explained Zhang. "It is estimated that the monthly grading hours, including transportation, will be less than 80 hours, which translates to approximately sixteen thousand dollars a month." Zhang added that the work could start immediately if approved. Zhang explained that the money

for the program would come from his department's operating budget. "We will monitor the budget closely. My staff will be evaluating the efficacy of this proposed pilot program to monitor the increasing level of service and road surface condition," he said.

Councillor Bruce Prestidge asked about the Old Blue Ridge Highway past the Whitecourt Transfer Station. "When we did a traffic survey years ago, it was the second highest road usage in the county, and it is usually in terrible condition. Why couldn't that be included in this program?" Zhang responded that there wasn't special funding for the program. "I know the Old Blue Ridge Highway is a well-traveled road. We also get service requests on a regular basis, as well. However, there's only so large of a pie. The more roads we add in, the more roads we will have to take out. We are trying to find the balance between how many roads we want to run in a pilot program versus how much money we have."

Reeve Dave Kusch said the highest focus was on residential impact. "What we were looking at was based on a service call area, road conditions, and the volume of houses and people," he said. Though the Old Blue Ridge Highway has some of the highest traffic levels, the program aimed to impact as many residents as possible.

Paul Benedetto, Interim Chief Administra-

tive Officer, explained that adding more roads to the program would alter the frequency of grading but still result in an increased service level for the selected roads. Adding more stretches of road to the program would mean that instead of doubling the grading from every fourteen days to every seven, roads would see grading every eight or nine days, which would still be a noticeable improvement.

He said that though the program was made flexible, they can't increase the monthly budget as it currently stands, coming from the infrastructure budget line. To grow the program further, without stretching grading beyond every seven



days, Council would need to allot funding towards it. "We're hoping to achieve a marked improvement to the service level and the condition of the roads that a lot of our public are travelling on," said Benedetto.

Councillor Kuelken said the pilot program was an excellent idea. He credited the Service Tracker, which gives residents the freedom to report issues and compiles data to show areas needing attention, as a help

before and during the program. "If we start getting less requests on the service tracker for these areas, I'm pretty sure that that would be an indicator of whether that program is working or not."

Councillor Jeremy Wilhelm felt that sticking with the current list of roads and evaluating results in six weeks before changing things up and adding more was a good option. "The point of a pilot project is to try something new, right? We're not set in stone on specific roads. We're just starting with specific roads now and can shift as we need to in the future." Councillor Devin Williams agreed. "We're not lowering service anywhere else. We're just doing a pilot project to see if this is better. I wouldn't commit to four or five months and specific roads, but I like the idea of up to six weeks because it gives us a full month of the service tracker."

Councillor John Burrows, who zoomed in for the meeting, said they were heading in the right direction. "We've had to go through a period of time where we were looking at service levels and pulling back, and now we're looking at adding it again a bit. So, we have to do it in a careful and methodical manner, and I think this is the best way to do it. I'm sure we'll pick up some roads along the way." Zhang said that idea would work. "It's perfectly valid to collect data, reevaluate, and see where we go." Councillor Wilhelm motioned to approve the pilot program, adding that a review be done in August. The motion passed unanimously.



Building momentum: Residenti construction in Alberta

After pulling back in February and March, construction intentions in Alberta grew by 9.4% in April to reach \$1.62 billion.*

The direction of the trend is clearer when we look at the year-to-date (YTD) numbers: the value of building permits issued over the first four months of 2024 was 28% higher than over the same period in 2023.

Residential construction has been driving the growth so far in 2024; YTD permits were up 44% compared to just 0.3% in the non-residential sector.

Breaking it down further, the YTD value of permits issued for single-detached houses (+36%) and multi-dwelling projects increased (+53%).

The strong residential numbers reflect the population growth Alberta has been experiencing

and drum-tight supply levels in the resale market.

Although last week's interest rate cut by the Bank of Canada was only conjecture in April, builders may have been anticipating lower borrowing costs and submitting more permits as a result.

In the non-residential sector, YTD permit value for institutional and governmental building projects was up by 24% and by 7% for industrial buildings. Despite growth on a month-overmonth basis, the YTD permit value of commercial buildings was down by 6% over the first four months of the year.

YTD growth has been particularly strong in the Edmonton Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) and the Lethbridge CMA.

Led by an 81% rise in multi-dwelling permit value, Edmonton posted YTD growth across all residential and non-residential categories for an overall increase of 52%.

A 470% spike in multi-dwelling permit value in Lethbridge lifted the total value of permits by 50%.

In the Calgary CMA, single-detached (+40% YTD) growth outpaced multi-dwelling projects (+29% YTD) while non-residential permit value saw a YTD decline of 15%.

Due to an unusual spike in the value of its single dwelling building permits in April of last year, Red Deer was the only CMA in Alberta to see a drop in residential permit value. Even a 328% surge in multi-unit permits was not enough to offset the YTD drop in the single dwelling category.

housing With the market still playing catch-up with Alberta's population growth, we expect residential permit value to continue to post strong numbers this year and play a key role in driving overall economic growth in the province.

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
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
