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Not the norm: Working remotely in Alberta by industry

At the height of the pandemic, it was common to hear "with everyone working from home...". The problem with this, of course, is that not everybody was working from home. Even at its peak in April 2020, the proportion of Canadians working from home was well below half at 40%.

What type of work you do, what industry you are in, the expectations of your employer and personal preference all play a role here.

The relative cost of living in different places is also a potential factor. We've recently explored the sharp rise in the number of Canadians working at home for an employer in a different province and argue that this option enables interprovincial migrants to be more responsive

to non-labour market ber of hours on-site and factors such as housing affordability. ber of hours on-site and remotely; 6% mostly remotely; and 7% exclu-

With that in mind, new survey results from Statistics Canada help us understand where remote work is, and isn't, taking place by industry. Before delving deeper, it is important to note that remote work does not necessarily mean working from home. Taxi drivers, for example, work remotely but it's not from home.

When asked what percentage of their employees they anticipate will be working on-site versus remotely over the next three months, the average across Alberta respondents was 71%. (The survey was conducted from April 2 to May 6, 2024.)

Another 10% were expected to work most of their hours on-site while 8% would work approximately the same num-

ber of hours on-site and remotely; 6% mostly remotely; and 7% exclusively off-site. It's about the same breakdown nationally.

Clearly, on-site work remains the dominant arrangement.

This holds true across all of the main industry categories (see the chart below), but there are some interesting differences.


At the top end, accommodation and food service sector employers anticipate that 97% of their staff will be working all or most of their hours on-site. Hybrid work arrangements are either rare or tilted heavily toward the on-site component. Even in a sector like my own-finance and insurance-almost three-quarters of workers are on-site (i.e., in the office or branch) all or most of the time.

The transportation and warehousing sector has the smallest percentage of workers spending all or most of their hours onsite, but as noted above, some of the remote work can be attributed to jobs like driving a truck or piloting a plane rather than "working from home" (or on a laptop from a coffee shop).

Combining the categories of working half remotely, mostly remotely and entirely remotely (and excluding transportation and warehousing) the professional, scientific and technical services sector has the largest share of workers spending half or more of their time offsite followed by those in

the information and cultural industries sector at 36%.


So even though hybrid work arrangements are quite common, they are not the norm and their prevalence varies greatly across industries. It remains to be seen how technology does, or doesn't, change these ratios over time.















Putting a face on suicide



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Expansion of service for Community Peace Officers coming for **Whitecourt members**

Significant changes to the role of Peace Officers in the community follow changes to Policy 23-005 - Emergency Response Vehicle Operations and the creation of Policy 23-016 – Body Worn Cameras and In-Car Video Systems. Before the changes, Policy 23-005 limited a Peace Officer's use of emergency equipment to traffic control for accidents and road closures, creating a safe

zone in which to work and enforcement of bylaws and certain Provincial Act infractions.

The previous policy stated that Peace Officers could not use emergency equipment (lights/sirens) to stop a vehicle to enforce the Traffic Safety Act (speeding, stop signs, crosswalks). The newly updated policy states that Whitecourt's Peace Officers can now use emergency equipment for moving and

non-moving traffic enforcement.

Changes also include how Peace Officers handle emergency responses. The new policy allows them to respond to certain approved situations using their lights and sirens. To move up to this level of response, all Level 1 Community Peace Officers will need to successfully complete a 40-hour emergency ve-

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hicle operations course based on police curriculum.

Emergency response situations under the updated policy include injury collisions, fire/medical calls at the request of Fire/EMS, requests by a Police Service to help with response capacity, back up for police or other Peace Officers if there is reasonable belief that the officer is in danger and the Peace Officer is the closest help possible. The policy states, "Having Peace Officers conduct traffic enforcement is meant to augment existing systems already in

place in order to continue to provide a safe and healthy community."

The policy also limits response, stating that emergency vehicle response is not to be conducted in non-injury motor vehicle collisions, non-urgent situations, and backup for police when the Peace Officer is not the closest option (unless requested). Limits in the original policy, including using equipment like spike belts or roadblocks, remain unchanged and are not allowed.

Pursuits, specifically, are one area where Peace Officers are not to engage for the safety of others. The policy states, "Community Peace Officers shall NOT engage in pursuits under any circumstances. Pursuits may involve high or low speeds and vehicles other than automobiles." It states that officers must immediately cease efforts once they determine the driver they are trying to stop is aware of their attempts to stop them and fails to do so. Instead, they are required to contact the police and share all pertinent information like make/model, direction of travel, etc.

Another thing they cannot do is a breath test on a suspected impaired driver. Should a Peace

Officer pull over a driver suspected of being impaired, they are to alert the police as impaired driving is a Criminal Code offence, falling under police jurisdiction.

The Public Security Peace Officer Policy, a provincial document that oversees how the Peace Officer program is conducted, allows officers to use only specific equipment, including their vehicle, handcuffs, (stab/bullet-resistant vest, gloves), and dog/bear spray. same goes for emergency equipment, like speed detection, animal control devices, traffic cones/ flares/first aid kits, and

flashlights.

Lee Hardman, Director of Community Safety for the Town of Whitecourt, oversees the local Peace Officer program and approves, disallows, or limits the use of specific equipment when necessary. He explained that Peace Officers would also be trained to do radar detection in the community, expanding that service. Hardman added that the changes to Policy 23-005 arose following a Municipal Enforcement Service Level Review earlier this year. He said these updates are in force in most Peace Officer departments province-wide.

The review also brought up the need for body-worn cameras. Policy 23-016 was created for this specific topic. "This has become more of the norm in first responders, so we are adapting with that," said Hardman. "There are some objectives with those systems, which are reducing the safety risks to officers working alone, providing additional evidence, augmenting current notetaking practices, and improving evidence documentation and accuracy of claims."

