
Snowy Ladies' Night delivers trivia, hidden flags, fan fun, and sweet goals





tensions seemed to rise higher and higher, leaving fans to wonder how messy things would get. Oddly, with the amount of pushing, shoving and smacktalking, there were only two penalties in the whole game, one to each team.

Just shy of the halfway mark, Xavier Lacoste scored his third goal of the season, unassisted. The Sainte-Julie, Quebec native, is in his second season with the Whitecourt Wolverines. In 35 games last season, Lacoste put up six assists. So far this year, in 40 games (as of Friday, January 31), Lacoste has three goals and 22 assists, showing incredible growth from one season to the next.

With a 3-2 lead, the Wolverines knew it was not the time to take their collective foot off the pedal. The teams battled back and forth, with end-to-end action and a few wicked saves from both goalies. Nearing the end, Camrose pulled their goalie, hoping to snag the goal they needed to tie things up.

However, Spencer Claerhout had other plans. Once the puck was on his stick, and with only eighteen seconds left to go, the Wolverine knew what to do, and he did not miss. Claerhout scored his fourth goal of the season, unassisted, to solidify the Wolverines' victory against the Kodiaks. The Wolverines won, 4-2.

Local fans will not see the Camrose Ko-

diaks until mid-March when they take on the Wolverines in the final regular season game. There are twelve games to get to before that happens, and fans can see the Wolverines back in action on home ice on Saturday, February 15, against the Grande Prairie Storm. As of Friday, January 31, the Wolverines sit atop the AJHL

North Division, with seven points on the second-place team, the Storm. Broadly, the Wolverines are second in the league, sitting just below the Canmore Eagles and just above the Calgary Canucks. Both southern teams split their games against the Wolverines this season, eluding to the makings of an interesting playoff season.

Whitecourt Town Council updates

The 2024 Municipal Enforcement Annual Report has been accepted as information by Whitecourt Town Council. The report is prepared annually for the Alberta Solicitor General, and outlines activities conducted by Municipal Enforcement Services. Over the course of the year, 2,163 activities were logged by Whitecourt Peace Officers.

Whitecourt awarded \$18,604 in funding to community organizations as part of the 2025 Family & Community Support Services Grant Program. The program provides assistance to community groups that plan to provide social programs that are preventative in nature to the community. 2025 recipients include:

- McLeod River Primary Care Network - \$2,544 to provide workshops with a focus on mental health, physical wellness, and social engagement.
- Wellspring Family Resource & Crisis age safely in place and







Outgoing Fire Chief Brian Wynn reflects on 31 years in the Whitecourt Fire Department

After just over three decades of service to his community, now-retired Fire Chief Brian Wynn is entering his first year as a retiree. The Press sat down with Wynn just before his last day to get his thoughts on his career, memories, and what he would miss most. Pictured is a cool snapshot from one of his many trainings.

Just before Christmas, on the afternoon of December 20, after 31 years of service to the Whitecourt Fire Department, now-retired Fire Chief Brian Wynn walked out of his office for the last time and stepped into his first moments as a retired man. After dedicating much of his life to keeping the community safe, Wynn said he was excited to be able to say yes more often. "As chief, I was on


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

day. "We had the fire phone in the hallway at home, and it was either the siren in town that went off, or the fire phone would ring, or both." He said his dad's profession became part of the family, and as he grew up, he knew it was something he wanted to do too, but his jobs never left room for it.

"When we moved to Whitecourt, I worked for Halliburton and was always on the road. But in 1993. I took a lavoff from them instead of transferring out of town, and that's when I started," said Wynn. His passion for wanting to help others kept him invigorated through the highs and lows of firefighting. Being someone's support on perhaps their worst day was something Wynn took very seriously. That drive led to his desire to better himself with further training. The problem was that the training took a week at a time and was in Vermillion, which meant losing pay and taking a week off work. "I wanted to be the best I could be before the need arose. That's what pushed me to be the

first 1001 firefighter in the department because it's learning, and to me, learning needs to keep happening."

