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# Bowls for Hope, a growing tradition



One of the community's most colourful and artistic fundraisers grows in popularity yearly, thanks to a fantastic bunch of generous artisans, dedicated volunteers and a chili chef whose recipe hits the spot every time.

Since 2016, Whitecourt Potter's Guild members have lovingly taken on a fundraiser that has grown in popularity while beautifying cupboards and dining room tables in homes throughout the community. The Chili Bowl Fundraiser is one of those blink-andyou-miss-out events because, without fail, the bowls sell out every year, and the chili pot is

licked clean.

Janice Janzen has been a member of the Potter's Guild since 2013 and has been volunteering at Tennille's Hope since 2014. When the guild decided to fundraise for the soup kitchen, Janzen's connection to it as a volunteer put her in the lead spot to get things going.

She brought the idea to Wanda Belbin, manager at Tennille's. "I

told her about the crazv idea our guild had about making chili bowls as a fundraiser and selling them, and she was like, that's a great idea!" Janzen said the group immediately started figuring out the logistics and getting bowls into the kiln.

"We had twelve members in the guild. and we made 67 bowls that year. We thought

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we were rock stars because we sold them all," she laughed. "The next year, we got a few more members and sold a few more bowls, and each year it just got bigger and bigger, with more members and more bowls."

At only \$25 a bowl, and making \$2,700.

residents get a steal of a deal, receiving a oneof-a-kind locally made piece of art and a bowl of piping hot homemade chili. In year one, the fundraiser made \$1,340. In 2017, they sold 113 bowls, making \$2,260. They upped the available bowls again in 2018, selling 135

The number of bowls available corresponds with how many bowls guild members can make by a week or two away from the event, counting in every last-second bowl possible. Without fail, the event always sells out, something that

# Reminiscing with Residents: Spruceview Lodge edition with Sandra Krischuk



The third installment of this series, where longtime residents of Whitecourt share their memories, features Sandra Krischuk. who has lived in the community since she was a toddler. Read on to hear about her mischievous side and her adventures with the rodeo.

Growing Whitecourt in 1940s and 1950s was a memory-filled time that Spruceview Lodge resident Sandra Krischuk looks back on fondly. She has called Spruceview home for the last few years and moved to Whitecourt when she was three. "My mother was born here," she explained. "Her dad was a millwright and came to work at Millar Western."

Krischuk had extended family in the community, including her uncle, a name most will recognize as John Dahl. "We lived down near where the Millar Western office is now. There was no road or street between our lot and the lumber pile," said Krischuk. "Our yard was a one-acre lot. Where the bowling alley used to be was my grandfather and grandmother's lot, and we were behind them, closer to the Wellspring building area."

The other families in the area had children, forming a friend group. "We had the run of the town. The railroad track ran straight to the planer mill, and there was a little creek

behind it, on the other side of the railroad tracks. It was Beaver Creek. It went right through the yard until it joined the McLeod River just before the mouth of the McLeod got to the Athabasca," explained Krischuk.

"We used to build rafts and go on Beaver Creek. If we got caught, that was a big no-no," she laughed. "We weren't supposed to do it because you could fall off and drown. But kids will be kids, and so, we did it." They also loved fishing in it. "We would get little rainbow rout and grayling in that creek. We were allowed to do that. It wasn't a wide creek, but you couldn't jump across it, and it was deep enough for fish. We would catch them and bring them home."

With the railway beside them, the group had another thing they liked to do. "Mr. Warchola ran the speeder. In those days, the speeder was a hand crank that went up and down the track. He would get off work and, of course, be tired, and us kids would take it. He had two sons who chummed with us, and we would all go for a ride with the speeder. We always made sure we put it back," laughed Krischuk.

And the mischief didn't stop there. "We used to go through the yard at Millar and swim in the McLeod. We would skip school and go. We got caught a few times," she laughed. She also admitted to playing hide and seek in the woodpile. "It was a little bit of mischief," giggling in the way that only a sweet grandmother could. "We had fun," she smiled.

They also loved picking berries. "Us kids used to take our bikes and ride up the hill, and we would pick blueberries and later cranberries. Our parents used to drive us, with a picnic lunch, my mother and grandmother, on the road to Blue Ridge in the Sandhills for strawberries when it was hot. Oh, they were good!"

As children often did, Krischuk entered the workforce young. As a tall young lady, standing five-foot-four by the time she hit double digits, she began waitressing at the BA

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Café, where the Ramada Hotel is now when she was only ten.

"I was mature young. We all had to be. A tenyear-old now would be different than when I was ten. I worked after school and on weekends."

Krischuk said she was one of the only kids in her friend group to be working at that age, but said it was necessary.

"My mom and dad split up, and we needed the extra money. She went and worked at a grocery store. Years later, she said that I made more money waitressing than she did at the grocery store. I didn't know that then. There were three younger children and me, and we needed winter clothes and some summer stuff," explained Krischuk.

At sixteen, Krischuk left Whitecourt, newly married, to follow her husband as he worked on drilling rigs. "I was one of those smart, know-it-all teenagers," she laughed. "I had our first child on my seventeenth birthday, and everybody said you can't have just one. You have to have at least two.

So, fourteen months later, I had my last one."

The family settled in Fort St. John once the kids were old enough to start school. Krischuk said she returned to Whitecourt every summer to help her mom with the rodeo and chuckwagon races, staying for a month and a half.

The rodeo was a big part of her upbringing, and she enjoyed it.

