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# Attracting investment to Whitecourt and supporting local businesses with marketing and retention strategies



Promoting Whitecourt and supporting the businesses within it is a big job, but the Economic Development Committee is up for it. Building relationships and collaboratively working with stakeholders, businesses, investors, and community organizations are just some of the things they do. Business collaboration in the downtown is growing.

Advertising Whitecourt on a regional, provincial and national scale and supporting the business community through retention strategies and initiatives falls into the wheelhouse of the Eco-Committee. The group, comprised of community members and Economic Development keting & Promotion. Officer Rhonda Woods. who regularly collaborate with community organizations through partnerships and by supporting events and activities.

One of its most significant tasks is to create and implement an Economic Development and Tourism Strategic Plan. Twice a vear. Whitecourt Town Council receives an update on how things are going. Committee Chair Willard Strebchuk ioined Economic Development Officer

Rhonda Woods for the summer update at a recent Council meeting. The plan includes five key points: Business Retention & Expansion Strategies, Investment Readiness & Attraction Across Key Sectors, Enhance Whitecourt's nomic Development Downtown & Create New Energy, Tourism Opportunities & Supports, and Tourism Mar-

Under each key are an active bunch point the board provided steps, highlighting which ones had been completed and which were still coming. Under the Business Retention and Expansion Strategies point, the board identified that increasing business community engagement, identifying red tape areas, and supporting entrepreneurs through partnerships with Community Futures Yellowhead East were some ways they could address local challenges.

Since January, the

group has created a business visit/outreach schedule, submitted grant funding for the Business Support Network, and met with the Whitecourt & District Chamber of Commerce to identify partnership opportunities. Action steps coming soon include implementing a Shop Local Business Campaign ahead of Small Business Week and tracking business feedback and concerns.

Under the third key point in the plan, Enhance Whitecourt's Downtown and Create New Energy, the committee pointed to ways they could support downtown development and revitalization efforts, encouraging "An active and vibrant downtown," read the package. Ideas included hosting small encouraging events, downtown residential development and working side-by-side with the Chamber.

A recently acquired grant from the Small Community Opportunity Program (SCOP) provided \$70,000 for a market analysis on attraction and retention strategies. Once completed, it will map the business environment and development relevant to Whitecourt. pinpoint gaps, provide insight for developing action plans, and show ready-made marketing investment op-Through portunities. conversations with the Downtown Working Group (DWG), Woods said they are also adding another component to the analysis. Along with gaps, they will also seek information on trends in the downtown. "When we met in

January, four main themes came out of that, and we developed some action plans. Business-to-business communication and collaboration was a

really high theme," explained Woods. "They've created their own Facebook group, and they are working business-to-business. We are solely a support, so if there's anything we can support them and get out of the lane and let them do their thing, we will definitely be there. I know there are a number of different events that they are working together on."

Woods said they are also creating a map of what's available downtown and what can be marketed. She said they are doing workshops too. "This fall, we have a video creation and collaborative marketing workshop coming up. They will work one-on-one with businesses on how to get out there, what is trending and where they can market (themselves). Sometimes people aren't sure what's out there and where to market," she explained.

One of the points mentioned hotels and the information they provide. Councillor Derek Schlosser asked about it. "It says hotel advertising with inroom guest books and hotel websites. Are those in our local hotels?"

Woods said yes. "It's in our local hotels. We have a quick reference guide that includes everything that's going on, an events listing and things for guests coming in," explained Woods. He asked if that information was at every hotel in the community. Woods again said yes. Councillor Schlosser thanked her for the clarification and chuckled, saying, "I've never stayed in a hotel room in Whitecourt, so I was just curious."

Woods explained that not only is the information available at hotels,

but they also meet with owners. "In May, we meet with hoteliers and go through it so that they are familiar with it. It's also included in all front lines, so gas stations too. We have 72 books out in the community right now." Chair Strebchuk added that last year, during the fires, when the community saw an influx of people, the committee made sure the hotels were stocked up with guides so that visitors knew what things were available to them during their prolonged stay.

Earlier this summer, the committee worked with influencers to create videos to help with tourism, showcasing things that make Whitecourt a worthwhile spot to come off the highway and visit. In late July, ZenSeekers shared a few posts



to its followers on some of the community's gems, like biking and walking trails and local shopping. A video and a write-up on their ZenSeekers.com website followed, which shadowed new Whitecourt resident Ashley John and her friend


Brooke Sabourin as they explored the community together.

When asked if businesses outside the downtown could benefit from the ideas in the plan, Woods said yes. "We do this with every sector. Even if this (specifically) is

for downtown, we also work with industry and businesses on the hill. We are finding that businesses are joining this that aren't in the downtown and they are working together. We have different collaborative ideas going on, so even though this is for the downtown, we are actually seeing a lot of collaboration from outside it, all working together."

Other highlights included an update on the Health Professional Attraction and Retention Committee (H-PARC). Since January, White-

court has welcomed two new doctors and two nurses. Next year, the community will host the 2025 Let's Go Rural Event, which invites healthcare students from various universities and colleges to experience life in Whitecourt.

from the community, John Parker, Andrew Kentner, Justin Labine and Joshua Taylor, have been working hard for several months as the FireSmart Summer Crew. Each year, the Whitecourt Fire Department applies for grant funding to financially support the crew through the Forest Resource Improvement Association of Alberta (FRIAA). Last year, they were not successful. This year, they

but necessary work. "The first thing we do is get them all trained with safety training for the chainsaws and everything else they deal with because it's a pretty risky course. They are all certified for falling trees," he explained. Once trained, the foursome was dispatched to work in various community areas, especially where the forest meets residential neighbourhoods.