It took Wynn four years to reach the NFPA 1001 Firefighter Certification, the first member of the Whitecourt Fire Department to do it. Towards the end of his training, the Ranger Board, where he worked, started covering his weeklong training with pay, supporting him in getting the certification. The investment ended up paying off. "I was doing the fire training of the entire plant site out there. They helped advance my training, and they received a better, more site-specific training for the plant." Wynn said his dad watched his rise in the department with pride. "When I was captain for sixteen years. my mom and dad, the whole family, was pretty proud of what I was doing in the community and driving that training. Unfortunately, my dad wasn't alive when I became chief. but that would've been a very proud moment for him."

his 1041 Fire Service Instructor Certification, enabling him to help build an in-house training system so that members wouldn't have to drive out of town and stay away for a week to train. Under past Fire Chief Bruce Parrent, a training ground (since named after Parrent) was established (one of the first of its kind), and training levels skyrocketed.

Wynn's desire to be better paved the way for members today to get the same worldwide-recognized training in-house over two vears instead of four. "You lead the way and show why it's important, and then it sets a bar which becomes the new bar. There's always going to be the first person who paves the path, and then it becomes the norm." said Wvnn. He took over as Fire Chief in 2013, and one of his big pushes was for FireSmart practices to happen in the community and beyond. "It's the biggest fire prevention thing we could be doing, and I hope it continues." For the last eleven years, Wynn has helped increase

the awareness of what FireSmart is and why it's vital and has helped bring in hundreds of thousands of dollars in grant funding to help with preventative projects in Whitecourt, like funding equipment purchases, clearing dead and downed trees and cleaning up forests along the community's forested edges. "It's been an hon-

our to serve. I am very proud of myself, the department, and the support that we provide the community, which is such a high level of training. And to all those who pass through our community on the highway or when members have gone on deployments, like when we sent a crew to Jasper. Whitecourt really does shine for the members and their training level. work ethic and attitude. We get a lot of good comments from other departments, which makes me extremely proud," smiled Wynn. He's also proud of some of the big projects he's been part of, including the rescue truck purchased ten continued on page 15

Woodlands County Council discussed the following items at their recent meeting of Council:

Councillor Deane was nominated to sit on the Board of Directors for the Athabasca Watershed Council (AWC) with Councillor Kuelken acting as an alternate if the nomination is successful. The AWC is a not- for-profit organization focused on providing scientific reports on the state of the Athabasca River watershed and outreach initiatives to inform the community about the importance of the watershed. In addition, Woodlands County is providing a \$1,500 donation to the AWC.

The 2025 Property Tax Auction is scheduled at the Woodlands County Municipal Office in Whitecourt at 2:00 pm, Friday, March 28, 2025. Properties listed in the auction will be advertised in local newspapers and on the Woodlands County website and are offered for sale on an asis, where-is basis with no guarantees or warranties.

Council has requested to meet with the Minister of Transportation and Economic Corridors Devin Dreeshen at the Rural Municipalities of Alberta 2025 Spring Convention to discuss CYZU Airport and Resource Road funding.

Woodlands County re-applied for grant funding from the Stra-

Transportation tegic Infrastructure Program under the Community Airport program for the Runway 11-29 Rehabilitation Project as the runway was assessed in 2023 to be in poor condition requiring resurfacing and upgraded lighting. CYZU plays a critical role in the safety of Albertans by providing access to patient transfers for AHS, STARS, Alberta Wildfire, and RCMP.

Provincial and mu-

nicipal roads are utilized by several industries to transport natural resources to their next location which can result in the roads requiring more maintenance due to the increased use and heavier vehicle load on the roads. Council would like to discuss funding options to build a resource road for industry use within Woodlands County.

2025 SMALL BUSINESS PROPERTY SUB-CLASS APPLICATION DEADLINE

The Small Business Property Sub-Class provides owners who paid a non-residential property tax levy in the previous year with an opportunity to apply for a reduced property tax rate in the current year.

Property owners who operate a business or have businesses leasing their property with fewer than 50 full-time employees in Canada can apply for a reduced property tax rate. Each application will be

reviewed before being approved for the tax rate reduction. Eligible properties must be in compliance with Woodlands County's Land Use Bylaw.

To qualify, each Small Business Property Owner must submit their application annually. Applications for the 2025 tax year are due **February 14, 2025**. Applications are available at the Woodlands County Offices or online at <u>https://www.woodlands.ab.ca/p/property-taxes</u>.