When she visited, she got to see the changes happening in White-court. "I remember coming back and Uncle John showing us what he was trying to get built up where the Forest Interpretive Centre is and all the things he had up there, the little buildings and equipment," explained Krischuk.

Over the summers she visited, the rodeo grounds transitioned from downtown White-court to where they now sit, at the Westward Hall. Krischuk said they gave the air cadets a place in the blue building, which they still use and gave

some of the bleachers to the River Boat Club. "They had big functions when they had races and nowhere for people to sit other than along the bank, which was dangerous along the Athabasca."

As her children grew up, Krischuk began spending more time in Whitecourt helping her mom and doing something she wished she could still do today.

"I travelled with them, racing on the rodeo circuit (chuckwagons)." She travelled throughout Alberta, Saskatchewan and into BC and only stopped six or so years ago. "It was so much fun."

Krischuk got to see the community grow up right alongside her, changing year by year. "It was a nice, good town to grow up in," she said with a smile. "My sister-in-law was here visiting the other day, and we talked about how she remembered taking lunches to school. Us kids didn't. I remember taking lunch once, and by the time I got my sandwich open. I had every one of those bus kids watching to see what I had because they had already finished theirs," laughed Krischuk. "After that, I went home for lunch," she laughed again.

When thinking about how kids live today, Krischuk feels they don't explore like she did growing up. "I wish kids did that more. Just getting outside and exploring. Like finding our own ski hill and sliding through the trees. It was really fun to grow up doing that."

Thank you, Sandra, for sharing memories from growing up in this community we call home. From your grandfather's gift of reindeer mukluks to Uncle John Dahl marrying your first teacher at Central School (Miss Herd) to your love for Chinese food and the "black gumbo" surface of Highway 43, between Sangudo and Mayerthorpe that would somehow be sticky and slippery at the same time making travel tricky some days.

Reading about your experiences will bring back memories for some and paint a new picture for others, and I'm grateful for the opportunity to share them.

continues to surprise the members. The guild has 40 members now, which is the limit for their space. "We are very proud of what we do and of the group we are getting to give to. Everybody feels really good when it's done," said Janzen.

She said it's an honour to know that community members want their bowls, adding that they've never had a complaint. "We let new potters know that people will be excited about their bowls no matter what they make. They know they've made the bowl, and that's what mat-Janzen. "It shocks me every year when we put the advertisement on Facebook. This year, on the first day, I think we sold 150 bowls. It's amazing. The support we get from the community is amazing."

Aside from 2021, when they couldn't run the event, 2020 was the only year bowl sales dipped slightly due to COVID. Other than that, sales have increased every single vear. Thanks to new members joining the guild, there were more hands to create bowls. growing availability by leaps and bounds.

Each piece is a labour of love, taking nearly two weeks from start to finish.

From forming the bowl to trimming and drying it, firing it in the kiln and glazing it, making a work of art takes time, and each guild member is asked to provide bowls as part of their membership.

Earlier this month, the group sold 288 bowls, raising \$7,385 for Tennille's Hope Soup Kitchen, more than four times the bowls made and more than five times the dollars raised from year one. Even fourters most," explained teen people on the waiting list snagged bowls, thanks to some last-minute creations that were ready in time.

> Since 2016, the guild has raised \$36,228 for Tennille's Hope. These dollars have been a huge help to the soup kitchen, enabling them to do things that their yearly budget would never allow. Janzen said they've gotten knives, stainless-steel counters. and chair covers and are buying new tables.

"When someone needs something, we always have gift cards on hand that are either donated to us or that we buy," she added.

"One hundred percent of the money made goes to the soup kitchen. The potters donate the clay, their time, and their special glazes. We even recycle some of our clay with the trimmings from other projects to make bowls," explained Janzen.

Throughout the fall and winter, members attend classes on Thursdays and Saturdays to learn how to make, shape and glaze their bowls. "Two members of the guild volunteer to run those classes. Some of our bowls are square, some are oval. and some have different techniques and designs. Those workshops have caught on the last two years, and that's why we have been able to make so many bowls."

This year, at pick-up, Janzen asked some repeat buyers what they do with all the bows they've collected. "This one lady said she doesn't have any other soup bowls in her cupboards, just our chili bowls. Another lady told me that she gives them away as gifts."

She said one lady

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buys five bowls each year, one each for herself, her husband and their three children. "She said they are putting bowls away for each of the kids, like a hope chest, for when they go away to college," said Janzen.

Every chili day, she looks forward to texts from friends letting her know they got one of her bowls or showing her which one they got. "When you go to their house and see a bowl, you're like, oh my gosh, I think that's a chili bowl! I always lift the bowl to see whose it is."

One of the best aspects of the day grew out of necessity and has now added a game-like element to the fundraiser that buyers love. "Year one, we had the bowls all lined up, and we would put them in the bag as customers watched us, and they

would ask for a different one, and it took way too long."

The group decided to make it a surprise, putting the bowls inside brown paper bags. The bags worked, but one extra tweak to the process made things even better, staples. "When they would deliver to bigger groups, like a workplace, the people who ordered it were the first to see the bowls if the bags were open, and they would pick their favourite. I heard that people didn't like that," laughed Janzen. "So, now we staple the bags so people can't look at them, and they have to pick a bag, with no peeking allowed," she chuckled.

Janzen said the guild is grateful for the community's support of Tennille's Hope and their artistic creations, thanking everyone for making the fundraiser a big success. "See you next year!"



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
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
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
