Looking at what options there are for post-secondary education in Whitecourt



Infrastructure Department as they plan for an even busier summer season

Post-secondary education in Whitecourt has changed since NorQuest College closed its campus doors during the pandemic, when students moved to online classes. The Town of Whitecourt has been looking into how to increase post-secondary education locally.

Part of Whitecourt Town Council's Strategic Plan involves investigating higher education opportunities for locals, allowing graduates and those seeking career changes or upgrades to have post-secondary tions without leaving the community. In the fall, several meetings took place between the Town and post-secondary operators to establish the challenges and barriers that have kept them from having a physical location in Whitecourt.

On Tuesday, May 21, Whitecourt's Economic Development Officer,

May was a busy month for the County's Infrastructure Department as they plan for an even busier summer season





Woodlands County Council recently received an Infrastructure Status Report for May that included vehicle purchases, updates on flood-damaged roads, paving plans, and the current focus of the Infrastructure Department.

Woodlands County Council receives a breakdown of ongoing Infrastructure Department operations from the Director of Infrastructure Services toward the end of each month. Jeff Zhang recently took on that role and provided May's report on May 22. The Infrastructure Status Report touches on several different categories of operations.

including agricultural services, roads, and water/wastewater.

"We have been focusing our efforts in the past month on seasonal changeovers, hiring and training seasonal staff, and getting ready for summer," explained Zhang. "On the roadside, we have started drift removal for bridges and culverts. Bridge cleaning and roadway sweeping are complete. Brushing

and mowing will commence in the summer. Pothole patching is a routine activity," explained Zhang. Other projects include signpost repairs and road grading.

For paving, Zhang explained that three projects had been put together for one RFP (Request for Proposal): West Mountain (including the bus pullover), East Mountain. Carlson Drive.


and Woodlands Lane, which leads to the County office, and the parking lot. "All those are packaged together in one single RFP package, being advertised and closing in mid-June."

Councillor Wilhelm asked about the parking lot and road leading to the County office, as both projects had been moved to 2025. Zhang explained that though they were part of an RFP that included projects for this year, the two-part project at the county office would be in 2025. "The consultant will design them as separate projects and provide separate cost estimates. It's for ease of management to package them together into one single RFP," he added.

Councillor Peter Kuelken asked what was included in the Carlson Drive project. "Is this RFP just going to be for the drainage, or does it include the mitigation? The trees on our right-of-way are part of the problem with the powerlines and stuff there," he said. Zhang responded that the RFP would look at drainage, the trail and the trees. "Those three have to go together," he added. Two county bridges

are on opposing sides of the worksheet, with one in the design phase and another stalled. "Bridge F78525, we have some issues with getting approval from the Federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans, so that project will likely be delayed due to permitting. BF73605, we are working on the design. We should have it designed and tender package ready sometime in July."

Another delayed item is the tender for Hard Luck Canyon, which was recently rejected due to the bid coming back significantly over budget. The project would have seen the stairs and fencing replaced. "We are working with the consultant for a revision of the tender for

a late summer tendering," explained Zhang.

Several vehicles have been purchased this year. "We have received four half-ton trucks. There are two additional three-quarter-ton trucks in route. They are currently in Calgary. (We are) just waiting for delivery and (they) should be here sometime in June. We have ordered one tandem sander/plow truck from the 2023 carryover budget, and that truck will be here sometime in August. A second will arrive. out of the 2024 budget, and will arrive towards the end of the year." said Zhang.

Other purchases that have arrived include a zero-turn mower and a culvert steamer. Items purchased that have not arrived include a rubber tire backhoe, skid steer, and two grader units, which are expected to arrive in October or November of this year.

Councillors asked about the progress of two damaged roads in the meeting: Cutbanks Road and Old Ferry Road. Councillor Deane spoke first. "I see there's a note in the Capital about the Cutbanks Road construction, and the second sentence speaks to a consultant service that's been obtained to determine the feasibility of securing the riverbank adjacent to the existing road versus relocating the roadway. I didn't realize those were options. I'm happy to see that because that's a beautiful scenic road, and if it can feasibly be salvaged, then I think

that's an option that I

would hope Council would look at closely."