Fire Chief Wynn said over the years of hav-

Four young men Wynn said it is hard have gotten used to that FireSmart begins a significant difference seeing the work happening, crediting public engagement as a big part of why. "Public members will stop and talk to the crew while they are working, so that is also part of it. If someone wants to talk to them, they will shut down the chainsaws and talk to them. Getting the public involved is where we are going to win," he explained.

The "win" means getting residents onboard with FireSmart activities on their properties.

Fire Chief Brian ing the crew, residents "One of the sayings is the hospital may notice at home. We can't go onto their properties and do the work, but the owner can. If we educate the public and show them what they can do to help us and themselves, then that's critical," he said.

Removing dead or downed trees and clearing tall grass or ladder fuels (low branches that could catch fire and pull a ground fire up) are the main components of clearing areas. Residents who live near or drive by

in the landscape there, as one example. "This vear, we concentrated on the area between the hospital and the highway because there were 80 dead trees either standing or down. They went in and fell them, bucked them up into firewood and made signs telling residents to come and collect some free firewood. The free firewood was collected every night, and they continued felling the trees," explained Chief Wynn.

He added that severd now-removed trees were near powerlines that removing them also removed what might've been a dangerous situation. High winds or a storm could have knocked trees over, taking out the powerline and affecting power for the hospital and community. He said it could have also started a fire. "They worked hard to eliminate that risk and get everything cleared up."

The crew also worked behind Baxter Crescent for a week. Chief Wynn said as they went along cutting risky trees, they made sure to clean up their mess. "They do not leave the fine fuels in the bush. Anything we deal with, we deal with it one hundred percent."

When the crew isn't busy in the bush, they also do home assessments. Chief Wynn said they have completed thirty this year and hope to do as many as possible. Home assessments allow residents to walk through their property with trained firefighters to learn about fire risks and how to mitigate them.

"We only do them if the homeowner is home because we want that conversation. It takes about an hour. You get lots of feedback. It allows them to answer or ask questions that we can give them information on," he explained. Those who do the visits, like the summer crew, receive lengthy training.

Kentner, Parker, Labine and Taylor have also attended community events, including the trade show, a Farmer's Market and the Canada Day celebrations. "At the trade show, the hazard was high, so lots of good information went out. We had a lot of people sign up for home assessments," explained Chief Wynn.

He said community members have started to propel the crew forward, calling in about dangerous trees and pinpointing hazardous areas (on town property/public areas). "I don't get any complaints. It's more of, can you do this? I think that shows our consistent messaging to residents. It's nice to have the community support the work that we are doing."

Over the final few weeks, the crew will work with the Town of Whitecourt behind Pineview Road and Caxton Street in the greenspace behind the homes. "There are a lot of dead, hazard trees in there, so they are working with the town to clean up that area." He explained that the project came about largely from residents who noticed the risks in the bush beyond their properties.

Chief Wynn said

the beauty of having the FireSmart Summer Crew is that their work continually reduces the communities risk. "With the risk of last year and this year, we could be the next community. You never know. We have to keep applying every year to have them. Now that we have done the big projects for FireSmart, it's about the maintenance."

He added that they are currently working on the planning phase of a fireguard on the East side of Whitecourt. The plan should be complete by September, kickstarting the waiting game for project funding. He said he is hopeful for a sooner rather than later funding announcement, which could enable the Town of Whitecourt to move forward.

If residents see members of the FireSmart Summer Crew out and about working, give them a wave and say hello. "This is from the community to the community. These are community members doing this work. We have a pretty fantastic summer crew. I am really happy with them."

Modern cles are extraordinarily powerful and capable of extreme acceleration and high speeds. In a controlled environment, like a racetrack, there is little more exhilarating. On public roads and highways, there is little that is more dangerous. Whether you are riding a cruiser, an adventure bike, or a sport bike, it is important to understand that the same risk factors exist for any category of rider:

- Behaviour of other motorists
- Changing

conditions like debris, oil, gravel, or moisture

- Braking and handling characteristics of your motorcycle relative to the road surface

### **Back on track: Energy bolstered Alberta's exports** up through the first half

Export revenues in Alberta advanced in the second quarter after a slow start to the year.

According to new Statistics Canada data, the value of Alberta's merchandise exports reached almost \$48 billion in Q2 2024, 15% higher than the same quarter in 2023.

Most of this increase is due to energy exports growing by 19% in value from last year's level. There were a few factors at play behind the jump in revenues:

1. Alberta's crude oil transportation capacity increased significantly (up to 590,000 barrels per day) with the Trans Mountain Expansion (TMX) coming online earlier this year. Bolstered by demand from Asian countries, national crude oil volumes\* surged year-over-7.8% year (y/y) in the second quarter.

- 2. West Texas Intermediate oil prices were higher, averaging US\$81 in O2 of 2024 compared to US\$74 in Q2 of
- last year.


There were some improvements on the non-energy side as well, up 2.9% y/y and aided by higher wood (+12.6% y/y) and farm, fishing and intermediate food (+4.0% y/y) product sales.

Bolstered the strong increase in Q2, Alberta's aggregate export revenues are up by 4.4% year-todate (YTD) relative to the first six months of

Alberta's contribution to Canada's export growth was higher than any other province over the first half of the year. Even so, the YTD value of exports eased 0.3% nationally with a major 3. Wildfires disrupted pull back in Saskatchcrude production ewan (-19%) primarily in May and June of due to lower metal ores and non-metallic mineral product exports.

> We expect oil and gas export volumes to rise almost 5% and be a key driver of Alberta's GDP growth this year.
