

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the solo lead for several years. "We used to have a club with meetings, we had positions, we voted on things, and everybody paid a membership fee," explained Miller. "I want to say it's been probably fifteen years already since we've done it that way. Most of that original group has left town."

Once things dwindled, Miller picked up the reigns and kept things going. "I wanted to keep it going, so I did. I don't have an official club where I charge a membership get together." Miller hosts weekly meetups at a local coffee shop, and this year's chosen stop was one of their favourites, A&W. Along with the rodeo, she has also hosted car shows at local air shows in the past.


Miller said that the way clubs run really changed over the last five years. "There aren't a lot of paid clubs anymore. Mayerthorpe doesn't have a membership club anymore. It's a business that hosts their Show and Shine every summer. It seems to be working for them."

Miller said she's happy that people still come to the Wednesday night get-together and hopes to see the attendance grow next year. "I love having the public come and having club members talk about their vehicles and seeing the public come out and reminisce about what it was like to have these cars back in the day. I love the comradery of it."

Ken Vanderburg is fee or anything. We just one of the vehicle owners who frequents the car show circuit. He said though there are beautiful cars in garages across the area, some owners won't bring them out for fear of the vehicles being touched or damaged. Vanderburg spoke about one local car owner who, years ago, brought a newly purchased vehicle out for an event only to suffer a costly scratch.

> "There are some expensive old cars in town, but they won't

take them out in public because they don't want them touched," said it's a perfect reminder for those who attend the Coffee and Cars events or any other event where vehicles are on display to look with your eyes, not your hands. "It's about getting that awareness out there and understanding what it means to respect a person's vehicle. I've seen people come up and grab trinkets off the vehito be touched or lean on a vehicle." To add to the conversation, Miller brought eight tracks to display in her trunk. "People will ask their kids if they know what it is and point it out to them," she said.

Vanderburg displayed a few of his prized collectibles, including working drivein movie speakers from Whitecourt's old outdoor theatre, where he once worked. He now has them connected to bluetooth in his 1957 Chevy. "They are hooked up and working. The last couple of car shows, people loved it," he said. "A lot of people under 40 don't know what they are. People came up to me in Peers and asked what they were. I said they were from the

drive-in movie theatre in Whitecourt." Miller chimed in. "Then they ask, what's a drive-in movie theatre?" For Vanderburg, getting to share stories is part of the fun. "I like to talk to people that have had their cars for a long time and find out what they've done to it and what it means to them. I like hearing how long they've been in the area and where the car came from and things like that."

One of his favourite stories to share is how he got his hands on his 57 Chevy.

"My wife went to a yard sale in Niton Junction to buy vegetables, and she called me at home and said you better come with your car trailer. I bought you a car. I asked her what it was, and she told me to just come," chuckled Vanderburg. "So, I go get my son, who apparently already knew about it, and we go there and here's this four-door 57 Chevy that they had had since 1969. They bought it from the original

owners in Mayerthorpe, whose grandson I know. Within a month, I had it all going and have been coming to car shows."

Vanderburg didn't have his Chevy with him at Wednesday's meet-up, opting for his bike instead, thanks to Alberta's unpredictable weather. "My insurance ran out two days ago. I only put it on for six months, and last year at this time, I had parked it because we had lousy weather. And now, this September, we've got some sunshine. So, I might put the insurance back on it," he laughed.

To keep up to date the Wednesday night meetups, join the Whitecourt Wheels Car Club Facebook page. If the weather is favourable, the club meets at A&W starting at 6 pm. "It's nice to be on the highway and to have the public stop by because they see us," said Miller. She hopes to get the club at more events next year. Temporarily shutting off power in high-risk areas is part of AltaLink's evolving Wildfire Mitigation Plan

During recent Woodlands County Council meeting, representatives from AltaLink provided information on a newer program meant to mitigate the risk of wildfires impacting the power supply in the province. Collin Harvey, Alta-Link's RPF Municipal and Community Relations Manager, was at the meeting. AltaLink Alberta's largest transmission facility operator, servicing roughly 85 percent of Albertans. They have over 13,000 km of transmission lines and over 300 substations.

AltaLink provides infrastructure that allows power generators using gas, hydro, solar or wind to send their power along the transmission lines, which moves into AltaLink substations before be-

ing handled by distribution companies like Fortis, who distribute it to retailers who then sell it to consumers.

infrastructure The owned by AltaLink enables many Albertans to access power. Growing concerns over wildfire events have pushed forward proactive practices to help mitigate the risks posed by powerlines starting fires and fires destroying infrastructure such as wooden power poles, something seen during the fire activity last year.