Zhang said that the consultant tasked with the project will be the one to determine what path to take. "He was asked to compare the option of keeping the existing alignment and doing the bank protection versus realigning the road through a new road construction. To me, that's an importconceptual-level question to be asked before we charge forward into preliminary engineering and detailed design," Zhang responded.

Councillor Burrows queried next. "The Old Ferry Road was very eroded. We lost like 80 feet of the bank, and there is a section there that's actually barricaded." In jest, he said it's a very scenic road now because drivers are so close to the river. "I was wondering if we could get an update on where we are going with that road," he asked.

"There were three flooded locations last year. Two overtop of the roads and one bank being eroded. The two overtop locations have been repaired. The bank that was cut through the 2023 flood, the same consultant working on the Cutbanks Road, is also looking at developing the different options of bank protection versus realigning the road," said Zhang.

Reports from Old Ferry Road and Cutbanks Road are expected sometime in June. Zhang said once he receives them, he will bring them forward for Council to review. He is also anticipating a report back on cold mix options in August or September. He added that he would ask the consultant to consider a variety of techniques to fix roads.

The last topic focused on areas in Blue Ridge that need attention. Councillor Bruce Prestidge asked about a stretch of damaged sidewalk. "I believe it's Second Street. There's a stretch of sidewalk that's all broken up. Across the street, there's a ditch that holds water all the time. The sidewalk has gaps that are like two inches high. People are complaining that they are tripping on it." Zhang said he knew about the site and a couple of rutted intersections. He said he planned to bring a crew there this summer to deal with the issues.







Rhonda Woods, updated the Policies and Priorities Committee (comprised of Council members) on what happened in those meetings and what potential solutions may have emerged from them.

"Some of those challenges that were identified were significant financial investment, with not a lot of capital funding in their budgets to be able to support that," explained Woods, speaking to why post-secondary institutions didn't have physical locations in the community. She said another concern was program capacity needs. "You need to fill classes completely in order to have that return on investment and then have qualified staff to teach those classes in person on a regular basis." Smaller populations would make filling a classroom challenging.

From the fall discussions, Woods said there were recommendations for collaborative models that could solve the issues mentioned. "We have been quite successful with that direction," she said. Collaborative models would see institutions having a different presence in the community, such as through training based on area industry needs. which two institutions already do. Woods said she spoke with several institutions.

"We've worked with a number of them for stakeholder engagement, including Bow Valley, GPRC, which is now Northwestern Polytechnic, Northern Lakes and Red Deer College. Also, Norquest College still does a lot of training even though they are not in the community," explained Woods. "The two we are working on that are working in the community right now are NorQuest College and Northwestern Polytechnic."

Woods said that she shared some of the training opportunities offered by both institutions at the Business Support Network and Chamber of Commerce meetings so area businesses involved with both groups would know about the opportunities available. "They might not have that brick and mortar. physical location, but these are colleges that have a model to be able to come into the community and set up programs as needed." said Woods. She also explained that these institutions have already worked directly with some area businesses. "I know a number of the businesses have

used them to develop programs for internal staff," she said.

Other possible solutions that could suppost-secondary education options in the community include using different delivery methods through the use of technology and online learning platforms. "That has expanded hugely since COVID, obviously," said Woods. Another was to develop incentive programs, which could entice post-secondary institutions to set up satellite campuses or outreach programs in Whitecourt, with support for infrastructure development or operational costs. She added that having attractive quality-of-life amenities, like recreational facilities and cultural attractions, helps, adding that "Whitecourt does a pretty good job" at that.

Woods then shared about one local business that offers a variety of programming and training opportunities. "Ballad offers a lot of different programming. They do faceto-face and live online training. The program they have right now is that they will actually provide incentives to businesses who are looking at hiring local people. They will train their staff and provide all the tickets, whether that's for construction work or oilfield or that type of thing."

Woods explained that Ballad hires trained staff on a contract basis with businesses. "If they are a good fit then the business will hire them on. That's one program that has expanded. They are also offering an HR program coming up for small businesses who can't afford or don't have the resources or supports to have a full HR," said Woods.

