

Crafts, local author Janelle Hilland was one of the in- store artists attending in person. "I am here to do a book signing. I wrote a book for my daughter about wildflowers and how we are just like them. We need the rain like we need our tears, we need sunshine like we need warm hugs, and we need rest just like the flowers in the light of the moon. I wanted to let my daughter know that even when things get hard, it will be ok. It's a message that we all need, kids, parents and non-parents. Everyone needs it," explained Hilland.

Sitting right across from the door, Hilland had a perfect view of customers as they entered. "It's nice to see so many people coming through the door because with businesses like this, the only way they are going to

survive is if we support them, so it's great that they are holding events like this and working together. It's cool to see the different ages and walks of life coming through the door to support our town."

Hilland said events people encouraging to check out places they've maybe never seen before or haven't been in a while, are a great way to remind the community of what's here. "I think we get used to going place to place that we forget to stop into the places that are outside of our routine, and I think events like this encourage us to wiggle outside of our boxes and check out places that we might not normally go to. 



Every 40 seconds somewhere around the world someone dies by suicide, that's 99 people every 66 minutes. Every day, that's almost 100 people in the United States alone, and over 2160 worldwide. Putting a Face on Suicide (PAFOS) is a suicide awareness project that creates posters and videos to pay tribute to those we have lost to suicide with dignity and respect. PAFOS humanizes the daunting statistics; lovingly replacing numbers with faces.

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Action at the future Shoppers's site

After learning that Shoppers Drug Mart had selected Whitecourt as the next community to receive a store, residents have been watching and waiting for activity to start on the lot beside Mike & Rebecca's No Frills. Months ago, shortly after being approved by Whitecourt Town Council, the trees were levelled along about half of the field, but nothing has happened since. Midway through last week, temporary fencing went up around the site, alerting the public that activity would be forthcoming.

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

purchase of \$20,000 was approved funded from the Equipment Reserve to replace a non-working unit. Wobbly roller carts are often used for road construction, shoulder pulls, patching and cold mix placement and can be used for 20 years or more when maintained.

Due to insufficient staffing levels for the level of work required, the municipal rebrand project was cancelled. Woodlands County was successful in their NRED grant application which covered up to 50% of the cost and

A wobbly roller cart received \$62,500 from the Government of Alberta. With the project's cancellation, the funds will be returned to the province.

> The Police Funding Model Agreement in Alberta is set to expire in 2025. Woodlands County is concerned over vacant member positions which lead to poor response times and decreased levels of service. Additionally, as the funds are collected as a requisition on the property tax invoice, there is no control for the County to select the service levels for its residents. Prior to

a new agreement being signed, RMA is seeking input from municipalities regarding their experience with the funding model and policing services in their areas to better advocate for rural municipalities. Woodlands County continues to advocate for better policing in the municipality.

Council requested to meet with Minister of Transportation & Economic Corridors Devin Dreeshen at the Rural Municipalities of Alberta Fall Convention in November to discuss the CYZU Airport and failed application for

grant funding from the Strategic Transportation Infrastructure Program. In 2023, Woodlands County applied for grant funding under the Community Airport program for the Runway 11- 29 Rehabilitation project, which was denied. The runway was assessed to be in poor condition requiring resurfacing and upgraded lighting. CYZU plays a critical role in the safety of Albertans by providing access to patient transfers for AHS, STARS, Alberta Wildfire, and RCMP. Council will continue advocating for CYZU

Airport to secure funding for this important piece of infrastructure in the community.

Recognizing challenging road conditions in parts of the County, pilot projects continue to address road concerns, including the increased grading service on select roads and the cold mix road in subdivisions which begins this week. Another pilot, which is currentbeing monitored ly for effectiveness, uses grading, watering, and packing techniques and equipment to add moisture to gravel roads to reduce washboards.

The locally-owned Whitecourt Wolverines played their second home game of the season on Friday last week. Their home opener on September 14 brought out over 840 fans to watch the action and over 500 on Friday.

The Whitecourt Wolverines welcomed the Bonnyville Pontiacs into the home barn for their second stint at home this regular season in front of just over 500 fans. The atmosphere in JDA Place was full of excitement as the Whitecourt faithful checked out the newest players added to the roster this week.

Ewan McPherson was announced early that morning on the

Wolverines' social media as having joined the team. Dylan Ruptash and veteran forward Ethan Short were officially announced as new Wolverines two and three days before the game. A glance at the current roster on the Wolverines website shows only a handful of returning players. With many new faces on the team this year, fans have new numbers to learn, new names to cheer for and new jerseys to add to their collection to show off their new favourites.

Following the puck drop just after 7 pm, Whitecourt started strong. Only 45 seconds into the frame, second-year Wolverine Jalen Bianchet pocketed his first of the season, assisted by Tyler Rowland, his second. Less than five minutes later, fan favourite #71 Kaiden Wiltsie, playing in his fourth season with the team, launched

a beauty past the Pontiacs netminder, giving his team a 2-0 lead.

With seconds left, Wiltsie lined up for one final shot on the net. His stick connected with the puck as the whistle blew, and one Pontiac player, #8 Lynden Hanvold, didn't like what he perceived as a late shot at his goalie. He beelined over to Wiltsie at the blue line and gave him a big, unprovoked hit, which brought a mix of Wolverines over, followed by a mix of Pontiacs.

The kerfuffle got pretty heated with a lot of pushing, yelling, some punches and a couple of big tackles that brought players to the ice, including Edmonton-native #24 Ethan Short, who was flung down by Pontiac forward #2 Brent Hoshowski, who had already lost his helmet in the scuffle. It took several minutes for the ref and linesmen to break things up and send players where they needed to go. Once the dust settled, Lunden Hanvold, the instigator, and Wolverine Jack Pollock each sat for two for roughing.

In the second period, the chaos from the first was not forgotten, but both teams seemed to be more focused on winning than fighting. There were plenty of big hits and great saves at both ends as line after line attempted to break the tie. Just over three minutes in, the Pontiacs scored, taking the lead 3-2. Exactly one minute later, the Wolverines scored, tying it once again. The goal came thanks to new addition Dylan Ruptash, who played for the Spruce Grove Saints last year. It was his third goal of the season. The Edmonton-born player leads the team in points with four.

Fifty seconds after Ruptash's goal, the Pontiacs again took the lead back, giving both the fans and announcers whiplash. The game was now 4-3. Once the Pontiacs took the lead this time, they did not let it go. Four minutes later, at 10:08 of the second, they scored again, making it 5-3. Less than a minute later, the Wolverines responded, scoring to make it 5-4. Bonnyville scored once more to round out the period, heading into the third with a 6-4 lead.

In the final frame of the night, try as they might, the Wolverines could not break through the Bonnyville netminder. The teams traded penalties, one for hooking (Pontiacs) and one for slashing (Wolverines), but it was the Pontiacs that managed to score the game's final goal and hold onto the lead, taking the win 7-4.

The next time fans can catch their team in action at home at JDA Place will be a doubleheader on Friday, October 4, against the Drumheller Dragons and Saturday, October 5, against the Canmore Eagles. 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
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