Harvey explained that in 2019, AltaLink created a Wildfire Mitigation Plan. "Wildfires have become a significant feature on the landscape over the last few years. It was sad to see what happened in Jasper, and last year was obviously a very bad fire year across the

province," said Harvey.
"With the number of fires lit, about 85 were caused by power lines.
None of those power line-caused fires ended up being significant,

but a lot of the significant fires did have a significant impact on our transmission infrastructure," he said.

"When we get into those situations, the line stays de-energized until we can get it back up and running," said Harvey. "AltaLink has been taking wildfire mitigation seriously. We are a leader in Canada in that realm. We can't get our risk right down to zero, but we can do what we can to reduce the risk to the



Karson retires











greatest extent possible." Harvey explained that the tricky part was finding a balance between protecting customers and communities by having resilient power lines that can handle events while at the same time, not putting undue cost onto ratepayers. Some of the key aspects of the plan include fire threat maps. "We've used third-party fire experts who have mapped out our transmission lines and looked for areas where in the event a fire did ignite along one of our lines, those areas may have a higher impact than in other areas," he explained.

Another step is Facility Wildfire Risk Reduction Programs. Harvey explained that they are upgrading their wood pole structures in high-risk areas. "We are trying to fire-harden our equipment as we move forward. That includes replacing the insulators, those coneshaped strings that hang the wire up to the structure. We're replacing those to make sure they are in the best condition possible. We are also replacing wood cross arms on those

lines with steel cross arms. If we get (power) leakage up there, sometimes that wood cross arm can be a source of ignition. Steel reduces that risk."

Enhanced Situational Awareness Monitoring is also in the program and includes adding more cameras and weather stations to their network. "We are using a third party that provides a daily report on fire weather in our service territory and geographical areas. It helps show us the trend of how the weather is progressing and if we are getting into extremely hot, dry factors and how that will change our operating behaviours." Harvey said in the last quarter, they added seventeen new weather stations.

Similar to FireSmart, Harvey said AltaLink had also increased vegetation management activities. "We are making sure that vegetation is maintained, and we've also increased the number of times we do inspections. When we start getting into more extreme risk days where the fire weather looks concerning, we have enhanced operational practices," he explained.

One of those practices is to no longer re-energize a line that suffered a fault if the area has risky weather, like hot and dry conditions. "Typically, when a fault happens on the line, auto-reclosers will attempt to energize the line immediately so that we don't have a disruption in power." He explained that instead, they would send a crew to inspect it.

Should a fire come close to a community, like Woodlands County or the Town of Whitecourt, Harvey said they have a final resort option called a Public

Safety Power Shutoff. "If the conditions are concerning, we (could) proactively shut off the power to some of our transmission lines in those areas until conditions clear," eliminating the risk of a powerline igniting a fire in a very dry area.

Harvey said turning off the power to an area and leaving residents in the dark isn't something they take lightly. "We are a power company. We take a lot of pride in providing service, so it's not something we want to do, but if it's a matter of public safety versus providing that service.

public safety is number one, so we will do that." Multiple factors could lead to a power shutoff, including high winds, low humidity, dry vegetation, close fire activity and real-time observation from boots on the ground.

Harvey said the proactive approach would remove power from an already risky scenario. "We don't want to further advance a fire." He said once off, it wouldn't be as simple as flicking back on the switch. "It will take some time for us to get that line energized again. With us having

the line off, we won't know what condition the line is in because we won't have any data to tell us about any faults or trips that have happened. We would have to access the line."

Woodlands County will be looking to see if there is an opportunity for synergies within AltaLink's Wildfire Mitigation Plan, including within its extensive camera network. 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

It's an energy story: Alberta exports jump in July

Buoyed by rising crude oil output, Alberta exports reached a 21-month high in July.

According to new Statistics Canada data, the value of Alberta's international merchandise exports reached \$16.9 billion in July, 26% higher than the same month last year. Adjusted for seasonality*, the monthly value

spiked to the highest level since October 2022.

On a year-to-date (YTD) basis, export revenues were up by 4.4% from the first seven months of 2023.

Energy exports (+6.7%) are the main driver of the YTD increase. This is not surprising given that production of crude oil is at a record high this year, with prices also trending higher. Crude

oil accounts for roughly two-thirds of Alberta's total exports. The story, however,

is a bit different for non-energy commodities as they posted a 2.3% YTD decline during the same time-frame. Farm, fishing and intermediate food products drove the majority of the pullback. According to Statistics Canada, higher processing activity of canola within the coun-

try tempered volumes sold internationally while canola prices also edged lower in July.

National exports ticked up by 1.3% YTD with Alberta responsible for over 80% of the increase.

We expect oil and gas export volumes to rise almost 5% and be a key driver of Alberta's GDP growth this year.



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
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