She explained that this fall, she would check back in with the post-secondary institutions to see if anything had changed or if there were new opportunities to develop programs or even have a physical location. "If there is the ability in their capital funding to look at a location. we want to ensure that Whitecourt is marketed first."

Woods said she is working on a plan detailing what post-secondary training/education would work in the community today and will look at different models to increase those opportunities. Councillor Paul Chauvet said he appreciated the update. "I appreciate the work that you did on this project. It comes up from time to

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
time of why we don't have post-secondary when you think of Vermillion and the other smaller communities that have one."

Vermillion, Alberta, is located roughly two hours east of Edmonton. It is a rural municipality with a population of about 4,500 and has the third oldest post-secondary institution in the province. The Vermillion campus of Lakeland College opened in 1913 and features a 3,700-acre college-owned, dent-managed farm, interior design labs, an Emergency Training Centre, an Equine Centre, modern labs and lecture theatres, and a Trades Centre. NorQuest College closed its Whitecourt Drayton Valley campuses during COVID after being forced to switch to an online format, ultimately saving the college money. It still has one small community campus located in Wetaskiwin, which has a population just shy of thirteen thousand, and a large campus in Edmonton.

NorQuest offers a Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) in Whitecourt, located at 4907 - 51 Avenue. The program supports adults in building non-credit skills in math, writing, reading, digital, and ESL. As of this spring, they also offer a GED course and a Trades Entrance Readiness course.








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PUBLIC NOTICE

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WHITECOURT LAND USE BYLAW Answers to your Planning and Development Questions:

The Land Use Bylaw impacts everyone in Whitecourt – whether you are building or renovating a home, opening or relocating a business, or building a fence or deck. The Land Use Bylaw guides the permitting processes and regulates the use of land within our community.

Not sure if you need a Permit?

As a property owner, you are responsible for making sure your property meets the requirements of the Land Use Bylaw, including having all of the correct permits. Contact one of our Development Officers for a FREE consultation on your proposed project.

Fence Height

In Residential Districts, most fences can be constructed to a maximum height of 1.8m in rear and side yards, and up to 1.0m within front yards up to the property line. If your property is located on a corner lot or within a Commercial, Industrial, or Urban Services District, the maximum height of a fence is determined by the Development Authority. Contact one of our friendly Development Officers for more information.

Accessory Buildings & Structures

Sheds and garages require a minimum setback of 2m from your house (including deck) and 1m from your side and rear yard property line. Permits are required for accessory buildings or structures over 10m2 and for raised decks that are taller 0.6m.

Businesses & Home Occupations

If you are opening a new business or home occupation, or relocating or changing the use of an existing business (i.e. from service to retail), you need to apply for a Development Permit to ensure your business is in compliance with the Land Use Bylaw. In some cases, a Building Permit and Safety Code inspection may also be required. Our Development Officers are on hand to assist you with your business permits.

Driveways & Parking Pads

Most residential driveways can be up to 6 metres wide. In certain circumstances, some driveways can be 7.25m wide - your Development Officer can confirm the maximum width allowed. All driveways that connect to a town street must be hard surfaced.

Gravel, river rock, or paving stones placed adjacent to the driveway within the Town boulevard is prohibited. An RV parking pad located completely within a property may be allowed, but check with a Development Officer first to ensure it complies with the Land Use Bylaw.

62 over Horse Creek were carried forward to the 2025 Capital Budget. Construction on the two projects is no longer possible for 2024 due to the application and approval timelines to the Federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans.

The East Mountain Road resurfacing project, West Mountain Road resurfacing project, and West Mountain Road pull-over were carried forward to the 2025 Capital budget as two provincial highway resurfacing projects in the area were identified which may bring a cost savings to the County.

As per the CAO report, Council support-

ed Administration's initiative to review the processes and timing on delivering Capital projects to avoid future delays on projects. Processes to be reviewed include revising the approach on designing capital projects one to two years in advance before going to tender ensuring that the County has shovel ready projects when funding

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
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
