"They get to learn lots of stuff, and it has helped a lot of kids. We have been supporting them for many years. I'm not sure how long. It's been a long time," he added. Bell's son was one of the youths supported through the cadet program, having aged out several years ago. "When he started, he was shy and wouldn't talk. Once he went to camp for the first time, he returned as a completely different person. The Commanding Officer asked where my son went because he came back talking and wasn't shy. He was taking charge. Mark was a new person. He went to camp for two more years and became a Warrant Officer First Class. He went all the way to the top rank," explained Bell.

Seeing the changes in his son showed Bell how important it was to keep the air cadets program going. "Helping them keeps the program going and keeps the lights on. Without support, they wouldn't be going." Bell contin-

ues volunteering with the 721 Hawks even though his son has been out of the program for several years. "I plan on doing it for years yet," he said.

Captain Mitchell Krasey, pictured, was pleased to accept the cheque alongside parent- committee chair Jay Thebeau (SSC) and Warrant Officer Second Class Lapointe. "The Department of National Defense does a lot for us, like providing wages for the staff and basic supports like uniforms and some equipment, but there are things they don't supply. Thanks to local sponsors like the Lions Club, we can add the extra things we need for a more exciting and vibrant program. Instead of giving the cadets the basic, plain-Jane meal, we get the extra value meal with the support from the Lions Club," explained Krasey.

He said that dollars from the community make the program extra fun and allow the squadron to partake in things they might not get otherwise, including weekend camping

trips, sports days, and regional get-togethers with other squadrons. "We just had a gliding weekend at the start of October where the whole squadron went up to Grande Prairie, and each cadet got two glider flights each. That was a unique thing. I think of all the cadets we brought, only two or three of the cadets had actually glided before. It was an exciting program and was enjoyed by all." Bell said knowing the kids are getting experiences like that is all the more reason to keep supporting the Hawks. "I greatly respect all the cadets and the leaders that help them work hard.

We love seeing them improve all the time. I see it more than the other members because I come down here to watch. I really enjoy watching them work. It's tremendous. Some go on into the service, and others go on to great careers because of it."

Cadets volunteer each spring to help clean up the Lions Campground and prepare it for the camping season. The




group places picnic tables on the sites, picks up branches, sweeps out sites, and stacks firewood. Volunteerism is a significant part of the cadet program, which is another reason it aligns with the Lions Club.

"People who camp there are supporting the community with their dollars. We get people from the States that stay every year because they want to support the club because they know what we do. We have workers who camp there, too," said Bell. He added that the club is adding to the campground this year.

Lions Club International has nearly 1.5 million members in 49,000 clubs. Bell said the local club is always seeking more commu-

nity-minded residents to join. "Right now, we have about twelve members. We would like to have more. Age isn't an issue. We do other projects around town, too, and we've never turned anyone down." Clubs and non-profit organizations seeking support are encouraged to contact the Lions Club.

# Woodlands County Council meeting review

At its annual organizational meeting, Council appointed Councillor Dave Kusch as Reeve for a oneyear term. In addition, Councillors were appointed to serve as members of various boards and committees which can be found on the Woodlands County CivicWeb Portal.

Council was updated on the condition of the cold mix, hot

mix, oiled and gravel roads as well as ditching for various roads in Woodlands County. McElhanney was contracted to inspect 65 km of oiled and cold mix roads in April 2024. After reviewing the data collected, cost estimates and rehabilitation options were included in a report based on the conditions of the road. County staff also reviewed data gathered on gravel roads and road ditching in preparation of the 2025 budget. A Condition Improvement program was developed and will be used to guide upcoming budget deliberations and future budgets.

Council adopted the Levels of Service Report and will incorporate it as part of the annual Strategic Plan Review. The report inventories the services provided by each department and outlines recommendations for the growth of the organization to meet the service levels expected by Woodlands County residents. The next Strategic Plan review will take place after the 2025 election with the new Council. Council scheduled

# The Bank of Canada doesn't want to be behind the curve


As we expected, the Bank of Canada slashed its policy interest rate by 50 basis points from 4.25% to 3.75% last week—the largest cut since the early stages of the pandemic and a rare 'oversized' move outside a recession period.

The jumbo cut comes because inflation has already fallen to target and such restrictive policy rates are no longer needed. Last month's CPI report sealed the

our view. Headline inflation broke through the 2% target to land at only 1.6%. And now the Bank expects inflation to be lower than it was forecasting in July (see below).

Our take: The right call, and a key moment in the battle against inflation. Late out of the gate when inflation took off, the Bank of Canada doesn't want to be behind the curve as inflation normalizes. It takes 18 to 24 months

50 basis point cut in for the impacts of policy rate changes to fully kick in, and speeding back to its neutral rate (estimated by the Bank to be 2.25-3.25%) will help prevent the economy from cooling too much. Even with this latest cut, policy will remain restrictive more people are renewing loans at higher rates than before the rate hikes started. And if inflation flares up again, the Bank can simply hold longer at the current policy rate.

nesses and to tell us why they feel that way," said Meier. Speaking to why they decided to allow non-chamber businesses to be nominated, Meier said it's an encouragement to join. "If they win, they are given a credit towards a Chamber membership. So, that is an encouragement to become a Chamber member too."

She said being a member isn't just about the "prestige of it" but that businesses have much to gain from doing it. "One of the biggest things is connecting with other businesses in the community and supporting each other. The networking events are golden for small businesses.

There are also things for small businesses who, for example, don't have a healthcare benefit plan because it's too expensive or they are too small. If you join the Chamber, you can hook up for that, and it's not as expensive as doing it on your own. There are lots of reasons to become a member."

This year's list of awards has grown from last year's ten, with three additional awards up for grabs. Returning award categories in-

cluded Small Business of the Year, Corporate/ Franchise Business of the Year, Non-Profit of the Year, Emerging Business of the Year, Customer Service Community Award, Champion, Business Innovation, Business Employing Youth, and Legacy Business. Two awards saw a slight name change Staff Member of the Year is now Employee of the Year, and Best Place to Work is now the Employer Excellence Award. The two new awards for 2024 are Chamber Member of the Year and the Regional Community/ **Tourist** Attraction Award.

"There are various sections and criteria people can read about and nominate one of the businesses in, or more than one. People can only win in one category, but they can be nominated in more than one," explained Meier. As anyone nominated can likely attest to, having their name put up for recognition means a lot, even if they don't win.

Meier said there aren't too many things that consumers can't find here and that it is about recognizing that. "What we have here is special. We appreciate

that people have taken the risk of starting a business and providing a service to the people in the community. That is what is so important to me. You are not going to get that anywhere else. It's an experience. We are celebrating what people have given to the population here."

Once the nomination period closes on December 1, residents will have two weeks to vote for the winners out of the nominations. Then, on Saturday, January 25, the winners will be announced during the third annual President's Gala and Business Awards event. "We want to encourage people to nominate the businesses they feel are worthy and to vote for them. Last year was like the Academy Awards. The delight on people's faces holding their awards was priceless, and how they displayed them so proudly in their businesses. It was a real honour.

People see it as that," said Meier.

"Without those businesses, we would not exist. They are our reason for being, and whatever we can do to help them, we will. We value them that much, and this is one way that we can demonstrate that. We want them to know that we are proud of them and will do whatever we can to make them as successful as possible," added Meier.

Businesses can be

nominated in multiple categories but can only win one award vearly. The Business Award Committee will tabulate winners based on several metrics. including the highest percentage of votes and widest margin of votes.