He said that if complaints were brought forward against any Whitecourt Community Peace Officers, the footage obtained by the body-worn cameras would back it up either way. "It also helps deescalate conflicts when people know they are on video, and it provides greater insight on service delivery," he explained during the Monday, May Regular Meeting of Council at the Forest Interpretive Centre. Town Council learned more about both policies during May's Policies and Priorities Committee meeting on May 21 at the Town Office, where the committee recommended they be approved.

Both the updated Policy 23-005 - Emergency Response Vehicle Operations and brand-new Policy 23-016 - Body Worn Cameras and In-Car Video Systems were unanimously approved by Council. Hardman said both policies would be sent to the Peace Officer Program for approval following their vote. "I do anticipate that we will have approval for this policy as it goes with most of the policies around the province," he said. Before Community Peace Officers in Whitecourt start implementing their expanded service abilities under the new/ updated policies, full training will take place to prepare them for their new duties.





Grant dollars dished out to community groups for tourism, enhancement and sports-related needs



Whitecourt Town Council recently approved over thirty-eight thousand dollars for local clubs, groups, and non-profits to help support equipment upgrades, events, and startups. Funding was handed out from three of the 12+ grants offered by the Town: the Sport Hosting Program, Tourism Enhancement Grant, and Whitecourt Enhancement Grant. The Whitecourt Slo-Pitch Association will be doing diamond additions.

The Town of Whitecourt offers over a dozen grant opportunities for community members to take advantage of, including the Vitalization Grant, Sump Pit Materials Testing Incentive Program, Seniors Grant Assistance, FireSmart Homeowner Incentive Program and the Family Community Support Services (FCSS) Grant.

Monday's During Regular Meeting of Council, dollars from

three of the Town's grant programs were distributed to deserving community groups who applied for funding. The three grants were the Sport Hosting Program, the Tourism Enhancement Grant and the Whitecourt Enhancement Grant.

Five groups applied for the 2024 Whitecourt Enhancement Grant, which offers financial support to groups and organizations involved in community arts, culture, and recreation to

start up, develop new community events, or enhance existing programs or facilities. The grant will not duplicate existing funding, regardless of the source.

The grant aims to boost local programs, services, special events, equipment, and facilities of local organizations that aren't normally funded through annual budgets. This helps to enhance the quality of life for residents of both Whitecourt and Woodlands

Woodlands Winter Recreation Park Society applied for \$8,502.50 to purchase additional equipment for smaller participants, the Woodchuckers – Whitecourt Cornhole League applied for \$1,440 to purchase scoring towers, the Whitecourt Indigenous Friends Society applied for ten thousand to support their National Truth and Reconciliation Day event, Whitecourt Minor Ball

Whitecourt Woodlands Recreation Park Society's application was deemed ineligible because the society already receives operational funding from the Town of Whitecourt, and their project was seen as operational. The total funding request was \$43,563.80. With the one bid removed, the request was lowered to \$35,061.30.

The yearly budget for the Enhancement Grant is \$30,000. The Community Services Advisory Board (CSAB) recommended allocating \$13,521.80 to the Whitecourt Slo-Pitch Association, \$6,894.18 to Whitecourt Minor Baseball, \$8,144.02 to the Whitecourt Indigenous Friends Society, and \$1,440 to The Woodchuckers.

CSAB Chairperson Brigette Moore was on hand to explain why the board recommended funding as it did. The CSAB rates each application, scoring it based on certain criteria, to decide what percentage it should receive from the funding pile. Any eligible requests under \$1,500 receive their entire ask.

The funds from the **Sport Hosting Program** are meant to help local sports teams hold provincial sporting competitions, which provide a positive economic impact on the community as guests travel in, stay at hotels, eat at local restaurants and shop at local businesses. Three thousand remains in this year's **Sport Hosting Program** budget to support other tournaments, and there is no deadline for applications as the program remains open until all the dollars have been allocated.

second applicant for the year was the Whitecourt Isga Tourism Association (WITA). The non-profit group offers authentic Indigenous experiences to share history, culture and traditions.

WITA sought \$10,000 to support the creation of a Teepee Village located just inside Carson Pegasus Provincial Park. The village will feature a day-use teepee and up to five teepees for guests to stay in overnight. The project would enable visitors to experience traditional teachings by the Nakota Sioux Nation people on the Nakota Territory, on which the park resides.


"They have submitted a comprehensive business plan, a detailed marketing budget, their project budget, their Alberta Forestry and Parks permit granting a disposition on the land and permission for the development," explained Rhonda Woods, Economic Development Officer for the Town of Whitecourt. "I received pictures today, and the teepees are up right now, and they are online, ready to book (www.WITA.ca). They have some workshops going through, too."

The experience would include landand water-based workshops, dances, ceremonies, traditional meals. and crafts like a hand drum. Since Whitecourt is the closest community to the park, the Teepee Village Project will bring visitors through town, enhancing tourism. The project could also create synergies and partnerships within the area, further supporting the municipality's tourism.

The Economic Development Committee recommended

that Council award the Whitecourt Isga Tourism Association \$5,200 to support its Teepee Village Project. "We broke down the budget and what was eligible within the funding policy, and we supported 50 percent of their marketing for the project for year one. We want to see it kick off and then we will get partnerships for future vears for this project."

Just over seven thousand dollars remain in the Tourism Enhancement Grant Program budget for the 2024 funding year. Council's agenda package noted that though several inquiries had been made about the grant, no further applications had been received yet. They will be readvertising it to reach more groups. Whitecourt Town Council voted unanimously to approve the recommended allocations for the three grants.






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
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
